

Chamber to open service center for DMV licenses

The Department of Motor Vehicles, along with State Rep. Dorinda Borer (D-115) and officials from the City of West Haven and its Chamber of Commerce, announced Tuesday that DMV and the city next year will open a Customer Service Center for license and ID card renewals.

The effort is part of DMV's plan to replace the now-closed eight AAA offices in New Haven and Fairfield counties. This also will be DMV's first office fully managed under municipal direction.

In the past, offices were housed in municipal buildings, but were staffed by DMV. Under this model, the staffing will be independent of the DMV as done now at AAA Club Alliance offices in Hartford, Middlesex and New London counties.

This new service center will be located in City Hall and will be run by the Chamber of Commerce. An exact date for opening will be decided shortly. The center, available to all customers in Connecticut, will provide services two days a week, with additional days possibly added later next year.

Borer contacted DMV early in August to explore a new municipal model for an office to serve West Haven and surrounding towns.

"Given West Haven's population, we are a perfect hub for state services, Borer said. "This is a terrific opportunity for not only our city, but the entire region as this program will alleviate congestion in the regional offices. The icing on the cake, however, is that the significant foot traffic to our downtown area will be a boost to local businesses and potentially new ones."

She continued that state agencies should be able to serve the public in a more convenient way.

"Government agencies should always work together to achieve cost effective user friendly models that bring economic benefits to our cities and towns. I am encouraged by how well this is coming together to achieve those goals," she said.

DMV Commissioner Michael Bzdyra hailed the new plan as a new way of doing business.

"We are excited about the start of bringing additional service centers for our customers. This is important to them, it's important to the state, the city and the chamber. It's a win-win for

Mayor Edward M. O'Brien was excited by the new service.

"This is a great opportunity for West Haven," O'Brien said. "Not only will our residents have a more convenient option for DMV services, but this new facility will attract thousands of new visitors from around the state to the center of West Haven every year. Increasing the number of visitors to our center is a key aspect of attracting new development and will play a large role in revitalizing our downtown."

"The West Haven Chamber of Commerce looks forward to being part of this exciting venture," said Alan Olenick, the chamber's executive director. "We look forward to providing a necessary service to West Haven and its surrounding towns. Attracting thousands of people to our city and its downtown area is part of our mission to help support West Haven business."

Businesses in spotlight on Saturday

Mayor Edward M. O'Brien has announced the city's participation in the eighth annual Small Business Saturday on Saturday.

Falling between Black Friday and Cyber Monday, Small Business Saturday is a day to celebrate and patronize the small, independently owned businesses that help stimulate local economies across the country.

"I am once again proud to acknowledge the many quality and vital small businesses in every corner of our city and the invaluable contributions they make to our economy and the life of our community," said O'Brien, a former downtown merchant. "I urge both residents and visitors to make every attempt to support West Haven's small businesses on Nov. 25."

O'Brien was the founder and owner of GoldWorks at 499 Campbell Ave., a jewelry repair and retail shop that has operated in the heart of the downtown business district since 1988.

Small Business Saturday was established by American Express in 2010 in response to the most pressing need of small-business owners — more customers — and has served as the ceremonial kickoff to the holiday shopping season for small businesses ever since.

According to AmEx, an estimated 112 million consumers shopped at small businesses on Small Business Saturday last year.

Similar to last year, the Small Business Saturday Coalition, led by Women Impacting Public Policy, a nonpartisan small-business advocate known as WIPP, is rallying mayors nationwide to show their support and encourage their communities to shop small on Saturday.

In recognizing the importance of supporting independent businesses, O'Brien has issued a Small Business Saturday proclamation declaring the special observance in West Haven.

"The City of West Haven, Connecticut, supports our local businesses that create jobs, boost our local economy, and preserve our neighborhoods," the proclamation reads.

Saturday also marks the lighting of the city's Christmas tree on the Green. The Yuletide event attracts hundreds of people each year, many of whom O'Brien hopes take advantage of sales at downtown specialty shops.

Thanksgiving 2017

When Puritans left England in May of 1620, they were unsure what lay ahead for them, knowing they had to endure months at sea making the crossing. They were looking to create a "Shining City on a Hill" filled with believers in the Calvinist Christianity they had come to confess. They hoped when they landed in the New World, they would be able to create the type of civil and religious atmosphere that would make them prosper and, as was the case for all Puritans, get a sign they were, indeed, the elect.

Their brand of Calvinism was "covenant" centered. Throughout the Old Testament, God had made a covenant with men. This "Covenant Theology" prompted them to bind themselves into a civil body under a covenant. That document, signed before they landed to form the Plymouth Colony, was given the name, "The Mayflower Compact."

Under this document, the first colony in Massachusetts Bay was established, and was to be the prototype of other covenants and constitutions that were to follow.

Later, decimated by exposure and famine, many of the signers never made it through the first winter. Those that did declared a day of Thanksgiving, which served as the point of origination for the New England holiday that was to follow well beyond 1620, into the 19th Century.

On this Thanksgiving Day, 2017, we present the Mayflower Compact and list its signers.

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN. We, whose names are underwritten, the Loyal Subjects of our dread Sovereign Lord King James, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. Having undertaken for the Glory of God, and Advancement of the Christian Faith, and the Honour of our King and Country, a Voyage to plant the first Colony in the northern Parts of Virginia; Do by these Presents, solemnly and mutually, in the Presence of God and one another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil Body Politick, for our better Ordering and Preservation, and Furtherance of the Ends aforesaid: And by Virtue hereof do enact, constitute, and frame, such just and equal Laws, Ordinances, Acts, Constitutions, and Officers, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general Good of the Colony; unto which we promise all due Submission and Obedience.

IN WITNESS whereof we have hereunto subscribed our names at *Cape-Cod* the eleventh of November, in the Reign of our Sovereign Lord King *James*, of *England*, *France*, and *Ireland*, the eighteenth, and of *Scotland* the fifty-fourth, *Anno Domini*; 1620.

Trumpism without Trump

Ed Gillespie went from potential vindicator of Trumpism to "cuckservative" in the space of a couple of hours.

The Virginia Republican, campaigning for governor in a treacherous political environment defined by an unpopular president of his own party, ran the only race he reasonably could. He distanced himself from Donald Trump personally, hoping to lessen his losses in heavily Democratic Northern Virginia, while hitting some Trumpian notes on crime and immigration to appeal to the president's base.

Gillespie looked to be gaining fast on Democrat Ralph Northam. Former Trump adviser Steve Bannon, the self-declared keeper of the Trumpist flame, believed Gillespie had cracked the code by fashioning a "Trumpism without Trump."

At least that was the party line until Gillespie lost on Nov. 7. Then he became an establishment tool who had betrayed Trumpism and the president.

The hypocrisy of the Bannon faction aside, the Virginia race revealed a problem with the Trumpism-without-Trump construct -- namely, that it's not really possible.

First, it's not going to be convincing to Trump-haters. Ed Gillespie is not the slightest bit Trumpy. He is earnest, wonky and friendly. When he distanced himself from Trump, it was credible because he hadn't been close to Trump to begin with. He had never met him, and all of Trump's support on

Twitter was unsolicited.

None of this made the slightest difference to voters in Northern Virginia, where Northam racked up margins bigger than Hillary Clinton and Barack Obama. These people weren't showing up to send a message to Gillespie, the otherwise unthreatening candidate who happened to run a barrage of negative ads against Northam (not the first time this has happened in electoral politics).

They were showing up to send a message to Trump, whom they believe is a clear and present danger to all that they hold dear.

So as a sheer political matter, there can be no such thing as Trumpism without Trump, or Anti-Trumpism without Trump, or Anything Else without Trump.

It is difficult enough for a candidate to run away from a conventional president of his own party; it is going be even harder with a president who dominates the media to an extent no other president has, and courts -- nay, enjoys -- radioactive controversies.

In theory, Trumpism without Trump is the right direction for the GOP. It should learn from his populist, nationalistic appeal while avoiding its (and his) excesses.

In practice, Trump himself is going to loom all the larger in the party. He is the main issue in American politics, and he may be the only Republican fit to weather the storm -- he has a proven ability to turn out his voters, he doesn't have to

win elections in nonpresidential years, and his persona works for him, if not for anyone else.

If the worst comes and Republicans lose both houses of Congress next year, Trump's importance will be further magnified as the only Republican standing between Democrats and unified control of the federal government.

In that circumstance, Republican voters would probably be much more willing to embrace Trump without Trumpism, rather than the opposite.



Each year, students that the West Haven Child Development Center, Inc. are asked about Thanksgiving and how the family celebrates it, as well as what they are thankful for during the holiday. The turkeys drawn by some of the students are presented as well as cooking instructions. The following are recipes as seen through the eyes of four- and five-yearolds, related to staff at the WHCDC:

Dominic -- "My turkey comes from the dressing room. My mom and dad cook it in the oven for 1 million days. It's alive, we chase around the house and then it makes a mess and my mom yells at me, I catch it and back in the oven it goes and then it cooks. We have corn, peas, French fries, and mashed potatoes with gravy with our turkey dinner."

Anely -- "Mommy buys my turkey from Target. We bring it home, I wash it with my hands, I cook it in the oven for 19 minutes and then I put it on the stove for another hour and then back in the oven for 2 more hours on high, it's really hot."

Nicholas -- "My turkey comes from Target, I put some salt on it, I put it on my inside kitchen in the oven with peppers, apples, oranges, and regular corn. We eat turkey with Miley and Peter they are my best friends. It takes a long time to cook, like 12 days, we have apple pie too."

Silas -- "I buy it only on a farm. It's really big, it doesn't walk I carry it to Daddy's truck. We bring it in the house, put it in a pan, 'Oh no we wash it first'. You put salt on I t cause it's healthy for your bones not pepper, it's not healthy. We put it in the oven for 50 degrees for 4.30 hours and then it's done and we eat a lot of snacks with it."

Noah -- "My turkey comes from a chicken. I clean it in the car with rain water, then I bring it in the house. Put it in the oven, I cook it for I don't know."

Isaiah -- "My turkey comes from B.J.'s. I wash it with water and then I dry it. I put cheese on it, then frosting. I put it in the oven at 400 degrees for 10 hours and we have potatoes and rice with butter."

Emine -- "I cook my

turkey at the house in the kitchen. I have tea with it. I cook it in the oven at 10 degrees for 6 hours, I have cheese with it."

Bernard -- "My turkey comes from the grocery store, it weighs about 25 pounds. It's heavy, I bring it home. I cook it with Dad. We wash it and clean it with a water pipe. I cook the turkey in the oven with pepper and salt. Stuff with like a brown circle, like sausage maybe, 'I like meat!'. I cook for 5 hours for maybe 5 temperature. We eat turkey with some skin, white meat, peppers, rice, and pumpkin pie and Ice tea."

Berat -- "I get my turkey from the farm, bring it home, I wash it with butter. Then I take it outside and put it on the grill for 5 minutes then I stuff it with apples put it back on the grill for 5 more hours on low. Then my family and I eat turkey with mashed potatoes, corn, and apples."

Euhan -- "No, tuna, no no"

Emma -- "I buy my turkey at the cooking store. I bring it to the sink to wash it. I put it in the bowl, add salt pepper. Put it in the oven to cook for a real long time like 3 minutes and it's done. We have cream with it too."

Ava -- "My turkey comes from my house. My mom washes it at the sink. She cuts it and then puts it in the oven to cook at 31 degrees for 4 hours. We have meatballs and apples then pizza later if I want it."

Naila -- "My turkey comes from the grocery store. It weighs 70 pounds, It's a big one. I put salt in it, I put it in the oven for 18 seconds at 425 degrees then I turn it down to 325 degrees for 6 hours. Take it out eat it with pizza and some milk."

Maylen -- "I get my turkey at the shop, wash it in the tub for 20 minutes. Then I put it in the oven at 200 degrees for 4 hours, then 325 degrees for 2 more hours, now it's done. We have milk, pie, potatoes, carrots, and green beans with it."

Miguel -- "I mom makes my turkey. She washes the turkey on the table. Then she puts butter, salt, and tomatoes on top. She stuffs the turkey





Thanksgiving, 1863

Is there somehow a link between the battle of Gettysburg and our most American of holidays? Indeed there is! "How so?" you might ask. Well, it's like this...

In the midst of all the terrible strife of the Civil War, Abraham Lincoln took the time to set aside a Thursday in November as a national day of thanksgiving. Lincoln had not been a Christian when he became President; nor had he been a Christian when his young son Tad died; but when he went to Gettysburg in July of 1863, and saw the fresh graves of all those thousands of soldiers, he then committed his life to Christ. The knowledge of his conversion makes the following proclamation, made by Lincoln only three months later, all the more touching:

"The year that is drawing towards its close, has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature, that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever watchful providence of Almighty God.

"In the midst of a civil war

of unequaled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign States to invite and to provoke their aggression, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere except in the theatre of military conflict; while that theatre has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union.

"Needful diversions wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense, have not arrested the plough, the shuttle or the ship; the axe has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege and the battle-field; and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom.

"No human counsel hath devised nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

"It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American people. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union." Lincoln

Raffone hangs up his whistle

Rudy Raffone left Westbrook High School to start the soccer program at his alma mater Notre Dame of West Haven in the fall of 1988.

At the time, he had two older sons whom he had coached at Westbrook. He would go on to coach his youngest son and current assistant coach, Scott, at Notre Dame.

Well, from the life comes full circle department, the patriarch of the Green Knight soccer program for the last 29 years walked off the Sage Park soccer pitch last Monday night as Notre Dame head coach for the final time with his senior tri-captain and grandson Joe Antonucci by his side. Raffone had told the team the previous weekend that he would retire from Notre Dame following their state tournament run. The Green Knights fell to Berlin 3-0 on Monday, Nov. 6, marking the end of an era for Notre Dame soccer. "You never want to single out any player or any class but there is a nice symmetry to walking off the field coaching my grandson and this senior class in what turned out to be the final game for all of us. 


Through those times, he never complained and always kept his players as his priority."

with bread, applesauce and carrots. Puts it in the oven for 4 or 5 hours at 400 degrees."

Phoenix -- "I get my turkey from the refrigerator. I smash and stir it. I cook it for a long time." Yezinett -- "I get my turkey from my car.

"It's wide, (y) my turkey is fresh so I wash it with just water. I stuff it with stuffing. I put it in the pan, a big one, cause it's big. We cook it in the oven 300 degrees for 45 minutes. I have mashed potatoes, corn, peas, and carrots, cranberry sauce, and rolls with gravy."

Kaleb -- "I get my turkey from the farm, I chase it around and around to get it, Oh I got it! I bring it home in my car to my dad's room and then dad said bring it to the tub. I wash it in the tub with soap.

"Now it's all clean, it's ready to cook, wait mommy said put it in the kitchen sink to rinse off again, now it's ready. I put it in the ovenator for 12 minutes at 255 degrees then at 325 degrees for 6 hours 10 minutes.

"It's nice and big, we have it in the living room with bread, juice, and carrots." Imane -- "I get my turkey from Shoprite.

"It's 12 pounds, I stuff it with chairs, pizza, and bread. I put it in the oven for 1 day at 200 degrees, it's really hot but not done so I cook it 10 minutes more at 500 degrees. We have turkey, water and 1 bread."

Brianna -- "My turkey runs really fast, but I catch it at Stop and Shop. I bring it home and swish it, then wash it with pepper it runs but I catch it.

"In the oven it goes for a long time like 100 hours. I smell it cooking so I put water on it, then put carrots, potatoes, and green beans in it. Cook for 1 more day then done. It is yummy, eat ice cream too."






