

Rossi charges 'fuzzy math'

Democratic Mayoral candidate Nancy Rossi is charging that Mayor Ed O'Brien is not being truthful with the residents of West Haven when he boasts about the claimed growth in the grand list, which represents the aggregate value of the taxable property in the city. Rossi, who is expected to face O'Brien in a Sept. 12 primary, charged the mayor is misrepresenting the facts, and uses his own numbers to bolster her case.

"Mayor O'Brien sent out a mail piece this week that claimed that he was responsible for an increase of \$150,000,000 in the grand list, and that is abso-

lutely not true" said Rossi, who is a Certified Public Accountant. "The grand list, when the mayor took office in December, 2013, was \$2,822,778,324. The grand list value of taxable properties this fiscal year 2018 is \$2,650,190,218, which is a decrease of \$172,588,106. These numbers are printed in Mayor O'Brien's budgets, but it does not surprise me that the mayor would be creative with the numbers to try to make himself look competent. Using the real numbers would just confirm what a disaster his administrations has been.

She wondered where the differential in the

amounts shown in the city's budget estimates and this new campaign literature originated.

"My question is: where did Mayor O'Brien come up with an increase in the grand list of \$150 million? The actual numbers printed in his budgets show the grand list decreased by \$172.6 million. This is precisely the lack of fiscal responsibility and transparency I'm talking about with this administration. If Mayor O'Brien is taking into account projects not yet completed, or even started, and hoping they will drive up our grand list, his statement is incredibly

36th Festival begins at Grove Park

The 36th annual Savin Rock Festival starts tonight in Old Grove Park with four days of games, food, rides and entertainment.

The event, which pays homage to the legacy of Savin Rock Park, features its second beer garden — complete with live music — since the festival began in 1982.

It kicks off at 5 p.m. with welcoming remarks from Mayor Edward M. O'Brien and the national anthem sung by Caitlin Morrissey.

Santana tribute group Sacred Fire performs at 5:15 p.m., followed by party rock band The RumRunners at 7:15 p.m.

The festival, sponsored by the University of New Haven, is today, 5-9 p.m.; Friday, 5-10 p.m.; and Saturday-Sunday, noon-10 p.m.

Marena Amusements is offering

wristbands for unlimited rides for \$30, 24 tickets for \$24 and 12 tickets for \$10. Otherwise, tickets cost \$1 each.

On Friday, Turbulence, "Connecticut's favorite party band," opens at 5:15 p.m., followed by the History of Rock & Soul Starring Pauly and the Goodfellas at 8:30 p.m.

Local organizations are setting up informational booths, and the food court is serving up the fare — fried seafood, split hot dogs, frozen custard — that catapulted old Savin Rock to notoriety as "the Coney Island of Connecticut."

On Saturday, the West Haven High School dance team and the Top Hat Dance Academy perform at noon and 12:15 p.m., respectively, followed by alternative rock group Clockwork at 1 p.m. and country cover band Boondocks at 2:30 p.m.

Rubber City, powered by a horn section that rivals such bands as Chicago and Tower of Power, goes on at 4 p.m.,

followed by "music that'll move ya" by Ball in the House at 5:30 p.m.

Elements, anchored by a 12-piece band, start at 8:30 p.m., performing a 90-minute set of Earth, Wind & Fire hits, including "September," "Can't Hide Love," "Boogie Wonderland" and "Fantasy."

If it rains, Pauly and the Goodfellas and Elements are set to play in the Car-rigan Intermediate School auditorium, 2 Tetlow St.

On Sunday, Simply Dance is on at noon, followed by classic rock band Stratus at 1 p.m., oldies group Vinnie Carr at 2:30 p.m., pop rock group Sister Funk at 4 p.m. and rhythm and blues band Nu Groove at 5:30 p.m.

At 8 p.m., the festival closes with a two-hour concert by The Wayouts, "Connecticut's freshest and most diversified cover band."

The West Haven High School Band Parents is holding a craft fair Friday,

4-8 p.m.; Saturday, noon-8 p.m.; and Sunday, noon-6 p.m.

To help with expenses, the Savin Rock Festival Committee is selling T-shirts and other merchandise in the hospitality tent. It is also charging non-residents \$10 for parking.

Organizers said the parking revenue and beer and merchandise sales are supporting next year's festival budget.

The cash-only beer garden is pouring three craft, domestic and imported draft beers, as well as a hard cider and a wine. It is serving beer Friday, 5-9 p.m., and Saturday-Sunday, 1-9 p.m.

Attendees are reminded that a city ordinance prohibits domestic animals on certain parks, beaches or recreation areas. The fine is \$50 per offense.

Also, per the Police Department, backpacks, bicycles and glass containers are prohibited, and coolers are subject to search.

That is much of what is being celebrated this weekend. The various tents and stands that offer games, amusements and food will be sponsored by the many organizations that work for the community. It is an abject lesson in what it is to be members of a larger group.

West Haven has always been a community where neighbor helps neighbor. It is a community where we celebrate the successes of our friends and city residents and work to help those who need a boost.

This weekend's festival is a celebration of our city and our people. It is a celebration of where we are located as well. Our shorefront is the envy of many communities up and down the Eastern Seaboard.

Enjoy this Festival 36, it is a celebration of our people and our city. Better things may or may not be on the way, but the spirit that makes West Haven what it is continues.



# China's not ready to lead

The world has had its delusions about China over the years, but none quite as fantastical as the notion of Beijing assuming the mantle of global leadership.

Ever since Donald Trump's election, it has been a journalistic trope to speculate that China is about to take the lead on globalization, climate change and international diplomacy.

Knowing his audience, President Xi Jinping has stoked this tripe by mouthing all the right cliches in front of the right audiences. He gave a speech at Davos heavy on the theme of openness and promised to help lead globalization. "Any attempt to cut off the flow of capital, technologies, products, industries and people between economies," Xi said, summoning his best Thomas Friedman, "is simply not possible."

Somehow, China manages the impossible nonetheless. When it comes to information (which Xi omitted from his litany), China cuts itself off from the rest of the world quite adeptly. According to the pro-democracy group Freedom House, China ranks last in the world in internet freedom, behind Iran and Syria. It blocks Google, YouTube, Facebook and Twitter, and jails people for spreading rumors online, i.e., criticizing government officials.

How about the free flow of capital? China has tight rules against capital outflows. Technology? China is an expert at stealing it, especially from

foreign companies operating in China. Products? Despite its membership in the World Trade Organization, China is robustly mercantilist. Brad Setser of the Council on Foreign Relations points out that imported manufactures as a share of the Chinese economy peaked in 2003 and have been falling since. What Xi calls "win-win cooperation" is the rest of the world opening its markets to China while China refuses to reciprocate.

Xi also toes the Davos line on climate change, to the delight of credulous Westerners. China's leadership consists of making a pledge as part of the Paris accords to reach peak emissions in 2030 -- a goal consistent with the trajectory of its economy anyway -- and planning to make a mint by selling

to the West green technology it has developed through its characteristic unscrupulous means.

There is no doubt that China, the world's second-largest economy, is much more assertive on the international stage than it used to be, but the idea of it as a global leader, or as a responsible power, or even as an admirable country is daft.

It props up the lunatic regime in North Korea because it fears the prospect of a unified, democratic Korea. It is pushing for control of the South China Sea, ignoring a sweeping ruling by an international tribunal against its claims of sovereignty. It is investing massively in its military -- and not to support the cause of global openness.

# Deal for Thompson School is good for city

As I have been out speaking with residents these past few weeks, I have come across a common concern that I feel the need to address.

Many of you have told me that you are puzzled by the decision to sell Thompson School to the Housing Authority for \$10.

I absolutely understand our residents' concern with this at first glance, but there is much more to this deal than that. The building needed massive upgrades which private developers were not interested in.

The Housing Authority is willing to do these upgrades as well as pay \$80,000 a year in property taxes (when they usually pay none) and will be giving preference to the disabled and military veterans.

To elaborate further, the city goes out to a competitive bidding process every single time we sell property.

Thompson School was no exception.

As a matter of fact, we went out to bid on Thompson School several times.

No developers were interested in the property. The one developer which showed some interest pulled out when they realized the massive amount of work that needed to go into the property.

The Thompson School property needs massive upgrades. It is an old building that would need a lot of code upgrades to bring it into compliance for any use, as well as a substantial environmental work.

There is a reason we stopped using it to teach our children. The fact that the property needs such immense work, combined with the fact that it is in a mostly residential neighborhood, meant private developers were not interested in it for commercial or residential use.

This is where the Housing Authority came in.

The Housing Authority came to us with a proposal to renovate Thompson School which would bring it up to code and fix the property's environmental issues.

However, these plans were going to cost at minimum, hundreds of thousands of dollars.

This is why we came to the deal to sell the property at the minimal price.

As I mentioned earlier, as part of this deal the Housing Authority also agreed to pay \$80,000 per year in property taxes when they normally do not pay any taxes because they are a federal agency.

The other key part of this deal is that the Housing Authority will be giving preference to the disabled and military veterans when reviewing

applications for this property.

This deal is good for everyone. The city no longer has to pay to maintain a dilapidated property and will be receiving \$80,000 per year in property taxes as opposed to nothing. The residents of that neighborhood will see the property upgraded and the disabled or those who have served our country will get help they desperately need.

The Housing Authority is able to afford to upgrade the building, pay the city \$80,000 per year, and provide critical services to residents in need due to the low initial sale price.

In 10 years, the city will have made \$800,000 on the property and individuals who need help will have gotten it.

This sounds like a good deal for West Haven to me.

# City, contractors partner to rehab blighted houses

Led by contractor Brian Banning, Mayor Edward M. O'Brien on July 18 toured — and touted — a ranch-style house at 41 Harold St. that Banning recently refurbished, an example of the new partnership between the city and local contractors to improve West Haven's aging housing stock.

Four years ago, the city foreclosed on the single-family home as well as a single-family home at 43 Linden St. that contractor Anthony Cordone has since remodeled, said Frank Fanelli III, a property maintenance/zoning enforcement officer of the Building Department who oversees the foreclosure sale process for West Haven. Both houses were also severely blighted, affecting the quality of life in each neighborhood, Fanelli said.

After assuming ownership of the homes, the city put the properties out to bid, with Banning obtaining the Harold Street bid for \$55,000 and Cordone securing the Linden Street bid for

\$52,000. Banning and Cordone, known for building single-family homes in West Haven, then gutted the houses, giving them an extensive interior and exterior makeover — complete with such modern amenities as granite countertops, stainless steel appliances, hardwood flooring, and vinyl siding and windows.

O'Brien said the upgrades have significantly increased the value of the properties while growing the city's grand list of taxable property. The reconstructed homes, which are listed for sale, join several other city-owned properties that are being renovated by bid-winning contractors, underscoring the importance of the unique partnership, O'Brien said.

"What strikes me is that both builders have put significant dollars into the houses and are selling them for values greater than the highest-price homes in the area," said Planning and Development Commissioner Joseph A. Riccio Jr., who supervises the Building Department. "These contractors show great faith and confidence in West Haven."

misleading and plainly untrue," Rossi said.

In response, the mayor said new development, fostered by his administration, is the source of the new numbers.

"The O'Brien Administration has created millions of dollars in private investment and developments in West Haven. The amount of economic development currently happening in our city is unprecedented. Every single new development and every business that expands in West Haven is good for our Grand List and for the city as a whole," he said.

The mayor then used a campaign talking point he has in the past when discussing his opponent: lack of experience.

"Nancy's negative comments highlight, yet again, her inexperience and her lack of understanding in how municipal budgets work. Anyone can add the private investments projects initiated under the

O'Brien Administration and conclude that \$150 million is a conservative estimate in terms of West Haven's economic growth. Nancy's misleading and divisive interpretation of West Haven's positive economic growth smells of political desperation.

The mayor then pointed to several developments in the city's ongoing economic picture:

\* Allingtown is currently going through a complete revitalization with the completion of The Atwood and two similar projects coming soon. These developments give the center of Allingtown much needed aesthetic upgrades and will be worth nearly \$20 million each;

\* Several smaller businesses have opened across the city in new, taxable developments including O'Reilly Auto Parts, Chipotle, Aspen Dental, and T-Mobile;

\* New development is capped off with the high-end outlet mall The Haven still moving forward. The

Haven is set to add an estimated \$200 million to the Grand List he asserts.

"When we look at businesses that are expanding within West Haven we see another success story. Entone is currently working on an expansion worth over \$12 million, Watson Foods has a major expansion and has added almost 30 jobs, and AAIS Corporation has recently expanded and added nearly 40 jobs. These expansions once again add up to millions and millions of dollars," the mayor said.

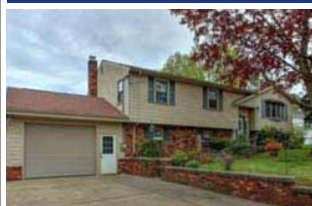
The mayor summed up his statement, saying the city is in need of leadership, not charges and countercharges.

"West Haven does not need unending negativity and constant checking of the rear-view mirror, West Haven needs a leader that looks to build a stronger future for all of us," he said.

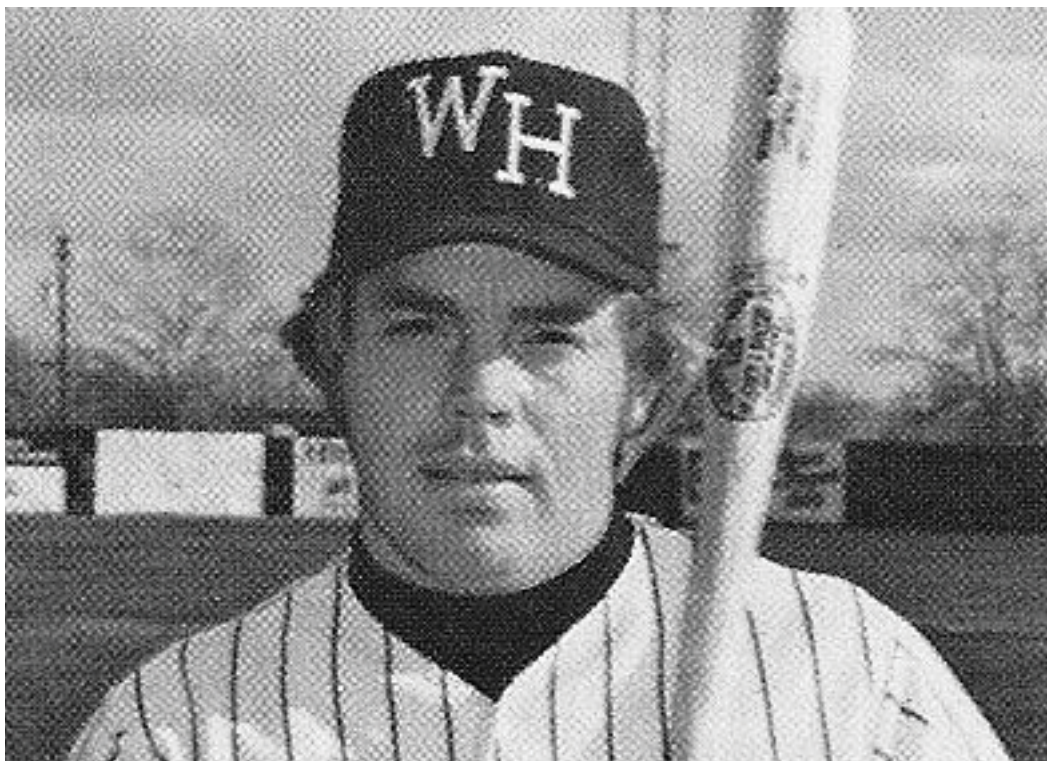

The stands came from the old observation cars built by the New Haven Railroad for the Yale-Harvard Regatta in New London. They were green and always looked like they needed repair, but for 10 years West Haven's Quigley Stadium was home to the Double-A Eastern League. The West Haven Yankees came to town in 1972 after a successful guest appearance the year before. Opening night saw more than 4,000 cram into Quigley. The Yankees left after eight seasons, replaced by the West Haven A's and then the Whitecaps. But for a time West Haven was the stomping ground of several players who made it to the majors.

The guy on the left was a Yankees farmhand, and never quite made it into the big show, but he had an aptitude and knowledge of the game that eventually put Buck Showalter into the Yankees' managerial position. He now is the successful manager of the Baltimore Orioles.

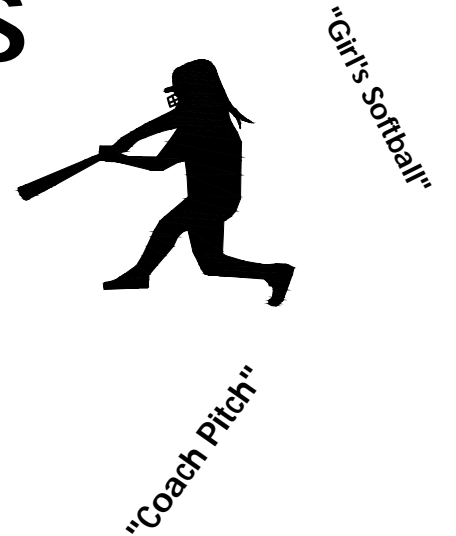
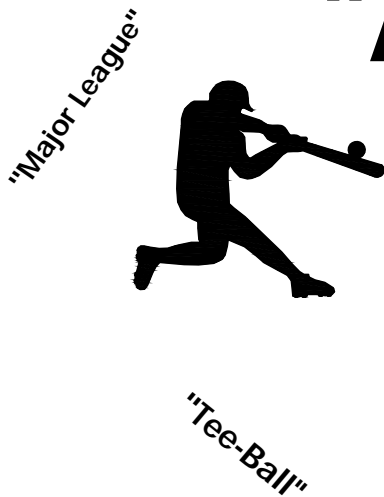

1. R. Kelly runs a sex cult, and;
2. Roger Federer is the greatest champion that tennis, and maybe all of sport, will ever know.

The Federer story is very hard to dispute. Here's a kid who came out of Switzerland as a -- get this -- hothead, and calmed it down to the low burn of just winning the most majors in tennis history. Actually, reading off his list of accomplishments is quite easy because he's literally rewritten the record books.

He's won 19 Grand Slam singles titles. He has been the top-ranked player for 302 weeks, 237 consecutive -- both records. He has a habit of winning tournaments without dropping a set. He bookends careers. Remember Lleyton Hewitt and Pete Sampras? Federer ended their reigns. Remember Andy Roddick? Ditto. Now he's 35 and he's still running the table, beating guys like Rafa Nadal with

stunning acumen.

Even Deadspin writes nice things about him. One of its recent columns pointed out how Federer endorses products that are way, way out of most people's pay grade -- Rolex, Mercedes-Benz, Credit-Suisse -- and yet the guy remains likable.

It's true. He is a true sportsman, so it's hard for anyone who likes sports to really root against him. He has a beautiful wife named Mirka, and whenever they cut to her in the box you feel yourself saying "good for you, Roger," and you don't quite know why. He has -- get this -- not one, but TWO sets of identical twins with her. Who does that? Roger Federer does, that's who.

I've always maintained that tennis is one of the least understood and underappreciated sports. It's always suffered from an image problem, that of the stuffy, pinky-up, private-club set, when in reality, outside of boxing and MMA, it

is the only major sport where you take somebody on one on one (unless it's doubles or mixed doubles, but you get the point).

A tennis player carries his or her own bags, argues their own calls, has nowhere to hide when they need to collect themselves. (A bathroom break is met with howls of derision.)

And while guys like John McEnroe have done remarkable jobs of remaining relevant, we haven't really met up with a tennis champion quite like Federer. One imagines that Bjorn Borg, had he not suddenly retired at the top of his game, would have approached his greatness, but he did not. Instead, we, as viewers, have been given the real privilege of watching what some are calling a renaissance of Roger. His stunning win at Wimbledon would seem to be a bookend to his career.

Only it's not. Federer is still in the game, still winning, still

making it look easy, still doing it with class and style. Of all the champions we've witnessed over the years -- including Michael Jordan -- no-

body has put on a show like this guy has.

# Historian's corner



**St. Lawrence Church**

 It was only a mile from home to St. Lawrence Church, but Michael Keeney remembers it as sometimes feeling like much, much more. His mother would lead her six children on

foot to Mass in every kind of weather, and afterwards, lead them home again, this time by way of Wolfe's Bakery. Michael also remembers shaking in his boots while he waited to make his confession to Father Heller; sometimes after hearing young Michael's confes-

sion, Father Heller would yell at him, for such is sometimes the way with boys. No doubt, many others can recall similar memories of Mass and confession.

But how did it all start? Well, it's like this...  
 It started with people. And it

started in the 1880s. They had fled the poverty of Europe, and arrived in America seeking opportunity, safety, freedom and liberty, and a place to worship as they chose.

They came with the Irish Diaspora; and they came from the troubles of Germany, and from the poverty of Italy, and elsewhere. And they arrived in the ports of New York and Boston. There, they learned of job opportunities in the growing city of New Haven, where they could find work making shirts, firearms, horse-carriages, buckles, ships, hardware, clocks, and so many other things in the multitude of factories of that era.

And homes and apartments could be found in the nearby community of West Haven, where factory workers could be transported to and from their jobs by way of horse-drawn streetcars.

However, many of these new arrivals were dismayed to discover that there was no convenient house of worship, within which they could follow their Roman Catholic traditions. Indeed, the nearest churches were in New Haven: St. John's Church on Davenport Avenue, and Sacred Heart Church on Columbus Avenue.

And so it was that in April of 1886, the first Mass was celebrated in the Thompson Building—today known as the Atschuler Building—at Campbell Avenue and Main Street.

Later on that year, the cornerstone was laid for the first edifice of St. Lawrence Church; it

was a simple wooden structure, located on Union Avenue, and it served the community's Roman Catholic population until 1903, when the present St. Lawrence Church was opened for worship. At that time, the Parish numbered about 200 people.

The church was named for St. Lawrence, martyred Roman deacon, who when ordered to turn over his church's riches to the Prefect of Rome, presented the prefect with the church's poor, the sick, the blind and the suffering, telling him "these are the church's riches." For this, he was summarily put to death.

The growth of the summer population in the Old Savin Rock area made it necessary to establish the St. Lawrence Chapel. The Chapel was located at the corner of Summer Street and Savin Avenue, and the first Mass was celebrated there in 1910. By 1965, it had become a separate parish, St. John Vianney, with the Rev. Joseph Reynolds as its pastor.

Today, St. Lawrence Church is active in the community, and regularly supports a group of committees that address a variety of church-related topics. Mass is held on Saturdays at 4:00 PM and on Sundays at 8:00 and 10:30 AM.

After many years at St. Lawrence Church, Father Jette has recently departed for another calling in another parish. His parting words were, "I am grateful to God for my years in West Haven and for all the wonderful people I have come to know here."
