A ball thrown by Ryan Walsh, 7, of West Haven, is about to hit the bull'seye and drop Mayor Edward M. O'Brien into the dunk tank Saturday on the Green during the third annual WestFest celebration, a community event aimed at bringing the city and University of New Haven closer. WestFest was co-sponsored by the UNH Mayor's Advisory Commission, O'Brien's office, UNH, Watson Inc. and the West Haven Emergency Assistance Task Force to showcase what the city has to offer culturally. Restaurants and food trucks dished up native eats and sweets, while businesses and organizations

handed out informational materials. The seven-hour festival featured activities from face painting and trivia contests to performances by the Top Hat Dance Academy and a pie-eating contest sponsored by Louise's Homemade Food & Baked Goods. It included an inflatable bounce house and obstacle course. Also participating were the local bands Ian Biggs, Quiet Giant, and The Sulls. The UNH advisory commission, a student-appointed task force formed in March 2015, meets regularly with O'Brien and other City Hall officials to improve relations between the city and UNH.

# Dem foes continue to battle

campaign before their primary on Tuesday, the two Democrats looking for party nod for mayor continued to spar over issues. The controversial TOD or Transit-Oriented Development program pushed by the Malloy administration was the first point of contention this week.

Democratic challenger Nancy Rossi accused Mayor Edward O'Brien's of having a plan for affordable or "low income" housing around the train station. This was something she called "short-sighted and irresponsible." The opponent is ill-informed and the city has no such plan in the works.

"The O'Brien administration funded a plan that illustrated building after building of affordable housing in the area surrounding the train station, also known as the Transit Oriented District (TOD)," Rossi said in a campaign release this

'West Haven has one of the nicest train stations on the Metro-North line and has so much potential. To build affordable housing in that area would be a monumental mistion near I-95 makes it attractive to commercial investors if marketed properly. We need to aggressively market the area to attract offices, business, restaurants, and shops," she the allegation, saying Rossi residents. said. We want to make this area an exciting place to live, shop, and visit," he said. "This is achieved through mixed-use developments, similar to what we are seeing happen in the heart of Allingtown. Mixed-use is essentially developing an area with both residential and commercial components so new businesses have built-in clientele. This is the model that is finding success across the country."

O'Brien said the city's plan has been looked at by various organizations and received high praise.

"This model is meant to attract young professionals who prefer to commute via rail and want to live in a walkable area. They want to be able to walk to the train station, the grocery store, and to local businesses, and the train station

area is perfect for this. These are typically not families with children and the residential components to these developments are commonly sold at or even above regular market value," he said. "Having a well-planned mixed-use area is the key to attracting developers and new businesses. As matter of fact, our TOD plan has received praise from national organizations such as The Kauffman Foundation and the Mayor's Institute on City Design. I will say it again: neither low-income nor affordable housing is included in the current TOD plan."

Meanwhile, Rossi charged the mayor with ducking a requested radio debate in the final days of the campaign.

Rossi said a local radio host offered to have a debate between the two candidates on his program. She accepted, but the O'Brien campaign declined.

"I was really looking forward to debating Mayor O'Brien because we have issues that are important and need to be discussed -- people want to know what our plans are. We currently have a \$14.5 million budget hole under the Governor's Executive Order #58 and as a taxpayer I want to know how the Mayor is going to handle it. He has not instituted a spending or hiring freeze and the problem is not going away by itself," she said.

O'Brien's campaign responded, saying the entire invitation was represented as something other than a debate.

"First and foremost, when I received the request to appear on the radio show it was framed as an interview, not a debate. Unfortunately we received this invitation last minute and were not able to fit it into the schedule," the mayor

He said he was a bit perplexed by the matter.

"Regarding Nancy's request for a debate, I'm confused by her decision to wait until the week before the primary to ask for one, as well as her decision to make this request in the press rather than calling me or my campaign directly. Nancy knows that as the mayor I have a very busy schedule and would not be able to attend this event with such short notice," he said. "The only reason she is doing this one week before the primary and in the press is to get her name in the paper one more time before Election Day."

Polls open 6 a.m. Tuesday and will be open until 8 p.m. Both the endorsed slate under O'Brien and the challenge slate by Rossi have every council and officers' seat filled. Many expect a close race.

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# Primary battle helps voters sift issues for general ballot Next week's Democratic Party primary is important in two

ways. It will determine the final slate the city's Democratic Party will present to the voters come November, but it also begins the march toward that general election. How the primary shakes out remains to be seen, and the impact of it on the slate of the city's majority party still to be felt. But it will finalize who will run and under what banner.

Once next Tuesday's balloting is completed, the taxpayers and voters of the city will have the opportunity to sift through the issues that face us, and determine, come two months from now, who will sit in the third-floor office of the mayor for the next two years.

The run up to the primary has already brought one issues to light that voters are going to have to discern. That is the city's financial status - and ongoing problem - and the use of bonding to pay off the longstanding operational deficit as well as funding the reconstruction of West Haven High School.

Other issues have really paled in comparison mostly because of the ongoing budget battle in Hartford. Two months into Fiscal Year 2018, the General Assembly has failed to agree on funding the budget. We are working under Gov. Dannel Malloy's executive orders. This is the variable that can, in the long run, determine what happens in November. The final budget and its apportionment of state funds to municipalities can heavily impact the city and its ability to pay its bills.

While the O'Brien administration is confident it will receive all the funding it was promised to the detriment of some other more affluent towns, until the budget standoff is resolved nothing is certain.

This is the most pressing issue, but taxpayers have to pay attention to other issues that are related. Neighborhood blight has been a problem in this city for many years, primarily because of the number of absentee landlords that own residences. Related to that is the state's plan to shoehorn socalled "affordable housing" into areas surrounding transportation hubs like the train station. In cities like West Haven, we have a glut of housing stock, and the state's plan will make that glut worse not better. Both candidates have said they oppose such plans.

The rebuilding of West Haven High School puts education into the forefront of many people's minds. Nothing a city does is more important than the education of our young people. West Haven's schools have been behind in many measurable areas, and not all of them are related to money. The "soft bigotry of low expectations" is found among some who have directorial authority. Ideas like getting rid of Shakespeare and transitioning to graphic novels is an indictment of our students' ability to read and comprehend. It's an indictment of leadership, not teaching.

In the coming weeks, the voters will be offered two or three candidates. The winner of the Democratic runoff, the Republican candidate, David Riccio, current councilman-at-large, and possibly a candidate under the "A Better Choice" Party that was registered with the Secretary of State's office.

Now is the time for voters to take notice. Over the next several weeks the candidates will offer statements and faceoff in debates. The Voice will do a comprehensive review and publishing of issues and issue statements, thus offering voters the information they need to make an informed decision.

We have approximately eight weeks until the general election. The task of every voter, no matter what the stripe, is to look at the issues and the candidates' responses to those issues then make a decision. Too often, people complain about the way things are run or the decisions made, yet they refuse to use their franchise on Election Day.

We urge our readership to weigh the issues and the candidates, and then make a sober and informed decision come November.

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No excuse for thuggery

One of the least safe places to be in Berkeley, California, is in the vicinity of someone holding a "No Hate" sign.

So-called anti-fascist, or antifa, activists bearing shields emblazoned with those words assaulted any of the handful of beleaguered Trump supporters they could get their hands on at a small political rally over the weekend. All in the cause, mind you, of demonstrating their supposed opposition to hatefulness.

Too many people were willing to perfume antifa in the wake of Charlottesville, where it clashed with Nazi thugs who caused, and deserved, a wave of national revulsion. But Berkeley demonstrates once again the true nature of this left-wing movement, which is thuggish in its tactics and totalitarian in its sensibility. Anyone who at this point makes excuses for antifa -- or worse, justifies it -- is participating in its moral rot.

The antifa goons showed up in force at Berkeley at what had been a small "anti-Marxist" rally of Trump supporters at a public park. Antifa wore its usual fascistic garb of black masks and body armor. They overwhelmed the police who had been trying to maintain order and, holding aloft smoke-spewing flares, chanted, "Whose park? Our park!"

They then treated suspected Trump supporters with all the decorousness of torchwielding medieval villagers who believed they had stumbled upon a witch. A leader of a pro-Trump group had to run from a mob that pepper-

was taken into police custody for his own protection. The targets weren't Nazis bearing Nazi regalia, but supporters of the duly-elected president of the United States.

Antifa benefited enormously from the horrific events in Charlottesville. It became Nazis versus the people standing up to the Nazis, and in that formulation the people standing up to the Nazis always win. There can be no moral equivalence, we were told, between Nazis and their opponents. But that depends on who the opponents are -- there is a vast difference between peaceful counterprotesters and violent thugs, even if they are marching on the same side.

Bully-boy fascists spoiling for a fight and black-clad leftists looking to beat them up

They both thrill to violence and benefit from the attention that comes from it. They both reject civility and the rule of law that make a democratic society possible. They both are profoundly illiberal.

All this was lost in the reaction to Charlottesville. Liberal commentators spread memes comparing antifa to American GIs who stormed the beaches at Normandy. The comparison would be apt if the 1st Infantry Division got together to spend an afternoon beating up fellow Americans rather than giving its last measure of devotion to breaching Hitler's Atlantic Wall.

There will always be goons who enjoy breaking things and hurting people. The real scandal is that otherwise re-

spectable people are willing to look the other way or explain away the violence, so long as its perpetrators are on their side.


They are just as cowardly as the mask-wearing

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
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# City to mark 9/11 with annual rites

West Haven will observe the 16th anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on 9/11 with a flag-raising ceremony at 6:30 p.m. at the Bradley Point Park flagpole, followed by a candlelight vigil at the city's 9/11 memorial.

The service will begin with a presentation of the colors by the West Haven Police Color Guard and the flag-raising by the West Haven Fire Department Honor Guard and the New Haven County Firefighters Emerald Society Pipes and Drums.

The flag-raising will honor the memory of the nearly 3,000 people who were killed in the attacks.

Remarks from dignitaries, including Mayor Edward M. O'Brien, will follow. At 7 p.m., the candlelight vigil will take place at the Richard S. Gabrielle Sept. 11 memorial on the beach walk next to the Savin Rock Conference Center, 6 Rock St.

Members of the Rotary Club will distribute candles and programs.

Gabrielle was West Haven's lone victim of the attack on the twin towers in New York's World Trade Center complex. An insurance broker at Aon Corp., Gabrielle, 50, was last seen on the south tower's 78th floor.

Declared Patriot Day by Congress in

2002, the city will fly flags at half-staff in recognition of the national day of remembrance.

The vigil will feature taps played by former West Shore Fire Department Lt. Kevin McKeon and a Celtic folk performance by Irish singer-songwriter Liz McNicholl, including the song "The Bravest," a tribute to the heroes of 9/11.

Nora Mullins and Grace Kelly Nowak will sing the national anthem and "God Bless America," respectively.

# Recyclable electronic items collected Sept. 30

Residents can drop off electronic recyclables — typically anything that contains a circuit board or needs a battery — from 8 a.m.-noon Sept. 30 at the highway maintenance garage, 1 Collis St.

Anything that has refrigerant, including air conditioners and dehumidifiers, is not accepted. Those items are considered white goods, and residents are asked to put them out for pickup on their weekly curbside collection days.

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## Parks a priority, says Rossi

Democratic Mayoral Candidate Nancy Rossi announced that, if elected mayor, she will make the maintaining and improving of city parks and athletic facilities a priority.

Rossi will challenge incumbent Mayor Ed O'Brien in the democratic primary to be held on Sept. 12.

"We need to bring a sense of pride back to our community. Proper maintenance and improving our parks and other natural resources will be a top priority for my administration. West Haven is in such a fiscal mess that creating a culture of fiscal responsibility and balanced budgets has to be the first priority, however better maintaining and improving the parks and athletic facilities throughout West Haven, will be among the other top priorities of my administration," she said.

"I have visited many of the parks and fields in the city and am astounded by some of their condition. Basketball nets are ripped or missing, there are cracks in the tennis and basketball courts, there's overgrown vegetation, there are playing surfaces that are unattended, and there is litter," she said.

She indicated she would attempt to put more effort in park maintenance if elected.


"We need to put resources into our parks and the athletic fields that are used by our youth and adult leagues. This is by no means a reflection on our park maintenance personnel, but rather the lack of resources that are being made available to them. We are not talking about items or projects that will cost a lot of money but we really need prioritize the upkeep of our assets so our residents can enjoy a clean and safe environment. There is no reason why every park and field in the city, whether it is located in Allingtown, the center of town or West Shore should not be meticulously maintained and safe," she said.

"I look forward to working with our Department of Public Works and Park maintenance staff to evaluate our parks and athletic fields and prepare a plan that will repair, improve and maintain all our parks," she said.


She indicated that concern for safety while using the parks should not be on the minds of residents.

"We want our families and visitors to be able to enjoy all our natural resources, and to know that when their children go to play a sport, that the facility is well-maintained, clean and, most importantly, safe." Rossi concluded.

#### City collecting supplies for Hurricane Harvey relief effort

The city and the West Haven Fire Department, together with the U.S. Conference of Mayors, are collecting toiletries, cleaning supplies and diapers for the victims of Hurricane Harvey in Houston, Mayor Edward M. O'Brien announced.

O'Brien is calling on all West Haveners to aid the hurricane relief effort by dropping off items from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. today and Friday at the sally port in the parking lot of City Hall, 355 Main St.

It was ten wins without a loss, then just like that, the season was over. Such was the story for the 2016 West Haven football team, experiencing a gut-wrenching loss to Ridgefield in the quarterfinals of the state playoffs last year.

What was supposed to be a run to the championship turned into a long walk back to the locker room of West Haven High after the secondseeded Westies watched as seventh-seeded Ridgefield scored 21 unanswered points, including 14 in the second half, to upset the Westies in last season's quarterfinals at Ken Strong Stadium.

Ten months have passed and time sometimes has a way of healing wounds. Whether that is the case for the 2017 Westies remains to be seen.

"Sure, it is motivation." West Haven coach Rich Boshea said of last season's early ouster. "We want to get to the playoffs this year. In all honesty, they gave me everything they had last year. We were just worn out towards the end of the season last year. It was unfortunate the way it ended. That's the story of the league. Two years earlier, Shelton had a great team and they suffered four broken legs. We put so much emotion into Thanksgiving Day. I have no complaints. Last year, they fought and did everything we asked them to do."

The Westies, who won the Southern Connecticut Conference Division I title last season, have plenty to look forward to, but if they are to make a run at another postseason bid, they will need big performances in key places. Replacing graduated quarterback Tim McCarthy, running back Anthony Godfrey, lineman Byron Dickens, receiver Sheilan Velazquez and kicker Jose Conde, to name a few, will be difficult.

Dickens, an All-Area and All-State selection, anchored a line which accumulated 4,092 total yards, including 3,316 on the ground. Last year's West Haven offense rushed for 43 touchdowns.

Anthony Godfrey, another All-Area and All-State selection, rushed for 1,712 yards and 22 touchdowns, while pulling in five touchdown receptions. Godfrey finished his senior campaign with 1,945 total yards.

Leading the way for the 2017 Westies will be senior tri-captains Mekhi Geter, Kyle Godfrey, and Mike Charlton.

Each will play on both sides of the ball as Geter is an offensive tackle and defensive end, Godfrey will lead the rushing attack as the featured running back, and Charlton is a fullback and linebacker.

"I have liked the way the defense has improved," Boshea said. "I also like the way Kyle (Godfrey) has run the ball. Chris Chance is also running

Seniors Chris Chance, Jimmy Lanziero and A.J. Williams will all play key roles as well as Chance will line up at running back and linebacker, Lanziero is an offensive guard and nose guard, and Williams is an offensive tackle and defensive

"We need to get our offense going," Boshea said. "We have to be able to run the ball well and play good defense. That sounds like simple terms, but that is exactly what we need to

The Westies will get an added boost as they look to replace the graduated McCarthy behind center. Senior Jake at prep school to start as the team's quarterback. Conlan will also replace the steady Conde as the team's kicker.

Conlan returns from a stint running back and linebacker, senior Doug Johnson will be a key player at linebacker, while senior Latrell Best is a running back and safety. Senior Jordan

Most people thought it would be a joke of a fight, but by the end of round two, half of the world -- most of them watching pirated broadcasts if they weren't willing to pony

bar or casino ballroom -- was already in shock: Conor Mc-Gregor had decisively taken the first two rounds of the "Money" fight against Floyd Mayweather.

**Besides** the ridiculous

up \$60 to \$100 to watch it in a amount of money, there was a celebrational belt made of crocodile leather, 3.3 pounds of 24-karat gold, 3,360 diamonds, 600 sapphires and 160 emeralds. But make no mistake, with the pride of boxing on the line, the greatest defensive boxer of all-time was getting tagged repeatedly and the crowd was going nuts. Whether or not McGregor won the fight, his legend was already secure.

McGregor walked into the ring draped in an Irish flag. Mayweather entered like he was planning on robbing a 7-11, wearing a ski mask, but by round three it was Mc-Gregor acting like a thug, hammer punching Mayweather illegally in every clinch. Round three would have gone to McGregor, but a real judge should have deducted a point. By round four, Mayweather was hip to the game, smashing his forearm against Mc-Gregor's nose and face whenever he tried to rough him up in the clinch.

Mayweather had been in situations like this before, most notably against the much harder-hitting Zab Judah. Judah won the first three rounds until Mayweather steadily picked him apart, winning by a stoppage in the 11th after a riot in round 10.

And it was happening here. McGregor's game plan was to come out and hit Flovd hard and knock him out within four rounds. He executed that plan, except Floyd took his best shots, and then swam him out to the deep water, walked him down and knocked him out. He is 50-0, arguably the best fighter of all time considering the totality of his career.

Make no mistake, the fight should have been stopped. If one of Mayweather's uppercuts had landed, McGregor's career would have been in serious jeopardy. McGregor didn't look like the kind of champion to go down.

"I've been strangled on live TV and came back, so I would have liked him to have let it go," McGregor said after the fight. "I thought we were close. It was fatigue. The referee could have let it keep going, let the man put me down."

Mayweather was gracious in victory, but reminded everyone of the stakes.

"Boxing's reputation was on the line," Mayweather said. "I chose the right dance partner. Conor McGregor, you are a hell of a champion.'

That was the very definition of a prizefight, and the ultimate winners were, finally, the fans.

## Mayor defends administration's fiscal record, heading to vote

As we approach primary day here in West Haven, I wanted to take this final opportunity to talk about an issue that I know is of concern to all of our residents: our city finances. Unfortunately, there has been quite a bit of misin-

formation spread on this subject in the past and I hope to set the record straight.

My administration inherited a total deficit of over \$16 million which has been accumulating since 2005. This is the total of all governmental funds including the General Fund, the sewer fund, the Allingtown Fire Department, and a variety of other funds. One of the first things we decided to do when I took office was to consolidate a large portion of these funds into the General Fund. We thought this would increase transparency and give us a clearer picture of the issues we faced. This is also the reason the General Fund alone appears larger than before.

Since we took office, we have taken multiple steps to stabilize the city's finances and work towards eliminating the deficit. Keeping spending under control proved to be a challenge as we found major healthcare expenditures that were swept under the rug by the previous administration along with increased worker's compensation claims and unexpected special education costs. To counteract these costs, we asked all department heads to institute a 5 percent budget cut, multiple positions are being left unfilled, and we have negotiated new healthcare plans and new energy contracts resulting in the city saving millions of dollars.

On top of fighting to stabilize our budget and spending, we knew we needed to take other important steps to improve our financial situation going forward. The first of these was to refinance by issuing deficit bonds and eliminate our General Fund deficit. Issuing deficit bonds allows some breathing room for our city finances and improves the city's cash flow. Would you rather pay off your debt in small, scheduled monthly payments, or constantly have your checking account be negative? To me, this answer is clear. We need to have our head above water to make any significant progress. The previous City Council and my opponent rejected this plan, however, our current City Council understood the necessity for this and passed it earlier this year.

In addition to passing this refinancing package, I also

encouraged our City Council to pass and implement a balanced budget ordinance which they have done. This forces the Council to address any deficits in the next fiscal year's budget to avoid deficits accumulating which has been the problem in the past. It also requires the Finance Director to report to the City Council quarterly instead of annually which increases transparency and allows issues to be detected and dealt with earlier.

The steps we've taken to stabilize spending, eliminate the deficit, and prevent deficits from accumulating in the future are all part of the foundation for West Haven's financial recovery.

The next thing we need to do is grow our city through economic development and we are already having great success in this area. At this time our city needs strong, consistent leadership to ensure the positive steps we have taken continue.

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

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

## Historian's corner

### By Dan Shine



In 1912, Union School was listed as West Haven High School. Until 1926 when a new school was built on Main Street, high school classes were in a section of the Center Street campus.

#### West Haven, 1912

(Taken from an article in The New Haven Register, December 22, 1912, while West Haven was still a borough of Orange.)

OPEN COUNTRY OF A FEW YEARS AGO NOW DOTTED WITH HANDSOME COTTAGES—FACTORIES ARE SEEKING SITES WITHIN TOWN'S CONFINES—BIG INCREASE IN GRAND LIST SINCE YEAR 1825.

West Haven and the town of Orange, according to the last general assembly, have grown in strides hardly believable to the average person not in touch with the affairs of that progressive community. Building boom after building boom has struck the town, or rather one continuous building boom has been in progress

for the past five years. Plots of land of the wildest kind: woodland swamps, orchards and level land have been put into shape to permit the building of homes and factories.

Orange now boasts of seven good-sized factories, not to mention the small-sized garage and workshops which have sprung up in suitable places, giving an added zest to the industrial life of the town. It is of course primarily a residential town and suburb of New Haven in which live many workers of New Haven, the kind who like to retire to a semi-country life when at lei-

It is ideally situated within thirty minutes of New Haven, bordering on the Sound, giving superb bathing facilities and with unlimited woodland within the confines for the nature lover, it has of course grown with rapid strides.

Savin Rock has also been a source for the attraction of many settlers in Orange, in fact this part of the town has grown up fast, if not faster than the other parts. At one time Savin Rock was only inhabited in winter by a few residents, but as time when on a few of the more venture-some summer residents decided to live at the Rock all year 'round, until now a large winter colony makes Savin Rock an all year 'round residence.

GROWTH AT THE SHORE

Although it is hard to realize, the section of the town from Blohm Street to the shore was used not so many years ago as the camping place for the militia. That was in the days of the horse car, and the section was a deserted plain covered with low shrubbery. All the way from the Savin Rock Ball Grounds to the original Savin Rock was a grape vineyard, while at the center of the town where the town hall is now, great pine trees bent and sighed before the wind. Where the Masonic Temple on Center Street now stands, a grape vineyard was also situ ated, while for blocks around no houses were in evidence. In the horse car days, the fare to New Haven was one cent, compared to the five cents that commuters must now pay.

Many fine buildings have been erected. The new Harugari Hall, Masonic Temple, Christ Church, the Woods Block, the Hall Organ Company, the Washington School, and the Saw Shop, which was erected immediately after the old one burned to the ground, number among the commercial, religious, and fraternal buildings which have been erected of late, most of them in the past year.

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




