## Music highlights 'Rock & Stroll'

The West Haven Community House is expanding its annual "Family Fun Walk" to include a music festival. Rock & Stroll is an all-day event beginning with a two-mile stroll on the historic Savin Rock Boardwalk.

Walk registration is at 9:30 with a 10:30 walk kick-off. There is a \$25 fee to participate in the walk, which includes a t-shirt and features a variety of fun activities along the route where participants receive free chances to be entered in a raffle.

"This walk is unique in that there are about a dozen fun activity stations along the route including limbo, three-legged race, hopscotch, bowling, wheelchair obstacle course and more," said Patty Stevens, Community House executive director. "At the end of the walk, each participant turns in their earned raffle tickets for a chance to win some great prizes, which include a bicycle, guitar, toys, games, theater tickets, gift cards, and more. The stations will be staffed by more than 60 volunteers from University of New Haven's Men's and Women's Track and Field teams.

The walk is followed by a music festival in collaboration with organizers John McCarthy of Rock House School of Music & Johnny Ziada of Z's Corner Cafe.

"We are excited to add music to our established fall fundraising event in order to showcase and promote Teach Kids

Music (TKM) programs that have been intertwined with the Community House's programs for preschoolers and school age children," Stevens said.

The Community House hosts monthly TKM Youth Open Mic Nights where young musicians and singers, 19 and under, play and listen to music and get the opportunity to interact with other musicians. The open mic nights play an important role in helping children express themselves in a safe, creative atmosphere. In addition to performing, many local children come to watch and get inspired creating a positive community experience. Parents are always welcome to come and get involved. The next open mic night will be on Sept. 28.

"As the owner of Rock House School of Music and founder of TeachKidsMusic.org (TKM), my main mission is to help children learn music. By providing instruments and instruction, we are able to guide these kids to be creative and start a lifelong music journey," said John McCarthy, founder of Rock House School of Music and the TKM. "Working with the West Haven Community House has been a pleasure. They are forward-thinking when it comes to providing music instruction to young children. The Rock House Ukulele course and Clap, Tap and Sing program is used as part of their program".

begins at noon on the lawn of the Savin Rock Conference Center, is free and open to the public and ends at 7. People are encouraged to bring blankets or chairs and sit back and enjoy the music featuring more than a dozen bands

## WestFest celebrates town and gown

An event hoping to foster better relations between the University of New Haven and the city has its fourth edition this weekend.

WestFest 2018, a community festival aimed at bringing the West Haven and UNH communities closer, will feature food, music and inflatables for the fourth year. The free event is 11 a.m.-6 p.m. Saturday on the West Haven Green. The rain date is Sunday.

WestFest is co-sponsored by the UNH Mayor's Advisory Commission, UNH, Watson Inc., Casa Bianca Pizza, Notre Dame High School of West Haven, Wells Fargo and USAlliance Financial.

Festival proceeds will benefit the West Haven Emergency Assistance Task Force, West Haven's food pantry. Watson and WHEAT will hold a food drive during the event. People are asked to bring nonperishable items.

WestFest is again collaborating with the 5K Unity Run, sponsored by the UNH cross-country and track teams. The 10 a.m. run will start and finish at Maxcy Hall on the university's main campus, 300 Boston Post Road.

After the run, transportation will be provided to WestFest on the Green, where attendees can participate in the 5K Unity Run's powdered paint party and enjoy the family-friendly festivities. Food trucks from Cappetta's Italian Imports & Pizza, Louise's Homemade Food & Baked Goods, The Colombian Hot Dog and Ted's Steamed Burgers will serve up local dishes. Other participating businesses will include Watson, WHEAT, crafters, high school clubs, a face painter and a henna artist.

All-day entertainment will showcase live music by local bands, such as The Cobalt Rhythm Kings,

Arcadia and Him or Her. There will also be the traditional WestFest pie-eating contest, sponsored by Louise's, as well as a dunk tank where attendees can dunk state Reps. Michael A. DiMassa (D-116) and Dorinda Borer (D-115), and Councilman Sean P. Ronan, D-9, along with UNH professors and members of the university's Undergraduate Student Government Association's executive board.

Many UNH clubs and organizations, including fraternities, sororities, international groups and club sports, will take part in the seven-hour event, highlighting their community involvement efforts.

Official WestFest T-shirts will be sold. WestFest, open to the public, will offer free on-street parking around the Green and on Campbell Avenue, as well as in municipal lots off Main Street, Savin Avenue and Curtiss Place.

# Boot Program resumes on Monday

City residents who are delinquent on their taxes are urged to pay their overdue taxes as soon as possible.

The "boot" program resumes Monday, and those who are delinquent on their motor vehicle taxes risk their vehicles being immobilized with a

wheel-locking boot.

TaxServ Capital Services LLC of Hartford is the city's vendor that administers the program in cooperation with Vioalert Systems LLC of West Haven.

A vehicle-mounted ID system that is part of the boot program uses an infrared li-

cence plate scanner to target tax scofflaws. Vehicles are released of the boot once their owners pay all delinquent taxes and the boot fee.

Additionally, delinquent personal property taxes for business owners who have not paid their taxes are being

turned over for collection, and notices on delinquent real estate and sewer bills are being mailed the first week in September.


Taxpayers can check if they owe any back taxes and pay online by going to [www.cityofwesthaven.com](http://www.cityofwesthaven.com) and clicking on Tax Collector under the Government heading. They can also pay in person in the tax office on the first floor

of City Hall, 355 Main St.

Tax Collector Dorothy Chambrelli has launched an aggressive campaign for collecting taxes.

"Please do not ignore your taxes; everyone must do their part," Chambrelli said. "Your failure to pay negatively affects the entire city."

Taxes accrue additional interest on the first day of each month.

In last week's Gripe Vine, the mayor indicated, "Your readers would be best served if their first course of action is to contact the department e.g. public works, police, building, blight, etc. that is trained and authorized to manage their particular issue."

Mayor Rossi also indicated that there are 13 Councilpersons that can be contacted. To reach these representatives and gather their email addresses, you can go to the city's website at [www.cityofwesthaven.com/183/City-Council](http://www.cityofwesthaven.com/183/City-Council).

To clarify the griper's dilemma", here's a short, clear to explanation for my readers:

Got a gripe? You have several choices:

OK. Here we go. It is extremely important that my readers who submitted gripes in the past three weeks notify me if your complaints have been corrected or not. Your responses will determine if the mayor's suggestions for the City Council persons efforts to solve complaints have

Meanwhile, I will continue to accept your gripes and comments and do my best to have them corrected. As soon as I hear from the mayor, your gripes and the city's solutions will be published in Gripe Vine weekly.

Now, here are a few of the gripes I forwarded to the mayor's office that were addressed:

Why are you charging \$5 to do business at City Hall?

I need more information to answer this correctly; however, I believe this reader is referring to the convenience fee that DMV- not the City of West Haven charges for processing. It is presently \$8 and it is assessed by the State of Connecticut.

If you are on Beach Street, everything is abandoned. What if someone needs help? What are the city's plans for this area?

Fred Messoro, Commissioner of Planning and Development works actively on economic development in our city every day. Beach Street is in a flood zone and presents us with special challenges. The road itself needs to be raised and other flood mitigation

work is necessary. We continue to lobby our state and federal government for grants. As progress is made and news is available, we will share it publicly

When will the city get uniform trash cans like Milford and New Haven?

Our contract for trash pick-up and recycling expired at the end of August. We are entering the bidding process and are exploring uniform trash receptacles. I will keep you posted.

We need more trash receptacles throughout the city.

Please be specific where the reader believes these trash receptacles are needed. (Gripe Vine response; A resident is presently working on a plan to identify areas where additional trash receptacles are needed) Mayor Rosssi continued, "Every receptacle is maintained and emptied by the City. We are trying to be as efficient and practical with their placement while simultaneously asking people to take

some personal responsibility for their trash. This may mean walking a few extra steps to the next trash can, including the receptacles located on the CT Transit buses.



There is more there than just young people slumming in town until school is over.

Much should be said about the three-year-old Mayor's Advisory Commission. It is a collaborative, student-driven task force formed in early 2015 to strengthen the relationship between the UNH and West Haven communities. The MAC is led by Chairman Marcin Stankevitch, a junior political science major, and adviser Chris Haynes, assistant professor of political science.

Over the years, the MAC has provided comprehensive studies for city leaders to use as references, and offers a different and fresh perspective on some of the problems facing the municipality. It is something to be cheered and supported.

The point is the relationship between the university and city has not always been as positive as it now stands. Many remember that UNH students knew nothing of their host city, except maybe the infamous "Campbell Avenue Crawl" up and down the various bars that one can find. That has changed, and all for the better.

WestFest is an opportunity for both the students and the residents to get to know each other. It is a welcome change.



# 1968's protestors won

The Battle of Michigan Avenue is finally over, and it was won by the protesters.

The lopsided fight between anti-war demonstrators and the brutish police force of Chicago's Democratic mayor Richard Daley the night of Aug. 28, 1968, in the midst of the Democratic convention, was a debacle for the left.

The protests didn't stop the Vietnam War or the presumptive Democratic nominee, Hubert Humphrey, the sitting vice president who was much too establishment for the radicals.

The event, broadcast on TV -- indeed, unfolding right in front of the hotel where reporters were staying -- rent the Democratic Party asunder and effectively threw away any chance of beating Richard Nixon that year.

The New Left subsequently fell apart, and splintered several times over, until a faction resorted to lunatic violence (a return to Chicago in 1969 for a "Days of Rage" rampage through the streets was the prelude to more serious criminality).

Beginning in 1968, the Republicans won five of six presidential elections, and the man who put a stop to the run, Bill Clinton, was a Southern moderate who did everything he reasonably could to disassociate himself from any radicalism.

It's hard to think of a direct action that more directly backfired than the Chicago protests. But the passage of sever-

al decades tends to alter judgments. So it is that, 50 years later, the Spirit of 1968 is in the ascendancy on the left and in the Democratic Party, which is moving toward a more open embrace of democratic socialism than perhaps could have been imagined by the protesters during those fevered summer nights in 1968.

Now, much of the Democratic Party -- certainly its rising figures -- wants to cater to and capture the energy of the activists of the left rather than resist them.

There is still an establishment of the Democratic Party. The center of gravity has shifted, though, as labor institutions that once were culturally conservative and staunchly anti-communist have faded in

significance, and true machine politicians like Mayor Daley have all but disappeared. This doesn't mean that Antifa -- a fringe comparable to the Students for a Democratic Society in the late 1960s -- is about to take over the party, but there's very little check on its leftward movement, accelerated every day by the reaction against Donald Trump.

The obsessions of the New Left with race and gender, which came to define life on college campuses in the decades after the ferment of the late 1960s, have now been fully absorbed into Democratic thinking and argot.

The primary victory of Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, a 28-year-old Democratic So

# Ceremonies to mark 17th anniversary of 9/11 terrorist attack

West Haven will observe the 17th anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on 9/11 with a flag-raising ceremony at 6:30 p.m. at the Bradley Point Park flagpole, followed by a candlelight vigil at the city's 9/11 memorial.

The service will begin with a presentation of the colors by the West Haven Police Color Guard and the flag-raising by the West Haven Fire Department Honor Guard and the New Haven County Firefighters Emerald Society Pipes & Drums.

The flag-raising will honor the memory of the nearly 3,000 people who died in the attacks.

Remarks from dignitaries, including Mayor Nancy R. Rossi, will follow.

At 7 p.m., the candlelight vigil will take place at the Richard S. Gabrielle Sept. 11 Memorial on the beach walk next to the Savin Rock Conference Center, 6 Rock St.

Members of the West Haven Rotary Club will distribute candles and programs at the granite monument, which was paid for by the service club in 2002.

Gabrielle, 50, of West Haven, was killed during the attack on the twin towers in New York's World Trade Center complex. An insurance broker at Aon Corp., he was last seen on the south tower's 78th floor.

Declared Patriot Day by Congress in 2002, the city will fly flags at half-staff in recognition of the national day of remembrance.

The vigil will feature taps played by former West Shore Fire Department Lt. Kevin McKeon and a Celtic folk performance by Irish singer-songwriter Liz McNicholl, including the song "The Bravest," a tribute to the heroes of 9/11.

West Haven High School sophomore Nora E. Mullins will sing the national anthem and "God Bless America."

cialist, over Rep. Joe Crowley, a 19-year incumbent and Irish-American pol who is a recognizable figure from William Daley's party, crystallized the change that is afoot.

In 1968, the Democratic convention hall was fortified against the radicals by a steel fence topped with barbed wire, and guarded by thousands of cops and National Guardsmen. In 2020, presumably no such exertions will be necessary. The left will own the place lock, stock and barrel -- because the protesters who got tear-gassed, beaten and bloodied on Michigan Avenue that notorious August night, in the fullness of time, prevailed.

# Historian's corner

## The Three Judges

Everyone who has lived in the New Haven area has eventually heard of the Three Judges who hid on West Rock. But who were they? And what were they hiding from?

In 1639, England's King Charles I had a major falling out with his Parliament, who objected to his methods in the raising of funds for the military.

Angered, he then ordered Parliament to adjourn but they refused; this was the beginning of civil war in England. In this civil war, a rebel army led by Oliver Cromwell, a Puritan leader in Parliament, was victorious. Subsequently, Parliament, under the direction of Cromwell, tried the king for treason, convicted him and beheaded him.

Cromwell then established a military dictatorship, which existed until his death in 1658. During this period, Puritanism became the state-supported religion, and Puritans returned in droves from New England to England.

After Cromwell's death in 1658, Parliament re-asserted its loyalty to the Crown and invited King Charles's son to become King Charles II. This restoration of the monarchy ended the revolution and began the counter-

revolutionary phase.

Of the roughly 67 Regicides (also known as king-killers or judges--they were members of Parliament in 1639), 41 of these remained alive at the end of the revolution. Of this number, 29 were hunted down, captured, and tried, and 13 of them were executed as Regicides.

Our story is not of these, but it is instead of three Regicides who escaped the king's men and traveled to New England; all were members of Parliament, and all were colonels in the English military. William Goffe and his father-in-law Edward Whalley arrived in the New Haven Colony in 1661; John Dixwell arrived here in 1664.

The Puritan colonists were of course sympathetic, and hid and fed them. During two periods, the Regicides spent as much as a month at a time hiding in Judges Cave, a natural rock formation upon West Rock.

One night, as it is told, they were chased from the cave by a mountain lion.

Eventually, representatives of King Charles II who had searched extensively for them, stopped coming around. John Dixwell had settled in New Haven and raised a family under an assumed name; he

finally admitted to his real name upon his deathbed. Today, he is buried behind Center Church on New Haven Green.

The other two judges had moved on and continued to

hide elsewhere.

Today, to commemorate the Regicides and this chapter in New Haven history, three streets fan out north and west from Broadway in New Haven; they are Whalley and

Dixwell avenues, and Goffe Street.

Judges Cave can no longer be accessed by automobile, as the auto road up West Rock was closed some 30 years ago; however, it is still reached
