# Up to 1,000 expected at 14th Fest

The 14th annual West Haven High School Fall Festival is making its 2018 appearance this Saturday, and organizers say it will have new twist on a familiar theme.

For the first time ever it will take place in Ken Strong Stadium on Saturday, Oct. 27 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

"The mission of the festival is to showcase all the talent of the students at West Haven High School," said Jonathan Capone, school athletic director and organizer of the event.

This year's festival promises to be the biggest one ever with over 1000 people expected to attend the event according to Capone.

"The festival includes activities for all ages which are planned throughout the entire day," he said.

The WHHS Blue Devil Marching Band will conduct their traditional march into the stadium at 11:15 and perform its complete halftime show. Performances by the cheerleaders, dance team and majorettes will follow.

"One of the big highlights of the day will be the West Haven Voice Contest where judges WHHS," said Capone.

Also included will be a Chalk Art Contest sponsored by the Art Department, Foul Shooting Contest sponsored by the boys basketball team. GSA will be sponsoring a Heel A-thon race, where students run in stiletto heel shoes. Prizes will be awarded for all these contests. Another tradition at the festival is the Trick or Trunk.

"Twenty cars have signed up to decorate their trunks in a Halloween theme and candy will be given out to all our trick or treaters," Capone said. "They will also be providing face painting of pumpkins free of charge."

When it comes to eating, the festival will have three of the best food trucks in the area. The 744 Restaurant, Vinnie's Pizza, and Taco Pacifico will provide favorite foods at reasonable prices.

The boys and girls swim teams will be sponsoring the annual Dunk Tank and the boys and birls track teams will set up an obstacle course for anybody to run and the top winners will be awarded

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# Padilla city's first Hispanic of the Year'

Dr. Ralph L. Padilla, a respected Puerto Rican veterinarian known for giving back to West Haven and its proud Hispanic American community, received the city's first Hispanic American of the Year award Friday at the inaugural Hispanic Heritage Celebration.

Mayor Nancy R. Rossi and the new West Haven Hispanic Heritage Committee recognized Padilla, who has owned and operated the West Haven Animal Clinic at 959 Campbell Ave. for 33 years, during a midday ceremony on the steps of City Hall.

The committee plans to bestow the award annually on a Hispanic resident, or couple, who personifies service in West Haven's thriving Hispanic American community.

At the half-hour event, Padilla, 65, honored his Puerto Rican lineage with dozens of friends, staff and furry clients, as well as loved ones, including his wife of 34 years, the former Yvette Solomon, and his sister. He was also joined by an array of dignitaries, including state Rep. Michael A. DiMassa, D-West Haven, City Clerk Deborah Collins and Tax Collector Dorothy Chambrelli, along with descendants of folks from Puerto Rico and Latin America.

As the award's first recipient, Padilla told the crowd that it was fitting he received the honor from the city's first female mayor. He then thanked his wife and late parents, his staff, his brother and sister, and the residents who have entrusted his care of their pets.

"I also want to thank the Hispanic community," Padilla said. "I am deeply honored for the award."

Before the ceremony, he said: "I have always taken pride in my heritage and my profession, and I have tried to give back as much as I have received. West Haven has been very good to me and my family."

A post-event, Latinflavored lunch was catered by culinary arts instructor Andrew Ran-

di and students of the culinary arts program at Gateway Community College in the First Congregational Church of West Haven's Fellowship Hall, opposite City Hall on the Green.

In observance of National Hispanic Heritage Month, which ended Oct. 15, the city recognizes the important legacy of Hispanic Americans and the inspiring contributions they have made to the culture and history of the United States.

Hispanics have had a profound and positive influence on the civic and cultural life of America through their strong commitment to faith and family, hard work and service. They have enhanced and shaped the national character with centuries-old traditions that reflect multiethnic and multicultural customs of their community.

Hispanic Heritage Month, which traces its roots to 1968, begins each year on Sept. 15, the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador,

Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. Mexico, Chile and Belize also celebrate their independence days during that period.

The term Hispanic, or Latino, refers to Puerto Rican, South American or Central American, and other Spanish cultures or origins regardless of race. On the 2010 Census form, people of Spanish, Hispanic or Latino origins could identify themselves as Mexican, Mexican-American, Chicano, Puerto Rican, Cuban, or "another Hispanic, Latino or Spanish origin."

West Haven's diversity is its strength, Rossi said, and Padilla is a testament to the American

dream.

She said he epitomizes the noble qualities of serving his community and carrying on the spirited traditions of Puerto Rico.

Padilla's good works practicing veterinary medicine include aiding the West Haven Animal Shelter in times of need.

In March of that year, he moved to West Haven and purchased the West Haven Animal Clinic, across the street from the Veterans Af-

Padilla and his wife live on Ocean Avenue in West Shore. The couple has three children — Kurt L. Padilla, 33, Anna L. Padilla, 32, and Gregory J. Padilla, 27.






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

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# Lack of civility had begun under the watch of Obama

Civility – or the lack of it – has been much in the news these last few weeks. News commentators, pundits, columnists, and politicians are lamenting what they see as a lack of civility in the national discourse concerning issues of importance. Some, however, are laying this lacuna on the fact one political party has no power within the halls of government, namely the Democratic Party.

That position was made eminently clear by former Democratic candidate for President Hillary Rodham Clinton, who stated flatly civility will return only when Democrats return to some type of power. After all, she averred, the party in power is attempting to "destroy" everything her side believes.

Unfortunately, this downward trend toward a lack of hearing the other side began a decade ago, and got progressively worse during the Obama years. Let us take you back to the campaign of 2008 and what transpired after it.

Barack Hussein Obama became the darling of mainstream media, and the horse upon which the party leadership decided to ride to victory. Due to his skin color, any attempt to discredit his position on issues was immediately disparaged as a racial slur.

This disparagement, you will recall, was hurled at former President Bill Clinton. Clinton made a rather prosaic criticism of Obama's positions, and was called a "racist." This to a man who was once hailed as the nations "first black president."

When Obama became President, any disagreements concerning his policies were given a racial patina. No opposition was valid, all was racist. This was not so much used as a talking point as a determined ploy to end any and all debate, no matter how valid.

During that time also, Obama used his position to undermine the very institutions of government he was sworn to uphold. From the Supreme Court being ostracized during the State of the Union, to disagreements on Obamacare ("I won") to the famous "beer summit" because of a dispute in Cambridge, MA,

Obama validated the worst inclinations of the left, and gave them not only voice, but approbation. Ferguson, MO, Black Lives Matter, Occupy Wall Street and other incidents were hailed from the president's bully pulpit.

The eight-year degradation of national institutions, coupled with the steady decline of Democratic Party fortunes coalesced these groups, and allowed shrill voices to take over the debate. As more and more seats went over to the Republicans in state, local and national elections, shrillness became more and more commonplace.

The stage was set for what we have today.

The Progressive agenda of Obama, though stalled, was still accomplished through his "phone and pen." Hillary Rodham Clinton was supposed to be the Obama third and fourth term. But, Americans – at least 63 million of them – had enough of being bullied, and chose Donald J. Trump. This set the left wing into a rage unseen in the country's history.

A group that thought power was its due for the next generation saw that dream evaporate. It's agenda, expected to be pushed forward for eight more years was suddenly rejected, and decidedly so.


For the last two years we've seen a temper tantrum the likes of which this nation has not seen ever in its history.

## The left bares its incivility

It's doubtful that a former American presidential candidate has ever formally endorsed incivility before, but Hillary Clinton is ever full of surprises. In an interview on CNN, the erstwhile advocate of "if they go low, we go high" switched around to unapologetically call for going low.

"You cannot be civil with a political party," she explained, "that wants to destroy what you stand for, what you care about." She added that if Democrats retake a house of Congress, well, then, "that's when civility can start again."

Clinton's statement is yet more confirmation of the radical mood of the current Democratic Party, not just in blessing tactics that once would have been anathema to the mainstream, but questioning the legitimacy of core elements of our system. The party's base is just a few steps from beginning to give up on our common national life.

Civility is a rather fundamental thing to throw under the bus. It is the basis of our political life, assuring that disagreements are settled within certain bounds and don't escalate into blood feuds.

This doesn't mean that there can't be intense arguments, harsh condemnations, passionate controversies and partisan donnybrooks. These are all endemic to a free society and very healthy things. It does mean that there are certain widely accepted guardrails

In the Brett Kavanaugh de-

bate, the normal pressure points of the democratic process (rallies and demonstrations, phone calls to congressional offices, online, print and TV advocacy) were deemed insufficient -- senators had to be berated in the hallways, chased out of restaurants and harassed at their homes.

Asked on CNN if the actions against her fellow senators went too far, Mazie Hirono stood by the harassment: "I think it just means that there are a lot of people who are very, very much motivated about what's going on."

But when you angrily confront someone, especially as part of a group, it carries an inescapable whiff of physical intimidation. When you shout Ted and Heidi Cruz out of a

Washington restaurant, you aren't trying to convince them of anything, you are merely abusing them. When you yell at Senate hearings and floor votes, you aren't influencing the process, but disrupting it.

Our system of government is increasingly held in low regard on the left. The 2016 election was somehow stolen, and the mechanism that gave Trump his victory, the Electoral College, is illegitimate. The Senate, which confirmed Kavanaugh and gives small, red states the same representation as large, blue states, is also illegitimate. Finally, the Supreme Court, now home to two Trump-appointed justices, is illegitimate as well.

That's a lot of illegitimacy,

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# Rohna sinking was start of missile warfare

In the Oct. 1 edition of West Haven Voice, the story of the sinking of the HMT Rohna was related.

Held secret for decades during and following World War II, the Indian ship, leased by the British, was hit by a radiocontrolled, rocket-propelled weapon in the Mediterranean Sea on Nov. 26, 1943. More than 1,000 American soldiers, crewmen, and Navy personnel were lost in the strike and aftermath.


The losses included West Haven friends and schoolmates PFC Pasquale Logiodice, PFC John T. Cox, and PFC Pacifico Migliore. The GIs were finishing a brief stay at Oran, Algeria, and boarded the rusty Rohna to head to the India-Bermuda-China war zone to build air fields.

At the Ward-Heitmann House Museum, decades-old New Haven Register clipping with the briefest of war-time information were uncovered. Friends John Dolan and wife Sue made a computer search and returned with astonishing news of the terrific tragedy, and news of an existing Rohna survivors association that links members and has yearly reunions.

Thus, began regular conversations between the Dolans and Janice Pumelia (Brooklyn) and Catherine Ladnier, author (Greenwich, CT) both survivors' relatives.

All the participants were happy to have met each other for the sake of spreading the story of the GIs and the families

sociation we call The Rohna Remembrance Committee of West Haven. Our members are mostly West Haven graduates from Main Street.

At first in our attempts to spread the message, we didn't find much interest. It was, after all, an old story, but we did point out that it was the 75th anniversary.

Talking to a nephew, Joe Weber, a retired state trooper, about our cause, he told us to go to University of New Haven and see Joe Sudol, a Forensics Department staffer. Joe is another retired state trooper. Our course was to change dramatically. Joe and Joe make a point of listening, watching, absorbing, and they smile, usually. What a find.

Also, Joe Sudol's fatherin-law, Joe Morrissey of the "Clan Morrissey", served on a minesweeper \*in WWII. Joe quickly gave us valuable UNH tips and told us he would check\_genealogy listings of the families (which he did). He wanted us to keep in touch and he added, "See the chief!"

Before seeking the chief, we touched base with Director of Operations Julia Carbonella. When we told her our story that the parents, grandparents, brothers and sisters of Pasquale, John T., and Pacifico would never in 50 years, be able to talk to a survivor, she was visibly moved.

The "chief," Vice-President for Public Safety Ron Quagliani, our former West Haven Chief of Police, was next in the quest. In our meeting, he listened , while immediately going to work, giving us names of people, he would contact providing addresses, offering to help finance some memorial of the West Haven Veterans and Learning Center (Military Museum). He alerted the Vet's Center of our project. We also learned of the UNH ROTC Program.

We left the Chargers' buildings feeling thankful for their support.

It was shortly after our UNH visit that John made a call to Mark Consorte, Social Studies Dept. chairman at West Haven High School. This was followed by a meeting with Consorte and staff to discuss plans for a students' performance at the Veterans' Center on Dec. 2, coinciding with a week-long exhibit of memorabilia there.

A very special guest on the occasion will be Michael Walsh, an author, who compiled two great books of survivors' stories of the Rohna sinking.

We would like to note here that the members of the Rohna Remembrance Committee are Grace Youngs Hall, Judy Cascio Pfister, Patrice Farquharson, Sue Dolan, Barbara Quarz Melotto, Gloria Quarz Weber, Joan Vitolo, Dave Warner, and Bud Giaquinto. The cochairmen are John Dolan and Weber. Resource Advisors are Beth Sabo and Dave Ricci.

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

#### West Haven's Earliest Days Part IV

We acknowledge the efforts of Lorraine Wood Rockefeller, who originally set these words down in about 1960.

Early New Englanders were aware of the need for roads, but not much was done to acquire them. Efforts taken at early town meetings to compel men to work on the roads did not suffice to keep them in good condition. The military roads were perhaps the first real roads, the next in importance were the turnpikes for the old stagecoaches. The earliest of these were without springs and passengers sat on hard benches.


The need for adequate transportation first was realized following the Revolutionary War when roads were built by private companies incorporated under acts passed by the State Legislatures, called "turnpikes." Gates were erected at ten mile intervals

and they made it costly to travel. Those exempt were the person on his way to church, the person on military duty and the farmer on this way to and from the fields.

If the toll collector was not present, the gates were left open and everybody was permitted to pass without paying. Many thrifty Yankees preferred long detours to paying extortionate toll charges. When popular protest forced abandonment of the toll charges, many of the roads were purchased by the towns and incorporated into a general highway system.

Road building became important from 1690 to 1720. Pent Road, now First Avenue, was in use in 1687. Savin Avenue was also a part of Pent Road and was in use in 1698. Platt Avenue, once known as Cove River Road was a so-called highway in 1699. Saw Mill Road, Meloy Road, Benham Hill Road, and Jones Hill Road still follow closely the

routes of farm roads laid out in the period 1680 to 1720.

Among the original settlers were George Lamberton (son of the original settlers of New Haven), Thomas Painter, Edward Thomas, Thomas (or Jesse Stevens), the Gregson, Fowler, Benham, Ward, Clarke, Brown and Thompson families. Subsequently principal farmers in the town also included James Reynolds, Newton Stephens, Eli Kimberly, Ezra Candee, Nehemiah Kimberly, Albert Candee, Isaac Hine, Joseph Prindle, Capt. Ichabod Smith, Capt. Anson Clinton, Capt. Albert Thomas and Henry Thomas, Elliott and Jacob Ward.
