



Bayview Park dealt to developer

Mayor Nancy R. Rossi heralded the sale of the city-owned Bayview Park property to the developer of The Haven for \$257,500 during a check presentation Friday at City Hall.

Rossi presented the check on behalf of The Haven Group LLC to Finance Director Ronald Cicatelli in the third-floor City Council chambers as city and state officials looked on.

Joining the mayor and Cicatelli were state Reps. Charles J. Ferraro, R-West Haven, and Michael A. DiMassa, D-West Haven, as well as city Treasurer Michael P. Last, Corporation Counsel Lee Tiernan and Planning and Development Commissioner Fred A. Messore.

After weeks of negotiations, the city and The Haven Group agreed to terms on the sale of the .87-acre parcel at Water and Main streets for \$257,500. The price represents an amount slightly higher than the appraised value, said Rossi, who thanked the developer



City lists parking law, fines

To help crews expedite snow removal, Public Works Commissioner Tom McCarthy is reminding residents and businesses to observe parking regulations during and after storms.

Per the "Severe Weather" parking ordinance under Chapter 188 of the West Haven Code, police will tag and tow vehicles violating the ordinance at the owner's expense. Violators will receive a \$100 fine.

Once snow begins to fall, a parking ban is in effect on the even-numbered side of most roads, unless one is posted with a "No Parking" sign on the odd side.

The ban is in effect for 36 hours after a storm. Residents are urged to park in driveways or designated private lots.

However, during an official snow emergency declared by Mayor Nancy R. Rossi, a parking ban will run from 11 p.m. to 7 a.m. on both sides of Campbell and Savin avenues, Morgan Lane, Elm Street, Meloy Road, Second Avenue from Elm to Beach streets, and Main Street from Savin to Washington avenues.

McCarthy is also reminding residents and businesses to shovel their sidewalks within 24 hours after a storm or face a \$25 fine "for each day that the violation persists."

According to the "Removal of Snow and Ice" ordinance under Chapter 195 of the West Haven Code, people are given 24 hours to remove snow from sidewalks on and bordering their properties. Violators are subject to the \$25-per-day fine, which is enforced by the Police Department, the ordinance states. To report a complaint, call the department's nonemergency line at 203-937-3900. Complaints are kept confidential.

McCarthy also pointed out that plowing or blowing snow into city streets is prohibited and violators are subject to a \$60 fine for each offense, per the ordinance.

Also, residents and businesses with mailboxes damaged by snow thrown from a plow are the responsibility of the property owner. The city will only repair mailboxes damaged by the striking of a plow blade if there is visible evidence, such as paint or tire tracks.

Snow removal around mailboxes is the property owner's responsibility. Residents are also urged to help firefighters keep hydrants clear of snow.

Community Thanksgiving Dinner needs aid

Thanksgiving can be a time of great joy or great sorrow for some. With the coming of the holiday season, those with families and circles of friends rejoice in those relationships, while those who have no family or few friends, many times, are left to fend for themselves.

For more than 20 years, the city has had a Community Thanksgiving Dinner for those who have nowhere to go, or for residents who want to spend time with neighbors. Begun in the 1990s, the Community Thanksgiving Dinner is celebrating its 7th year under the auspices of a committee of the First Congregational Church. Once again, Bill Ewry is the chairman, and he's looking for help.

In a letter sent this week, Ewry thanked those who made the dinner a success in

the past, and restated the particulars of this year's meal.

"The dinner will once again be hosted by The First Congregational Church of West Haven. The church is located at 1 Church Street, but the main entrance to the dinner is located at 464 Campbell Ave.," he said.

This year's meal will be like all the others, the menu consists of: turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes, gravy, sweet potatoes, green beans, carrots, dinner rolls and dessert.

The dinner will be served buffet-style from noon until 1:30 in the Fellowship Hall.

"As a community dinner, we ask the community to help in many ways, such as: donating a baked pumpkin or any other favorite seasonal pie, preparing and serving the meal or helping with the clean-up,"

Ewry wrote.

As with other years, getting dessert pies is a big part of the help people in the community can give, but any help is appreciated.

Pies will be collected on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday the week of Thanksgiving prior to the dinner at the church. Anyone who would like to donate a pie should contact the church office at (203) 933-6291, to coordinate the drop-off of the pies.

The Community Thanksgiving Dinner began in the 1990s as an outreach of several congregations in the city. The West Haven Emergency Assistance Taskforce (WHEAT)

had a big part in establishing the dinner, and several ministers and clergy were part of its establishment.

Over the years, the scope of the dinner and the dinner committee grew into other areas to the point a re-organization had to happen. Ewry took over the Thanksgiving Din-

ner and has been chairing the event these seven years.

The event is more than a way to help the poor and lonely. Over the years families have come to the dinner as a way of showing community support. Ewry extended his thanks all those residents who help make it a success.

Golf tournament scores \$7,784 for cancer research




State's electorate continues to go down the same paths

The 2018 election is over, and, unfortunately, the State of Connecticut's voters decided to stay with the status quo. The election of Ned Lamont last week promises to be subject the state – and the state's remaining taxpayers – to at least four more years of the same failed policies. These are the policies that saw businesses flee the state, debt rise, and taxes piled on top of already high levies.

Lamont, the depiction of a "limousine liberal," hailing from Greenwich, is an unabashed tax-and-spender. Using the bumper sticker thought process of many of his fellows Lamont believes the "rich" in this state do not pay their "fair share." Of course, we're never told what the "fair share" really is. To do so would mean giving the game away. Politicians always need a decoy to keep the rest of the voters off the scent.

In the next four years taxpayers will have Democratic majorities in the House and Senate, though at this writing some of the races in both houses seem to be in doubt. Regardless of the outcome of those few races, Democrats have the clear majority. That is bad news for the state. Democrats have held the majority in the legislature for decades, this current session, set to expire, the Senate had an 18-18 split, serving as a check on blatant Democratic control

With the new legislature coming in, taxpayers in the Connecticut can expect more of the tax-and-spend policies that got us in the situation we are. Tolls on the state's highways, which was a third-rail in the lead up to last week's ballot will find its way through both houses, and get signed by Lamont. The state's drivers, particularly those in the southern part of the state will be adversely affected, paying more and getting less.

New taxes have been promised as well because, as Lamont said in the lead up to the election, "We will all have to pay more" so "we can have an economy we all can live with."

The state then can expect to pile up more debt, more taxes and more programs benefitting those who pay little or no taxes, and creating more of a dependency. That is going to create more debt, and lead to more of the so-called "rich" leaving the state – as they are leaving the Northeast – in droves. That means fewer and fewer will be able to pick up the slack and pay for the programs that are heaped up on us.

Connecticut, along with Illinois – another deep blue state that has been poorly run – are running millions in the red. New taxes don't bring us any closer to making ends meet. Instead, with every new dollar comes a new way to spend it. The last 40 years are a testament to that. Yet, the state legislature, despite having problems putting together budgets that are realistic, cling to the idea that we must have a safety net for all, and the middle class and so-called "rich" have to pay for it.

Add to the insanity million in unfunded liabilities in the form of pensions and other expenses, and a bond liability that increases with each meeting of the State Bonding Commission, and we wonder if the best thing that can happen to the state and the state's taxpayers is bankruptcy.

Until the politicians in the state can understand that people cannot afford to live here anymore, and that adding new debt is only digging a deeper hole, we are doomed to repeat the lunacy of what happened last week.

Instead of dealing with our financial situation and attempting to deal with it, the voters in Connecticut acted as if it was 1966 all over again. The state was in the black, employment was low, and people were coming into the state for work. That hasn't been the case for three decades. The state is continually in the red, employment is not where it should be in relation to other states, and the exodus of skilled workers and white collar workers is huge.

We get the leaders we deserve. We get the insanity we create. Connecticut is a dying state, and the voters have said they are OK with it.



Third world is right at home

It's appropriate that the U.N. special rapporteur devoted to adequate housing has visited encampments in Mexico City, Buenos Aires, Mumbai -- and San Francisco, Oakland and Berkeley.

The homeless situation in those cities and others around the country is positively Third World, a blight that shows the persistence of human folly and misery, despite what we take to be our steady progress to greater enlightenment and prosperity.

San Francisco is a crown jewel of the new economy, and a sink of vagrancy. One of the more compelling pieces of reportage that The New York Times has run recently was on the dirtiest block in San Francisco, the 300 block of Hyde Street, blighted by discarded heroin needles and other filth.

In the 21st century, in the richest country on the planet, you would think that we would have figured out how to live without having to step around human feces. The experience of San Francisco says that, against all expectations, we haven't -- or at least we forgot how.

In an article for the journal National Affairs, Stephen Eide of the Manhattan Institute recounted how we got here over the past 50 years.

Cities wiped out or drastically diminished their skid rows, once a last-ditch housing recourse for men who had hit bottom. As urban renewal and regulations to improve the quality of housing elimi-

nated these down-on-their-luck areas, the people who once lived there decamped to public places.

We "deinstitutionalized" the mentally ill, too often a euphemism for dumping them onto the streets and into jails. About 20 to 30 percent of the homeless are mentally ill.

Meanwhile, the number of single-parent families drastically increased. Women only rarely lived on skid row, but poor families headed by single mothers are a large component of the homeless.

These large-scale trends have been met with a new, more permissive legal environment. The Supreme Court in 1972 made it more difficult for city police forces to hustle along vagrants, and

subsequent free-speech jurisprudence has made outlawing panhandling tricky. Civil commitment of the mentally ill has become highly restricted. The American Civil Liberties Union is a great de facto friend of vagrancy.

Not that anything is easy in this area. The hard core of the homeless population is cut off from human relationships and finds the perverse freedom of the streets more appealing than the structure that would come with assistance. Many refuse help, either because they are too sick to make rational decisions or they don't want to deal with any rules.

But the beginning wisdom is to consider the status quo intolerable, and resist the advo

for agreeing to the terms.

Although a development agreement between West Haven and The Haven Group more than three years ago included the sale of the waterfront park, the city was obligated to resolve several issues related to the property's title before the sale could take place.

"One of my first actions as mayor was to demand that the corporation counsel do what was necessary, as quickly as possible, to complete the sale of this park because The Haven Group told me it was a necessary component for the development of the upscale waterfront shopping experience," Rossi said. "The Haven Group has made clear that the sale of the park by the city of West Haven was necessary before any development would take place."

The Haven Group received site plan approval from the city Planning and Zoning Commission in July, which included sidewalk improvements to the neighborhood.

Two months later, the state Bond Commission approved \$5 million in funding for the reconstruction of Elm Street — the future entrance of the \$200 million, 261,182-square-foot luxury outlet center.

The National Park Service granted the city relief from its Urban Park and Recreation Recovery grant obligations concerning Bayview Park in August.

West Haven will now make improvements to the city-owned park on Contact Drive, off South Street in West Shore, as part of the approval with the federal agency.

The Park Service's approval process required the preparing and filing of an application package earlier this year with its Philadelphia office, along with compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act and approvals from the

state Department of Energy and Environmental Protection and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Further consultation and negotiation with the Park Service this year was completed by city staff, without the use of private consultants, Rossi said.

The Haven Group also recently agreed to reimburse West Haven for the cost of city attorney fees for the project as part of the negotiated sale, she said.

After a comprehensive review, Bayview Park was not found to have any significant historic value. Only a half-acre of the parcel is land that can be developed, city officials said.

Access to the waterfront by the public will remain as part of the proposed development.

Rossi said the project is a great example of a public-private partnership.

State and federal funds for the site included a \$200,000 environmental cleanup in 2007, a \$2 million bulkhead reconstruction in 2012 and a \$2 million brownfield cleanup in 2016, as well as the recent state bond money. In addition, a real estate property tax abatement agreement was negotiated in 2015.

"All of our state delegation, the governor, the federal delegation and other public partners have been helpful and essential, and we are grateful," Rossi said. "For its part, the developer has spent in excess of \$32 million on the project since it was first pitched to then-Mayor John M. Picard in 2012 by Sheldon M. Gordon, who is now deceased."

When completed, the project will cover 26 waterfront acres that will feature dozens of luxury retail shops, restaurants, a promenade and a 200-seat amphitheater. It is expected to generate between 800 and 1,200 jobs and several million dollars in municipal tax revenue and fees.



Bayview Park has been sold to The Haven developers. The purchase was recently concluded and approved by various governmental bodies.

cates who want to normalize panhandling and camping, and the associated drug abuse, petty crime and disorder. Houston has had success with a tough-love policy of more services, coupled with a crackdown on encampments and other public nuisances.

One of the advantages of modern society is that people don't have to live in public, or in squalor. That it is widely accepted in some of our greatest cities is an outrage of our age. It is deeply harmful to our civic life, and does no favors for the men and women living in parks and highway underpasses.

Historian's corner **By Dan Shine**

West Haven's Earliest Days Part VI

We acknowledge the efforts of Lorraine Wood Rockefeller, who originally set these words down in about 1960.

Early Laws

The first settlers believed in witchcraft and its punishment by law.

In 1657, William Meeker was accused of practicing Black Magic, but when his case came to trial, his accuser admitted that he had falsely accused his neighbor.

In the same court, a Thomas Mulliner was rebuked for settling his fence "so near to the edge of the bank by the sea that when the cattle are betwixt that and the sea, and the tide came in hastily upon them, they are in hazard to be drowned as some swine have been, and therefore he has been told that it must be removed and also any other set in like manner."

The courts united equity and law jurisdiction and administered both from the same bench without much regard to the form of action.

The simple system of procedure in the days when New Haven existed as an independent colony seemed to give general satisfaction to the people although on many occasions the decisions were somewhat arbitrary and evidence was received contrary to the usual rules. The magistrates were honest, God-fearing men who tried to do what they considered the right thing between parties.

These early settlers brought with them the idea, taste

and customs of the mother country and these long survived despite the leveling tendencies and free spirit of the New World. They were strict in morals and Gov. Withrop prohibited cards and gaming tables. A man might be whipped for shooting fowl on Sunday. All conduct was shaped by a literal interpretation of the Scripture. Even articles of dress were limited and regulated by law.

Most of the West Farmers were thrifty independent people who became less and less interested in the increasingly complicated affairs of the growing mother town, New Haven.

A rigid social code developed with a definite line drawn between the several classes of society.

Under this code the classes had different rights and duties. Society was then composed of church members and freemen, admitted planters who had taken the oath of fidelity, householders, day laborers, indentured servants and apprentices and a few Negro slaves.


The group of servants and apprentices caused much trouble in New Haven Colony with "their coarse, quarrelsome and even beastly practices." It was against this group that much of the early penal law was directed. In general, the inhabitants of West Farms were middle class householders with few who were very rich or very poor. They had few servants and as the bulk of the trade was in New Haven, still fewer

apprentices.

The only district taxes

for many were collected by tithing-men from New

Haven and were used for the minister's salary.



Life in colonial Connecticut and throughout New England had a strict code of conduct expected to be followed by all -- Saints and Sinners.



Devils roll by Xavier, 39-14; facing Gaels

The West Haven football team traveled to Middletown to face the Xavier Falcons on Friday afternoon at Larry McHugh Field. After the West Haven defense forced the Falcons to go three and out on their first drive, the Blue Devils wasted little time getting on the board. Jaden Grant's 10-yard touchdown run capped the Westies first possession giving the boys a 6-0 lead just 2:25 into the contest.

The Blue Devils would increase their lead with a Justin Medina 6-yard TD run to make it 12-0 with 5:10 left in the quarter. Jaden Grant picked up his second touchdown of the game with a 39-yard touchdown run and it was 18-0 fifty-one seconds into the second quarter. On West Haven's next possession, Jordan Berrios hit Demerick Blackford on a quick slant pattern and Blackford did the rest, sprinting to the endzone for a 55-yard touchdown pass with 7:34 left in the half to increase the lead to 24-0. After the Westies were stopped on a fourth down at mid-field, the Falcons were able to drive deep into West Haven territory and got on the board with a 5-yard touchdown pass with five seconds left in the half to cut the lead to 24-7.

The Blue Devils picked up where they left off to start the second half. After Jordan Berrios broke a 50-yard run to get the Westies down to the Xavier 12-yard line, Jaden Grant scored his third touchdown of the game on a 12-yard rush 2:22 into the third quarter. A successful extra point by Isaac Morales made it 31-7. Mekiel Coates made it 37-7 with a 6-yard TD run just seven seconds into the fourth quarter. The Falcons responded with a 65-yard touchdown run with 6:18 left in the game to make it 37-14. After a botched snap on a Xavier third down late in the game pinned the Falcons at their own 1-yard line, the Xavier punter took the next snap and proceeded to run out of the back of the


