# Pop Rocks open celebration

Westies young and old, many donning blue and white, gathered in Old Grove Park to help their beloved West Haven blow out the figurative candles on its 100th birthday June 24.

Amid a cool breeze and a spectacular strawberry sunset, The Pop Rocks, "Connecticut's ultimate '80s experience," kick-started the West Haven Centennial Celebration by interacting with the audience while playing a two-hour set of totally awesome hits — 100 years to the day of West Haven's incorporation by the General Assembly as Connecticut's youngest municipality.

The showstopping performance, presented by the City of West Haven Centennial Celebra-

tion Committee, put the icing on the cake for a birthday bash 100 years in the making and left partygoers clamoring for more.

And there is more — much more, said committee Chairwoman Beth A. Sabo, the city's commissioner of human resources.

Mayor Nancy R. Rossi, the committee's honorary chairwoman, recently announced a six-month series of free concerts, historical exhibits and fireworks — headlined by the long-awaited return of the Savin Rock Festival in the Grove on July 30-31 — to commemorate West Haven's 1921 birth.

Rossi, West Haven's first female mayor, opened the centennial kickoff by welcoming concertgoers to the 151-year-old Grove and See Centennial, page 15

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# On this Date

2002 -- The International Criminal Court (ICC) is established. It is the first international judicial body that has the power to try individuals for genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes. It was created by the Rome Statute, an international treaty that was signed in the Italian city of Rome in 1998.

1991 -- The Warsaw Pact, a defense treaty between 8 communist countries, is formally disbanded in Prague. The pact was founded in 1955, during the height of the Cold War, as a way to counterbalance the power of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) in Western Europe.

1979 -The Walkman makes its appearance in stores for the first time. The portable audio cassette player was made by Sony and went on sale in Japan.

1908 -- SOS is adopted as the International Distress Signal. The 2nd International Radiotelegraphic Convention, which was signed in December 1906, made the Morse code distress signal (···--- $\cdot \cdot$ ), the standard international maritime distress signal. Even though it was replaced by the Global Maritime Distress and Safety System in 1999, SOS is universally seen as a distress call and is often mistakenly thought to be an abbreviation of Save Our Souls or Save Our Ship.

# Concert series begins July 9

The West Haven Centennial Concert Series will continue July 9 with Rubber City, "one of Connecticut's premier concert, party and club bands."

The two-hour concert is set for 7 p.m. in Old Grove Park. The rain date is July 12.

On July 17, Airborne will play contemporary jazz on the Allingtown Green at 7 p.m. The rain date is July 28.

On July 23, Simply Swing, a 10-piece orchestra featuring "swinging horns, a dynamic rhythm section and wonderful vocals," will perform in the Grove at 7 p.m. The rain date is July 26.

The concert series will follow in the Grove with the Chicago blues of The Cobalt Rhythm Kings at 7 p.m. Aug. 13 and the R&B of Shaded Soul Band at 7 p.m. Aug. 27. The bands' rain dates are Aug. 16 and Aug. 30, respectively.

On Sept. 5, the series will culminate in the Grove at 7 p.m. with a two-hour concert by What a Fool Believes, "a Doobie Brothers experience" celebrating the Doobies' 50th anniversary. The rain date is Sept. 9.

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

# A right and proper loss

The Democratic Party's attempt to usurp the Constitution and federalize all elections - as well as to make cheating more common than it is already -- saw a welldeserved and (we hope) final demise in the Senate last week. The bill, S-1, nee HR-1, was called the "For the People Act," but it was little more than a power grab by Democrats.

The bill failed to gain "cloture" in the Senate, by not reaching the 60-vote margin needed. It failed 50-50 in the divided house much to the chagrin of so-called "progressives," who want to see the Senate turned into another House of Representatives.

The only thing we agree with supporters of this bill on is the nation faces an existential threat. They believe because the bill failed, we believe the failure stalled that threat. Passage would have harmed the nation. What better time to happen then as we celebrate July 4th. The bill had the following provisions:

~Federalized control over congressional elections;

~Declared that standard state and local maintenance of elections systems, such as purging ineligible voters from voter rolls, limiting vote-by-mail, requiring voter ID, and establishing rules against felons voting, would erode the right to vote;

~Required all challenges to the law to be filed in the federal courts in Washington, DC, dominated by judges appointed by Democrat presidents;

~Established online and automatic voter registration;

~Protected illegal immigrants from prosecution if they vote;

- ~Established same-day voter registration;
- ~Registered minors to vote;
- ~Mandated early voting;
- ~Established nationwide vote-by-mail without a voter ID; and

~Required the doxing of contributors to political action committees (PACs).

It is worth noting the FTPA was questionable as far as passing Constitutional muster. The Founders had a reason to keep election laws and policy within the states. And that is specifically stated in the document, but these days, with grammar and syntax ignored by some justices, not to mention the plain meaning of the text, we are glad it was not left to the courts.

Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas probably put it best in his speech following, calling it the Corrupt Politicians Act, and calling out supporters for wanting to create not a path to legally cheat in elections. We have enough evidence to see that 2020 was a year that saw blatant cheating. Even Time Magazine's Molly Ball heralded the conspiracy of business and political leaders to "fortify" the election. Such a "fortification" would be made permanent. Audits are going on now in several states, with more to follow. We will find out what those "fortifications" were.

Those now angered over the loss are now saying Democracy is in danger. They show nothing except their ignorance on how the Republic was set up, and what safeguards were put in place to make sure there was no tyranny of the majority. There are forces at work looking to overthrow our institutions and customs, calling them racist, but little if anything is shown as evidence. We guess it is in the ether somewhere.

# China defense spending soars

Joe Biden isn't known for his austerity, except when it comes to the nation's defense.

As part of his welcome emphasis on competition with China, the president cajoled reluctant European countries at the G-7 summit into releasing a statement critical of China, on top of the announcement of an infrastructure program meant to counter China's Belt and Road Initiative.

That's all fine as far as it goes, but a glaring omission from Biden's campaign is a defense budget that reflects the growing challenge from Beijing.

Indeed, Biden justifies almost any increased domestic spending as designed to check China's ambitions, at the same time he neglects what is most needful to keep China from dominating its region and waging war on our allies or perhaps the U.S. itself.

If we can deter China from taking Taiwan with subsidies for electric cars, Biden is inarguably the Churchill of his time.

If we can counter China's defense buildup with more funding for affordable housing, Biden deserves to take his place beside Alfred Thayer Mahan or George Kennan as great strategic thinkers.

Otherwise, his approach is lacking, and disturbingly so.

Biden's infrastructure plan, a sprawling proposal that would spend \$2.3 trillion on everything from roads and bridges to affordable housing and elder care, is about the "global competition with China," the president insists.

By Biden's way of thinking, whatever progressives have wanted to do for years is suddenly a priority in the new Cold War. The left-wing "explainer" website Vox now claims, "Improving domestic infrastructure and investing in new and emerging technologies, especially clean energy technology, is the best way the U.S. can challenge China for supremacy on the world stage." The publication quoted a Democratic congressional aide, "The best way to enact a progressive agenda is to use China [as a] threat."

There are indeed areas of advanced technology that we need to invest in, especially semi-conductors and artificial intelligence (a \$250 billion Senate bill passed last week is an imperfect step in this direction), but it's not true that we can simply windmill our way to victory over China.

Although you might miss it listening to Biden, there are threats from China that don't involve infrastructure spending or clean energy initiatives.

China has been growing its annual defense spending by more than 6% a year.

It has now surpassed the U.S. and technically has the largest navy in the world.

It is on pace to double its nuclear weapons over the next

It has flown hundreds of sorties near Taiwan this year, and a top U.S. admiral warns that it could invade in the next six years.

Given all that, one might expect the openhanded Biden to invest substantially in a stronger, more advanced U.S. military, but his profligacy doesn't extend so far. He increased defense budget spending by about 2%, which won't even keep up with inflation.

This doesn't come close to what we realistically need. Chairman of the Joint Chiefs Mark Milley said at a U.S. Naval Institute event late last year, "We're going to have to have a much larger fleet than we have today, if we're serious about great power competition and deterring great power war." He called for a

3-5% increase in the budget every year but didn't think that was plausible because of fiscal constraints (little did he know, the \$6 trillion blowout to come in every other area of the budget).

We should be spending more on defense, and spending differently. With an eye to deterring conflict with China, we need to recalibrate in a serious way to focus on advanced technologies and weapons systems for the Navy and Air Force, and in space. Hypersonics, directed energy, and control of the electromagnetic spectrum should be particular priorities.

Biden has no excuse for not pursuing this. It's not as though he can say we can't afford it.

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
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# City celebrates 'Juneteenth' holiday

Mayor Nancy R. Rossi fittingly issued a proclamation declaring Juneteenth in West Haven on June 19 during the city's first Juneteenth celebration in Allingtown's Brent Watt Park.

The community event, called West Haven Celebrates Juneteenth, was organized by Councilwomen Robbin Watt Hamilton (D-5), and Treneé McGee (D-7), and was sponsored by districts 5 and 7 of the Democratic Town Committee as part of the West Haven Centennial Celebration.

The three-hour event, held in the small but well-arranged park on Tile Street, included remarks by Rossi, McGee and Watt Hamilton, along with a rendition of the Black national anthem, "Lift Every Voice and Sing," and a reading of the Emancipation Proclamation.

Police Commissioner Christopher M. Suggs served as the master of ceremonies.

June 19 is the traditional commemoration date of the emancipation of enslaved people in the United States. President Abraham Lincoln first issued the Emancipation Proclamation declaring all slaves free in Confederate territory on Sept. 22, 1862, but the news took time to travel.

"On June 19, 1865, Union soldiers led by Maj. Gen. Gordon Granger landed on the shores of Galveston, Texas, to declare that the Civil War had ended and that enslaved people were now free," said Rossi, reading the proclamation to the crowd.

Since the first Juneteenth event in Texas in 1866, Juneteenth has been observed in hundreds of communities across the country, providing an opportunity to mark the emancipation of enslaved people.

"Juneteenth also highlights the artistic and intellectual achievements collectively preserved through the slave trade, the emancipation era and the civil rights movement, as well as more recent accomplishments of African American cultural expression," Rossi our history and commemosaid.

West Haven's Juneteenth celebration featured performances by talented young people from the area, including cheerleaders, a poet, dancers, a saxophonist and singers.

It also included a drum call by Rhythm From the Heart, a performance by the Village Drill Team and a concert by The Nu Groove Band, which played R&B and classic rock hits.

Local artists and authors showed their works, and vendors sold novelties and wares, such as T-shirts, jewelry and soaps.

Vintage cars were on display, and members of the Health Department's coronavirus response team gave doses of the COVID-19 vaccine to those 18 and older.

"Our community honors the strength and resolve of African Americans throughout our history and commemorates Juneteenth with cultural readings, prayer, musical performances, food, and exhibits of art and literature," Rossi said.

Brent Watt Park, just a block west of Ruden Street near the University of New Haven and Notre Dame High School campuses, is near and dear to Watt Hamilton's heart.

The 97-by-110-foot pocket park was dedicated on July 1, 2017, in honor of her brother, the late Democratic Councilman Brent Watt, who served Allingtown's 5th District from Dec. 4, 2011, until his death on June 25, 2016, at age 54. Watt Hamilton was unanimously tapped by the City Council on the one-month anniversary of her brother's death to fill his council seat.




## **Vendors sought**

# Historian's corner

When the first white settlers arrived in the area presently known as West Haven, they found broad marshes that were bordered by what the mariners of that era referred to as "Ye Round Hills." Those hills were what we know today as Kelsey Hill, Jones Hill and Marsh Hill.

The land lying between Kelsey Hill and First Avenue was mostly tidal wetland, and could not be used for dwellings or farming.

Southeast of the present Green, there was a seasonal Indian settlement known as Wigwam Neck. Another settlement, used by the Indians for fishing, was located just north of Savin Rock.

To travel from the Green to Savin Rock, the earliest residents followed the old Indian path that would later become Savin Avenue: For it wasn't until 1865 that Campbell Avenue would be completed through to the shore; and it wasn't until sometime after 1920 that Kelsey Avenue would be cut through all the way from Savin Avenue to Main Street.


What we refer to as Kelsey Hill is actually composed of shale and schist (known to geologists as Cheshire-Holyoke complex soil), types of light gray rock made of clay particles which are cemented together and which usually can be split into thin slabs. In the area of Kelsey Hill, this stone is covered with a very thin layer of soil.

The remaining open space covered with trees and vegetation has helped to protect the area of the hill from water runoff problems on the streets and in the homes.

There was an article in The New Haven Register dated Dec. 22, 1912, which chronicled the growth and development of West Haven, Borough of Orange, Connecticut during that era. Citing an endless building boom, the article described West Haven as offering a "semi-country life of leisure" with "unlimited woodland for the nature lover."

Offering employment opportunities at seven nearby factories, West Haven was also just a thirty-minute trolley ride to the many factories of New Haven. West Haven's amenities in that period offered access to numerous schools, plus a public library, several churches and a downtown shopping district.

Charles E. Graham was the only surviving son of James Graham, who was active in Connecticut politics and had made his fortune in

manufacturing. Raised into a family of excelling achievers, Charles Graham received a superb education before joining his father in 1880 as a partner in James Graham and Company, where he gained the experience necessary to take over the company upon his father's death in 1900. Charles Graham was one of the founders of the West Haven Manufacturing Company, maker of hacksaw blades and power-driven hacksaw machines, and located at the intersection of Elm Street and Water Street.

He also had a hand in many other endeavors, including newspaper, railroad and manufacturing concerns, along with leadership positions in local and state governments. His weekends were spent yachting on Long Island Sound. Charles Graham remained a very active force in West Haven until his death in 1926.

It should therefore come as no surprise that Charles Graham owned a significant portion of West Haven real estate, covering much of southern Kelsey Hill.

In 1903, Charles Graham sold a few acres of Graham Manor to John L. Sherman, a builder and masonry tractor

Sherman saw in this piece of land a source of raw materials: the shale and schist there were abundant, close to the surface and would be easy to transport, for the quarry Sherman envisioned was close to Savin Avenue. The quarried stone would be used in the construction of building foundations and also as a raw material for the processing of mortar. Evidence of Sherman's quarry can still be seen along lower Basset Street.

To this day there exists a document, "Map of Graham Manor," dated 1912 and "Developed by Charles Graham." The map entails

most of Kelsey Hill, and was prepared in order to demonstrate the proposed creation of streets and housing lots to be created on this shale hill which was covered with a thin layer of soil and many wooded acres.

This plan called for the cutting through of the then-incomplete Kelsey Avenue, and the existence of streets, houses and families on the land, some of which instead would become Painter Park.

Homes located on Kelsey Hill would have been very attractive to new families: Nearby were the central shopping district and public transportation via trolley, as well as access to West Haven's beaches and the Savin Rock amusement area.

The ceremony observed West Haven's secession from Orange a century ago. West Haven and North Milford joined in 1822 to form the town of Orange. The rural and residential sections of Orange separated in 1921 when the residential part, West Haven, became the state's youngest town.

After remarks by city Treasurer Michael P. Last, the master of ceremonies, The Pop Rocks hit the stage running — and sporting the era-defining fashion that was all the rage.

The five-piece band opened with a medley of Europe's "The Final Countdown" and Loverboy's "Working for the Weekend" and followed with an array of the best pop and rock from the decade of decadence, including Madonna's "Material Girl," Bon Jovi's "Livin' on a Prayer" and Journey's "Don't Stop Believin'."

Men, women and children from all walks of life danced the night away, including forming an impromptu conga line with the band while performing Buster Poindexter's "Hot Hot Hot."

The Westie pride on display demonstrated the best of the

American spirit, reflecting the determination and resilience of a people who vowed to never lose hope — so much so they adopted "nil desperandum," a Latin phrase meaning "never despair," as West Haven's official motto in 1935.

People showed their patriotic colors by purchasing centennial coins, lapel pins and lawn signs from Sabo and committee member Diane Dietman at the hospitality table.

Each person who bought a \$10 lawn sign will get entered into a raffle for a chance to push a "start button" to help launch this year's fireworks. The winner and up to three guests will also dine on burgers and hot dogs under the Savin Rock Fireworks Committee's hospitality tent before and during the display.

All merchandise proceeds generated by the centennial committee will offset expenses and support the \$50,000 centennial budget approved by the City Council, Sabo said.

Local vendor JOD Designs, a veteran-owned screen printing company, sold centennial T-shirts.
