Primary candidate roll to Sept. 14

Sept. 14 promises to be an interesting one in the annals of West Haven politics. Both parties in the throes of a primary, with the winners facing off for the Nov. 2 municipal election. One candidate is determined. Former Mayor Edward O'Brien is running independent of Democratic Party apparatus.

The former two-term mayor opted out of a two-way challenge to incumbent Mayor Nancy Rossi, deciding to go it independent on Nov. 2.

Rossi, who is seeking her third term is the endorsed candidate, and is doing her part to top her remaining primary

challenger, former O'Brien Administration Executive Assistant John Lewis.

On the Republican side, no "endorsed" candidate is on the ballot – at least in the legal sense. Tenth District Councilman Barry Lee Cohen won the nomination in the party caucus in July, but a filing error nullified the endorsed slate, meaning the candidates had to petition to get on the ballot.

Meanwhile, Planning & Zoning Commissioner Steven Mullins announced his bid for the nomination just days before the caucus.

All the petitions have been filed, and all have been certified to participate in

the Sept. 14 vote.

Lewis announced his candidacy last March, knowing full well he was probably going the primary route to the nomination. He said his team used the time to not only get acquainted with voters, but to cull ideas.

"Our team used the time gathering signatures for our petitions, to speak with willing electors, introducing ourselves to others, while listening to the concerns of all regarding the state of our city," Lewis said. "Many residents spoke of a need for change, the lack of leadership, responsibility, progress and an overwhelming concern with

the taxes being so high."

Lewis said the residents are guiding his campaign and they will guide the future.

"My strategy and campaign have not changed. Residents are, and will remain my advisors. I plan to make West Haven a better place to live and do business," he said.

On the Republican side, getting the petitions and the required names to get on the ballot. For Cohen, he thought his team looked at it as a way to exhibit its commitment.

"What would have defeated the

the City of West Haven. Not only does this development clean up and beautify Allingtwn Center, but it also increased the Allingtwn grand list. The Allingtwn Green has been used for several events, like weddings, an announcement, and a concert. There will be many more events held at the Allingtwn Green.

"The author states the streets are littered with trash, broken sidewalks and blaring music. Since taking office we have repaired many sidewalks that were damaged by city trees. There have been many cleanups in Allingtwn that were organized by Councilwoman Robbin Watt Hamilton (5th District), Councilman Peter Massaro (6th District) and Councilwoman Trenee McGee (7th District).

## School-opening thoughts

Eleven days from the publication of this newspaper, the schools in West Haven will open for the 2021-2022 academic year. As we await the opening, bus schedules are finalized, teachers are preparing for another year, and parents are hoping their children will be successful in their educational pursuits. But it shouldn't stop there. Here's what we hope will happen in the coming school term:

**Drivers** - We start with the usual admonition to those commuting to and from work during the time school is in session. Children tend to be focused on what they are doing and not focused on oncoming traffic. Over the years serious accidents have happened in the city; thankfully, we have gone several years without serious mishap.

The fact remains drivers must be cognizant of children waiting for school buses and their activities. Keeping the speed limit is a good way to start with alertness to one's surroundings another plus.

That stated, we admit anecdotally we have noted an increase in the number of motorists who seem to believe flashing red lights do not apply to them. There are some drivers who believe they can wantonly disregard the school bus signals and pass the vehicles. This can result - and has resulted - in consequences of injury and death in the state and elsewhere.

Bus drivers, too, can help the situation. Again, anecdotally we have noted that flashing yellow lights for long periods of time have confused motorists on both sides of the road. The yellow caution lights are to be used to alert motorists to a stop, and our research state's it should be 100 feet prior to the actual stop, wherein the red flashing lights will be used. Some have stopped and still have the yellow lights flashing. That action has created not a little confusion.

**Teachers** - Teachers are the first line of information for students, and should teach the courses outlined in their curricula. Teachers are not purveyors of political ideologies, nor should they espouse them in their classrooms. Nationwide, and we can point to hundreds of cases where teachers stepped over the line, becoming activists.

While in our area this has not be a problem as in other places, it would be a safe bet that some teachers, especially those in the social sciences, will filter some of their material through a political point of view. That should not happen. Marxist ideologies such as Critical Race Theory and other such historically inaccurate and dangerous "isms" should be kept out of discussions and lessons.

**Parents** - Parents play a big role in the education of their children, and should keep close eye on not only daily lessons, homework, and projects, but what is being taught. School is not a day care center, and should not be. Teachers are not babysitters, but educators. Education is process that includes parental participation. Students excel in those homes where parents take an active role in monitoring children's progress. One of the biggest problems in American education is the lack of parental interest in their children's progress. All the money in the world is not going to make Johnnie read if he doesn't get help - and monitoring - at home. This nation spends more on students than most countries, and the results are poor.

The new school year brings with it new hopes and new expectations from students, teachers, and parents. By working together from the time a child leaves the home, until he comes back, we all have a role in helping to build a road to success.



## Dems what a spending spree

A trillion dollars used to be a lot of money, even in Washington.

Now, a trillion-dollar spending bill is a trifle barely worth arguing over and the stuff of bipartisan consensus.

Oscar Wilde famously said that nothing succeeds like excess, but even he might blanch at the shameless profligacy that is America's new normal.

In their wisdom, Senate Republicans decided to help President Joe Biden pass a portion of his blow-out fiscal agenda, a \$1.2 trillion infrastructure bill that is a prelude to an even bigger, vastly more consequential \$3.5 trillion reconciliation bill.

The infrastructure bill itself is, as fiscal analyst Brian Riedl of the Manhattan Institute notes, "one of the largest non-emergency spending bills of the past 50 years."

Republicans told themselves that only about half, \$550 billion, is new spending, and that by going along they can take the heat off of Democratic moderates Kyrsten Sinema and Joe Manchin, who are being constantly pressured to ditch the filibuster.

Perhaps, but there's no doubt that the GOP has

blessed, and lent a bipartisan imprimatur, to a portion of the president's hoped-for historic spending spree. In so doing, they have taken at least a little ownership of an agenda they should want no part of.

Republicans will have much less influence, and perhaps none, on the next spate of spending, which is the so-called "soft" infrastructure (aka, a wish list of progressive social programs) after the "hard" infrastructure in the bipartisan bill (roads, bridges, rail).

Under the reconciliation process, tax and spending bills evade the filibuster in the Senate, so Democrats can pass whatever they want so long as they hold all 50 of their senators.

The sheer numbers here are jaw dropping. Including the \$1.9 trillion so-called COVID-19 relief bill from earlier this year, Biden wants to spend nearly \$6 trillion in three measures passed within months of each other. In 2019, by point of comparison, the entire federal budget was \$4.4 trillion (and at the time, President Trump wasn't exactly tightening the country's fiscal belt).

The tide of new spending will add to already extraordinary levels of red ink.

The White House projects that the U.S. debt will reach 109.7% of GDP this year, higher than at the end of World War II when we had abandoned all fiscal restraint to win an existential struggle against two expansionistic totalitarian empires.

The Senate instructions for the reconciliation bill say that only half of it has to be paid for. Democrats will claim a dog's breakfast of purported savings and painless revenue increases, but the bulk of the new dollars will have to come from a tax increase that easily could rank as one of the biggest ever.

The parameters of the reconciliation bill were crafted by the socialist chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, Bernie Sanders, and it shows.

The priorities read like crib notes from his old presidential campaigns. The bill would add new government programs for the young and the old, from universal pre-K to tuition-free community college, to family and medical leave, to expansions of Obamacare and Medicare.

It would make a big nod to the Green New Deal with a slew of new clean energy initiatives, including "smart agri-

culture" and "environmental justice," and the creation of a Civilian Climate Corps, a climate-alarmist homage to FDR.

It is a sign of the insane ambition of Biden's Democrats that they hope as well to include a sweeping amnesty for illegal immigrants in the bill, a measure that is sure to be struck by the Senate parliamentarian on procedural grounds.

Relatively moderate Democrats in the Senate and the House, where the party also has little margin for error, have grumbled about the size of the reconciliation bill. It will be up to them to decide whether the party steps back from the precipice or goes all-in on Biden-Sanders fiscal radicalism.

## Historian's corner

### To Savin Rock in a Packard

This week we present a young girl's memories of a long-ago summer day, spent at Savin Rock. Our thanks to Valerie Forte for this story, written by her mother, the late Loretta BonTempo Forte:

On Derby Avenue across from the Maltby Lake falls stands a brick building that was a landmark to those of us who resided near-by.

It was the Doherty and Scott Garage, and Mr. Doherty and Mr. Scott, the proprietors, lived in side-by-side houses and were our neighbors, in the early 1920s. Mr. Scott lived in a large stone house and Mr. Doherty's fine house was brown. As children we would walk up to the garage, there was no traffic then, and we'd pull our 'express' wagon to bring them fresh fruit or vegetables from our garden. My older brothers also did errands for the garage owners. Mr. Scott and his wife were especially kind and his appearance always reminded me of Santa Claus. They had no children of their own, that we ever knew, and I think they were especially fond of my brother Peter, and me, because we were little, and I was sweet and shy.

One warm summer day Mrs. Scott called my mother and asked if they could take Peter and me to Savin Rock. We would have the opportunity to ride through West Haven in their large Packard car. We quickly washed and put on our best clothes. My hair was tied back with a huge bow.

I remember seeing beautiful big houses along the waterfront, and we learned that our destination was Wilcox Pier Restaurant! THE place to go! We had heard of the delicious ice cream that was elegantly served there. I know now that they were probably known for a more lavish cuisine, but we didn't care – and it was a wonderful warm day for a special treat – something we had also heard about, but never had, an ice cream soda!

Before our stop at Wilcox's, however, we were taken to the "flying horses", of course, I didn't know that the horses actually "flew" up and down, and I was a small child, so I didn't actually ride a horse, I will now admit, I sat in one of the fancy big seats. My brother Peter, who was a year younger, rode a horse that bobbed up and down. Peter was more outgoing, so while

Peter gleefully rode up and down, up, and down, I sat and enjoyed my Merry-go-Round experience sitting next to the understanding Mrs. Scott.

Wilcox's was known for the long pier that extended from the back porch of the restaurant for what seemed like miles and miles, or so it seemed to me on that day, out over the water. Peter ran ahead, we walked fairly far out, while I, fearing we'd fall off, (although there were rails on each side) held tightly to Mr. and Mrs. Scott's hands.

I said that I was loving everything, and made sure to say "yes, Ma'am" "No, thank you, sir", but I was glad when they finally said we'd sit on the porch and have our ice cream sodas. We sat at round tables and our sodas were delivered. I don't know WHAT I expected, but a tall, cold, frothy glass with a straw and a long spoon was brought to each of us.

I sipped it once, I sipped it twice...tears came to my eyes. It tasted of chocolate but very 'sharp'! I was not used to the fizz of the soda water that made it seem that way! I reached for my spoon and ate some of the ice cream, I would rather have died than admit I was not entirely pleased. Peter, however, must have had the same anticipation for that sweet treat, and being more outspoken, he exclaimed, "This burns!"

The Scotts were dismayed that anything could be wrong with our sodas. I was embarrassed that Peter had revealed a flaw in our special excursion day so when they asked me how my soda was, I said, "It's good!" Peter tried to sip his

again, but the bubbles "burned his nose", so Mrs. Scott tasted Peter's soda and pronounced it to be fine. So, I tried mine again, and again, and finally I proclaimed, "Mine burns too!"

Mr. and Mrs. Scott looked at us, then looked at each other, and decided to call it a day. We returned to the beautiful Packard touring car that they had and rode home.

Ma and Pa were waiting to greet us and hear about our exciting day.

They were a little surprised to hear from us that our first glorious day at Savin Rock had come to a "bitter" end! Peter exclaimed, after we had thanked Mr. and Mrs. Scott and waved good-bye, that they had bought us a treat that burned! That is my memory of my trip to Savin Rock, and a treat at Wilcox's and my first Ice cream soda.



spirits of others, instead has created an unwavering commitment and strong bond by this extraordinary group of individuals. Each responded expeditiously while demonstrating grace and determination," he said.

Cohen said his campaign is moving and people seemed upbeat when signing the petitions.

"(People were) abundantly enthusiastic and eager to help not just with signatures but to secure a Nov. 2 victory," he said.

As far as the error prompting the petitioning, Cohen said it didn't harm the campaign overall, and he is ready to move onward.

"Mistakes happen. I hold no ill will towards those responsible for the filing error, he said.

For Mullins, his signatures are filed and he is pushing for a debate with Cohen before the September primary. He also has a running mate in the person of Councilwoman-at-Large Colleen O'Connor. O'Connor lost her bid to become an endorsed candidate in the July caucus when town committee members put the wrong first name on their ballots.

"Colleen and I worked together to get these signatures. She has put a lot of time and effort into the City of West Haven and has earned re-election," Mullins said. "This has been a team effort."

In a video message posted to Facebook, Mullins thanked his supporters and challenged Cohen to a debate,

"In this debate, we will allow West Haven's 3100-plus Republicans to decide on who will represent them against the other party in November," Mullins said.

So far, Cohen has not responded to the debate challenge.

## 16U season ends in tourney loss

The West Haven Post 71 U16 team made a run for the state tournament only to be eliminated in the opening round, 5-1 to Next Level. Enroute to the playoff run was an up-and-down road. That road started with an even record, and the hope of improving in the last weeks of the season.

It was a tough two weeks entering the final run as the Westies fell under the .500 mark during a five-game losing streak. The Westies rebounded to win a pair and are now 8-7-1 entering the final week of the regular season.

Madera and Jones laced one-out singles in the third and each advanced on a wild pitch, but neither crossed the plate. Mark Lynch walked in the fifth and a pair of walks in the seventh with one out had West Haven in business, but the Westies could not produce the big hit in the loss.

West Haven then fell in a doubleheader against the Shoreline Breakers, 8-4 and 4-0. Madera and Jones led the offense in the opener with two hits and a run scored each. Trailing 3-0, West Haven got on the board in the second when a sacrifice fly by Cruz scored Axelrod, who had walked to open the inning.

Shoreline had leads of 5-1 after four and 6-1 in the fifth, before Anthony Constantinople delivered Jesse Buonocore with a single in the fifth.

Trailing 7-2, West Haven rallied in the sixth as Madera singled, Jones doubled, and Madera scored on a single to center by Gilbert. Jones scored on a fielder's choice by Axel-

rod to get West Haven within three, but the Westies never got closer.

The Westies were held to just four hits in a game stopped after five innings in the nightcap. Axelrod led the way with two hits, and Jones and Harp also singled in the loss.

"We're from West Haven, born and raised - all of our homes are in West Haven - it was really a no-brainer" to open in the city, Collier says.




"People enjoy the crowd... and people who greet you by name when you walk in," Collier smiles.
