Storm threats shorten Festival; canceled concert rescheduled

Despite the Savin Rock Festival ending early because of an impending storm, the 2023 edition nevertheless paid homage to "the Rock," the city's legendary amusement park and the state's most popular shoreline destination for decades.

In the interest of public safety, city officials concluded the twoday festival at 5:30 p.m. Saturday because of the stormy forecast. Magic of Motown, one of Day 2's three bands, has been moved

to this Saturday at 7 p.m. in Old Grove Park on Palace Street.

Opener The Generators were able to perform Saturday afternoon and played a set of classic rock anthems.

Headliner Arena Rock Tribute is being rescheduled to a later date. Stay tuned for details.

Magic of Motown will perform a high-energy mix of R&B hits from the acclaimed catalog of Detroit's Motown Records.

The Aug. 5 concert is sponsored by West Haven Vietnam Veterans Inc. and will include food trucks and craft vendors, starting at 3 p.m.

In addition, Marenna Amusements will offer a midway of rides and games off Oak Street from 5-10 p.m. Friday and noon-10 p.m. Saturday.

Marenna will sell wristbands for unlimited rides for \$25 and a sheet of 21 tickets for \$20.

To complement the entertainment, today's West Haven Summer Concert Series will feature a twin bill: The Generators at 6 p.m., followed by the horn-powered party hits of Rubber City at 8 p.m.

Both concerts will take place in the Grove, not on the West Haven Green, and will include food trucks and craft vendors.

The "Thursday Night Live!" concerts are free and presented by the Milford Regional Chamber of Commerce and the West Haven Department of Parks and Recreation.

This year's Savin Rock Fest, albeit only a day in the historic Grove, showcased a wide variety of musical groups, rides, games and mouthwatering foods — the time-honored recipe that cemented the 20th-century Savin Rock Park as Connecticut's Coney Island.

Along with Marenna's rides and games, a row of food and dessert trucks served up burgers, hot dogs, cheesesteaks, fried dough, gyros, lobster rolls, tacos and meatball bombs, as well as cannoli, ice cream, cupcakes and kettle corn.

Despite the festival's soggy grounds from recent heavy rain, Marenna did not disappoint, offering 10 rides and four games.

The annual festival opened on Friday with welcoming remarks by Mayor Nancy R. Rossi and followed with a beautiful rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner" by Ana Garcia.

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Borer, Weinstein get party endorsements

One party's endorsements endorsed for the Board of Tax seem to be set for the November mayoral election, while another is headed to a threeway runoff to determine the nominee. The Democratic and Republican Town Committees met in their biennial caucuses over the last two weeks, with neither issuing any surprises in the nominees.

First up were the Democrats, who endorsed State Rep. Dorinda Keenan Borer (D-115) as the nominee to succeed outgoing Democrat Nany N Rossi, who did not seek a fourth term. Just days after announcing she was seeking the nod, Borer swept onto the ticket, heading a slate of 21 total candidates for office.

Her way was made virtually unopposed as former Mayor Edward M. O'Brien, who had formed an exploratory committee, dropped out. Eighth District Councilman Victory Borras, meanwhile, remains a candidate, but it is uncertain at press time whether he is going to force a primary.

The endorsed top of the ticket also includes John Lewis (City Clerk), Ron Quagliani (City Treasurer) and Eric Murillo (Tax Collector). The endorsed Board of Education candidates are Cebi Waterfield, Jonathan Jones and Heather Shea. The individuals

Appeals are Joseph Harvey and Suzanne Mink.

"I am proud to be a part of a unified slate of Democratic candidates and together our slate is laser-focused on unlocking West Haven's potential with accountability, fresh ideas, positivity and strong leadership so that together we will chart a new course for West Haven," Borer said in accepting the nomination. "The Choice in this election isn't about me or my opponents, the choice in this election is about the direction you want to see our city go in. It will be clear come November that our team's promised direction is a positive one, one that brings progress and will be all about the future."

Early last week the GOP met in its session, and as expected businesswoman Paige Weinstein came out the winner of the nomination. Her place on the ballot Is not assured as she faces a three-way primary with 2021 candidate Barry Lee Cohen seeking the nod, while longtime GOP activist Steven

> A primary in September will determine the final slate as both Mullins and Cohen sought petitions the day after the GOP caucus. Mullins had his name put in nomination, while Cohen announced days before he would forego the

floor nomination and go directly to filing a petition.

In accepting the nomination, she said unity was a goal that transcended party affiliation.

"I am grateful to the West Haven RTC for their decision and support," said Weinstein, following the convention.

His take is that O'Brien is lookin' to secure the nomination for the vacancy that Borer will leave if and when she is elected to the Actors Colony's third-floor office. She can't hold both posts, and there would hafta be a special election to fill the spot. The Demmies would post their candidate, the GOPers theirs. There won't be any primary as this is a special election.

O'Brien gits the nod, and, given the way these things seem to favor Dems, the seat, and he's set for as long as he wants the post. There are indications that's what is contemplated. We shall see.

Meawhile, Sammy did mention that whilst perusing the majority party's slate, he noticed that many names that were once a part of the political scene are back. Remember, the Dems, like all Gaul are divided into three parts. With

the ascendance of Borer, the names associated with that "province" of the party will be reappearing.

Mrs. Rossi had been the titular head of what was once known as the "Picard" faction of the party. With her ascendance came the re-emergence of people who were in power when Jon Picard was holding forthin City Hall. They were ousted when O'Brien took over in 2012, and a mix of the Borer faction people and the Morrissey faction people were the movers and shakers during that administration.

It ain't any different than three or four decades ago when it was the Johnson, Allen and Roper factions that fought for control of the party's fortunes. That revolving door was in place then and it's in place now. Things haven't changed much, only the names of them who're in control of the three clans. As they say, the more things change, etc. As we said, nothing surprising. The rest of the reshaping will happen next year when the town committee has its election of delegates. We're sure to see some movement come then.

On the GOP side, Paige Weinstein got the nod as expected. There was no surprises here cuz this is what the GOP leadership had planned all along, and every-

one knew it. The question now is who will win the primary. As we said, no surprises. Barry Lee Cohen was in City Hall almost at the stroke of 9 a.m. to get his petition for primary filed and Steve Mullins did the same a couple hours later

Nelly Nuthatch was perched nearby and sez that everything went quite according to plan at the town committee confab, candidates were nominated and seconded, including Mullins, and then voted upon and endorsed. Mrs. Weinstein in her remarks talked about unity, and being an outsider to the city's political confraternity. In that regard she might have a leg up on the others in the eyes of a certain segment of voters. We shall see.

What she has to do over the next little while is become more familiar to John and Jane Q. Nelly noted that billboards have gone up over the last few weeks touting the business and showing the Weinstein couple celebrating 40 years in business. There are no coincidences in politics. It is a clever attempt to get her face out there, no question.

Mullins has been running his campaign perty much expecting he will primary, and observers have noted that he is running a smart campaign thus far. Mullins has no problem with name or face recognition. The litany of groups, clubs, societies and pinochle groups he belongs to are as long as one's right arm. But the fack that he hasn't waited until the nominations to begin campaigning is a positive for him. It'll be interesting to see how this all pans out.

Cohen, meanwhile, eschewed the nomination process. It was perty clear whom was going to be nominated and he wasn't gonna go through a useless ritual. As stated he was in City Hall getting papers as the doors opened or thereabouts.

He needs no intro to voters as he was the GOP's candidate last time, and lost by less than 3 dozen votes in what was a very irregular election, and in this town that's saying something. We won't rehearse the isshews therein again, but suffice it to say there were some doozies brought out in court.

Tennyrate, the question to be determined here is whether he can sustain the voters who voted for him the last time – should he get by the primary.

Three-way primaries can be toss-ups when it comes to trying to figger 'em out. It is a primary, so registered Republicans will be the pool of voters. Although seriously wounded, he survived the battle and was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor eleven months later by President Harry S. Truman in November 1945.

Soderman was a lifelong resident of West Haven and a member of Annawon Lodge. He died in 1980 and is buried at the Oak Grove Cemetery. There is a monument at the base of the Bradley Point Flagpole.



Wanted: leadership

The caucuses are done, the endorsed candidates have been named, but we are a long way from knowing – at least in the case of the Republican Party – who the ultimate standard-bearer will be for the November general election. For the record, Dorinda Borer was named the Democratic nominee, and looks to have secured not only the nomination, but no internal opposition forcing a September primary.

Businesswoman Paige Weinstein was given the nod by the GOP last week but faces a three-way primary to determine the nominee. Both 2021 candidate Barry Lee Cohen, and longtime party activist Steven R. Mullins are seeking the nomination.

Our intent is not to rehearse the issues of the primary, but the attributes the candidates of either party must present to the public if the city is ever to get out of the situation it is in financially and otherwise.

Competence – In the weeks and months leading up to November, Borer and whomever her ultimate challenger is must discuss competence. It is no secret the last several years have exhibited a lack of competence in administrative decision-making, but also in general day-to-day operation. This lack of competence goes further back than just the current administration. Indeed, the problem goes back years if not decades.

The ability to direct people, move policy in departments, and change the way the city does business will need a competency not shown so far. Over the next weeks we hope all the candidates address this issue, and how they intend to alter the current track. And it goes beyond even that to putting qualified people in position to implement those decisions and policies.

Prioritization – Several key issues face the next administration from police force recruitment and retention to streamlining operations in the manner the Municipal Accountability Review Board (MARB) is espousing, to economic development and revitalization. How do the candidates propose to "hit the ground running," and what priorities do they see as the most pressing. This will be an important aspect of the campaign and might spell out the differences between them.

Cooperation – In this matter we mean not only having a good relationship with the MARB or the unions, or the department heads. Working with the City Council is a major goal we hope to see in the new administration. While we expect – and at times desire – robust disagreements in the making of policy, ultimately, the parties must come together and reach a commonality of purpose.

One of the great problems facing the city over the last several years, if not decades, was the cross-purposes we have seen at times between the legislative and executive branches. Those cross-purposes have degenerated into enmity, especially if political factionalism entered the discussions.

The next administration must be able to bring the various factions together working toward what is best for the long-term benefit of the taxpayers instead of the short-term benefit of political dealers.

In the coming weeks we hope the candidates of both parties will address these matters and offer the voters a clear direction of purpose should they be elected to office.

West Haven is in dire need of real, substantial leadership with a vision toward the future. The candidates must address that vision and how they attempt to make it a reality.



Having the same objectives

There's being fortunate in your enemies, and then there's having enemies who are helping you take the first step in your political comeback.

Donald Trump and his adversaries want profoundly different things in the long run -- Trump wants to be back in the White House; Democrats want him in an orange jumpsuit.

Yet, in the shorter term, they both are seeking the same thing -- Trump as the Republican nominee, either so he can sweep to victory (Trump's view) or be beaten again and held to account for his crimes (the Democrats' view).

The serial indictments of Trump, even if it's not their primary purpose, advance this mutual interest. With every indictment, Trump dominates media attention and rallies Republicans to his side based on charges of selective prosecution.

The routine is so predictable, it's become boring. The first indictment of a former president had some novelty, but now it feels as commonplace as a pork chop on a stick at the Iowa State Fair.

The pushback against the notion that Trump's prosecutorial pursuers know that they might as well be 'MAGA' agents is that it's too clever

by half, that Trump has these legal vulnerabilities and is simply paying the price. No theories about underhanded political motivation are necessary.

It's certainly true that Trump had major exposure in the documents case, but the Alvin Bragg indictment is gossamer-thin, and we don't know yet what Special Counsel Jack Smith has next or what District Attorney Fani Willis is working with in Fulton County, Georgia.

Consider this thought experiment: If the Justice Department and the other prosecutors knew that the indictments guaranteed a Ron DeSantis or Tim Scott nomination, would they still go through with them? If they thought they made Trump a stronger general election candidate and the favorite to beat Joe Biden, would they still pull the trigger? Or would they find some reason for forbearance when there's plenty to be said for forbearance in the first place?

It doesn't require a finegrained understanding of Republican politics to grasp what's going on. Certainly, after the passionately pro-Trump GOP reaction to the Mar-a-Lago search, it was obvious that targeting Trump would benefit him. If there were any doubt, the Trump surge in the polls after the Bragg indictment should have removed it.

Still, Trump's pursuers have persisted.

For Trump, the Leninist logic of the worse, the better applies -- the more he's indicted and the weaker the cases, the more Republicans are inclined to believe he's the victim of a politicized justice system.

For Trump's adversaries, meanwhile, quantity trumps quality; everyone gets a piece of the action, and it increases the odds that a trial or two happens before the November 2024 election.

Again, if Trump's prosecutors believed that rushing to trial would somehow boost Trump against Biden, it's hard to see them being so desperate to get him in courtrooms as soon as possible.

Of course, Trump doesn't like getting indicted more than anyone else. His denunciations of "these vicious Communists, Marxists, Fascists, and Radical Left Democrats," "THESE LUNATICS AND THUGS" who are out to get him are wholly sincere.

Rehab at Surfside

West Haven Housing Authority Executive Director John Counter, center, shows Mayor Nancy R. Rossi and Public Works Commissioner Tom J. McCarthy the dilapidated roof of the Surfside public housing complex at 200 Oak St. on July 24.

Counter led Rossi and McCarthy on a half-hour tour to show the complex's outdated roof and efficiency apartment units before long-overdue renovations are completed over the next 20 months.

The 254-unit complex is composed of efficiency and one- and twobedroom units.

In early 2020, the 12-story complex was designated as obsolete by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Counter recently announced that Savin Rock Communities Inc., which manages Surfside and other public housing properties across the city, is borrowing up to \$29.29 million for a multiphase plan to improve the authority's housing stock, including a new roof, boiler, generator and fire sprinkler at Surfside. Along with new windows and remodeled units, the complex will also receive an exterior facelift and electrical and mechanical upgrades.

The extensive project kicked off July 20.

Also touring Surfside were Housing Authority Assistant Executive Director Meagan Golde and Board of Commissioners Chair Wayne Orio and Vice Chair John R. O'Connor. They were joined by Eric Stokes, the director of facilities and modernization at Savin Rock Communities, and Karen Kravetz, Savin Rock's general counsel.

Rossi, Counter and Savin Rock Communities have been working to enhance affordable living opportunities for West Haven residents with the greatest housing needs, including older and disabled people with fixed incomes, homeless veterans and families with low incomes.

Viet Vets seek names for memorial addition

Current and former city residents who served in the Vietnam War are sought by the West Haven Vietnam Memorial Inc. Committee to have their names inscribed on a new section of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Bradley Point Park.

To qualify for name recognition on the memorial "wall," Vietnam veterans must apply and meet the following requirements:

- Applicants must live or have lived in West Haven. Veterans living in West Haven must provide proof of residence, such as a utility bill.
- Applicants must have served in-country during the Vietnam War.
- Applicants must have been honorably discharged from military service. A DD214 form (Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty) is required.

Applicants must share potential costs, if any.

The committee does not have a formal application. Veterans must mail all documents, which are due Oct. 1, to West Haven Vietnam Veterans, City Hall, lower level, 355 Main St., West Haven 06516.

Those with questions can call Bill at 203-521-2356, Steve at 475-655-2993 or Paul at 203-500-2159.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial includes a black granite wall inscribed with the names of those from West Haven who served or gave their lives in Vietnam from 1959 to 1975, along with three white flagpoles draped with the American, Connecticut and prisoner-of-war flags.

The memorial, dedicated Nov. 12, 2003, also includes a black granite map of the four battle districts of Vietnam bearing the inscription "All Gave Some, Some Gave All," as well as five bronze insignia markers atop black granite posts representing each branch of the U.S. armed forces.



Trump and his enemies may despise one other, but they are working toward the same immediate outcome, i.e., a high-stakes, hate-filled, Third World-ish Trump-Biden rematch with the possibility of jail for one of the contenders if he loses and intense prosecutorial scrutiny for the other if he comes up short.

And everything so far indicates that they're going to get it.

Scholarship to honor lost brother

An alumna of St. Lawrence School is looking to memorialize a family member through establishing a sustaining scholarship to the parochial school in his name.

Michelle M. Lorenzo-Caprio is attempting to establish the John Lorenzo, Jr. Scholarship for deserving students attending the school.

The scholarship will be established through a non-profit organization, Do Good, Feel Good, Inc. and will provide an ongoing scholarship, though final plans on just how the grant will be administered and its criteria are still to be determined.

"I spoke with Mr. (Frank) Arnone, principal at St Lawrence, so he knows my efforts and ideas," Caprio said. "I would like to provide a scholarship to a student to attend in memory of John."

A meeting between herself, Arnone, Fr. Jose Mercado, pastor, and Bambi Grestini, the new Director of Alumni Services, was planned for this week. In the meantime, Caprio has begun efforts to fund the scholarship.

Westies Nutrition, 153 Sawmill Road, is teaming up with Caprio, hosting a giveback day to help raise funds. Patrons who come in from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. will be helping with the effort. Letters have been sent to friends of both Caprio and her late brother, hoping to enlist help, and Facebook has been utilized.

"The event at Westies Nutrition will have a few raffles and they will be giving 10% back of the day's sales," Caprio said. "Both my daughter's Michaela and Chloe, John's only nieces, will be working at the event."

Caprio remembered her years at SLS, but said her brother made a big impression during his years there, graduating in 1984.

He then attended West Haven High School, Class of 1988. Never married, he went into the business world, finally working for Yale-New Haven Hospital until he was diagnosed with an illness that eventually led to his death on Sept. 21, 2020, four days shy of his 50th birthday.

"He was well loved and respected and was an assistant

coach to several semi-pro football teams in the area," Caprio said. "He was the kindest, most loving man, who was loved by so many and is truly missed."

According to Kathleen Joyce, outgoing Director of Alumni Relations at the school, there are programs in place, but none similar to that which Caprio is proposing.

"We currently have an alumnus, Tom Prete, Class of 1976, who graciously provides a \$500 scholarship for seventh graders (moving into eighth grade) who exhibit promise in engineering. Tom is the VP of Military Engineering at Pratt and Whitney<" she said. In addition, the Sisters of St. Joseph, who opened and ran the school for almost 100 years, provided a \$10,000 scholarship, which was used for students in 2020. This is, however, the first time an alum is raising money in honor of her brother, to provide full tuition assistance to one student."





At the festival's hospitality tent, Sabo sold signed copies of the book "City of West Haven: Village to Town" from the West Haven Centennial Cel-

ebration in 2021, along with DVDs of the Savin Rock documentary, "See Ya at the Rock!"

West Haven's flagship festival, established by the Chamber of Commerce, debuted on July 24, 1982, to bring organizations, clubs, businesses and families together for a summer festival that celebrates life in one of America's oldest maritime communities.

From the dawn of the Savin Rock House hotel in 1838, the Rock had long been a resort hub until it was officially incorporated as an amusement park by the Savin Rock Park Co. on Memorial Day 1925, when it opened to 300,000 visitors and 66,000 automobiles in one spectacular day.

For the next 40 years, the storied seaside park captured the hearts and imaginations of "Rock rats" young and old. "The playground of New England" closed on Sept. 21, 1966, to make way for the Savin Rock Urban Renewal Project.

regional and national music talent to produce an "intimate and uniquely special experience for guests."







The new soon to be inductees include Jackie Coyle (Tinker Blake Community Service Award), Shannon Connor Lang, Monica Yanez, Fred DeDomenico, Rich Boshea, and Mark Anquillare, George Hines, and Mike SanGiovanni, who comprised one of the best lines in the history of West Haven hockey.

With eight new members, there will now be 203 inductees in the prestigious club since the start two decades ago.

Yanez is a 2010 graduate who starred in girls soccer, indoor track and field, and outdoor track and field. The threesport star played all four years in each sport.

Playing for coach John Camara, Yanez was an outside midfielder, while starring in the 100 meter hurdles, 300 meter hurdles, long jump and triple jump for Hall of Fame track coach Modestine Vaughn.

The Cheshire resident went on to play all three sports at the University of New Haven where she graduated Cum Laude in 2014 with a degree in Chemical Engineering / Chemistry.

Boshea is a 1979 graduate, who is now the head football coach at the high school. Affectionately known as Coach Bo, Boshea has been the head football coach at West Haven since legendary coach Ed McCarthy retired, taking over the reign in 2015.

Boshea has been with the football program since 1985 as an assistant coach, helping lead the Blue Devils to state titles in 1986, 1987, 1989, and

In 2002, Boshea was named the Assistant Coach of the Year. He was named a 2006 Jimmy Fund Award winner, and he is a 3-time Southern Connecticut Conference Coach of the Year.

Boshea is also a member of the Widener University Athletic Hall of Fame as a member of the National Championship team, he and has also been inducted into the District League Foot-

DeDomenico had a 37-year teaching career, 33 of which were in West Haven. His teaching at West Haven led to his involvement in the West Haven High School sports community.

An assistant coach for the football program at West Haven for six years, DeDomenico was a key piece to the 1968 undefeated football team as one of the offensive line coaches. His teachings led to a bruising ground game as the Westies took home the title.

DeDomenico may be most remembered for his achievements with the swimming teams as he started the program from the ground up. Coaching for several years without West Haven having a pool, DeDomenico was instrumental in having the West Haven pool built.

The inaugural coach led the team for 16 years and was honored with the scoreboard in the pool being named in his honor.

DeDomenico is a member of the New Haven Gridiron Club High School Hall of Fame, and he was also a recipient of the West Haven Twilight League Gold Bat Award.

Coyle is being recognized as the Tinker Blake Community Service Award recipient, as he is universally appreciated with great affection by generations of West Haven hockey players and enthusiasts for his lifelong dedication to the sport and a friend to many.

Hired in November of 1969 by the West Haven Board of Education, Coyle began his 31-year career at the Edward L. Bennett Rink as only the second fulltime hire at the rink.

During Coyle's tenure, the Bennett Rink became known as one the finest, if not the finest, ice hockey facility in Connecticut. From the playing surface to overall upkeep and cleanliness, the rink was unmatched, due in large part to Coyle's dedication and hard work.

A longtime member of the West Haven Penalty Box Club, Coyle received the club's Appreciation Award for his years of dedication and service to West Haven hockey upon his retirement in each season is named in Coyle's honor.

Connor Lang is a 2011 graduate, starring in three different sports. The versatile athlete was a 4-year starter on the softball field for Hall of Fame coach Frank Biondi, played three years of volleyball for John Anderson and Kate Coldren, and two years of basketball for Jim Egan.

Playing for Biondi, Connor Lang rang up the honors on the softball field as she finished her career with over 100 hits, was named the team's Most Valuable Player in 2009 and 2010, and she helped her team to the state quarterfinals in 2010.

Connor Lang was named to the Connecticut High School Coaches Association Class LL All-State teams in 2009 and 2010, was a New Haven Register All-Area and All-State selection in 2010, was named to the Academic All-State team in 2011, and was the Scholar Athlete of the Year in 2011. Connor Lang was also an All-Quinnipiac Division selection in 2009, 2010, and 2011.

Named team Rookie of the Year in both volleyball and basketball, Connor Lang played every position in her high school career in volleyball, and she was a guard on the basketball court.

The 3-sport star was named captain of her volleyball and softball teams as a senior. Connor Lang, who finished fourth in her class academically, went on to play Division II softball at Bentley University, where she was named captain her senior year.

At Bentley, Connor Lang was named to the Academic All North-East 10 Conference Softball team (2014, 2015), placed on the All-Northeast-10 Conference softball third team (2013), and finished with 100 career hits. Connor Lang is tied for seventh in program history for most hits, and fourth in program history for most singles.

As part of one of the most feared hockey lines in the state in 1984, San-Giovanni was a force to be reckoned with. Finishing his high school career with 103 career points, SanGiovanni's senior year was every bit impressive.

The senior co-captain and right wing under legendary and Hall of Fame coach Art Crouse finished his senior campaign in 1984 with 20 goals, 25 assists and 45 points, joining the 100-point club in the state championship season.

A 4-year player, SanGiovanni was named to the All-Tournament Second Team and All-State Second Team his senior campaign. SanGiovanni was also a co-recipient of the Michael Green Scholarship Fund.

SanGiovanni was a 4-year player on the baseball diamond as well under Hall of Fame coach George Hanchette, making his mark in the outfield on the state championship team in 1984.

A 4-year player, who graduated in 1984, Anquillare was another key player on the famed all-star line under

A center for the Westies, Anquillare was an All-District selection in 1983 and 1984, and an All-State selection in 1984 when he finished with 24 goals and 34 assists for 58 points.

Anguillare finished his hockey career at West Haven with 52 goals and 64 assists and a member of the esteemed 100-point club. The West Haven sniper went on to play collegiate hockey at the University of Notre Dame.

Hines was a four-year hockey star, who was also from the class of 1984. A forward and senior co-captain, Hines finished with 74 career points, including 45 in the memorable senior cam-

As part of the 1984 state championship team, Hines finished the season with 21 goals and 24 assists, being named to the All-District Second Team and Honorable Mention All-State. Playing for coaches Crouse and Art DeLucia, the prolific scorer had his number 15 retired following the campaign.

Field Turf to recycle Ken Strong's carpet

FieldTurf, a world leader in artificial turf, is enhancing Ken Strong Stadium and the Frank Biondi Softball Field this week by replacing the fields and track while recycling the old material. This project puts West Haven High School as the first school in Connecticut, and just one of the first 10 in the entire country, to have FieldTurf recycle its old field.

"We are excited to partner with West Haven to provide them with a safe and attractive facility, while also maximizing our recycling efforts by being the first field in Connecticut to be sent to our internal recycling center instead of adding to a landfill," said Andrew Dyjak, Regional Vice President New England.

The project encompasses replacing the synthetic turf field at Ken Strong Stadium, a new track, and a natural grass-to-turf conversion on the softball field. The old fields are net-zero carbon emissions, so everything gets recycled.

In some turf-replacement projects, the carpet and InFill would be tossed in a dumpster or landfill, but FieldTurf instead used large white bags to put all recycled materials in, which are then shipped out for recycling. Additionally, the rolled-up carpets and InFill were loaded onto a truck to bring to FieldTurf's newest facility in Wilkes-Barre, Pa.

At the facility, which is the largest of its two plants, FieldTurf will separate the InFill from the carpet. During this process, the InFill is separated and cleaned into separate sand and rubber, and is repurposed for other projects. The carpet, meanwhile, gets shipped to one of FieldTurf's partners that makes plastic wood composites.

Field Turf is working on laying down a new artificial surface at Ken Strong Stadium in time for the fall sports season. The old carpet is being recycled by the company. The Westies fell in the nightcap, 7-3, as they managed just three hits in the contest. Cruz knocked in a pair with a double in the sixth, but West Haven never got closer after scoring three in the inning.


