ArtWestCT opens dedicated space

A two-office suite on the lower level of a city building officially became an art space. With the ribbon cutting ceremony complete, Sept. 19, at 377 Main St., the venue is now the headquarters for Arts-WestCT -- whose mission is to center creative expression by and for the West Haven community. From its new space, the organization can support rotating exhibitions, an Artists Lending Library, and the launch of monthly First Friday celebrations, interspersed with special events.

Sharing the space as a second tenant and ArtsWestCT's programming partner is Umbrella Impact, a 501(c) (3) youth development organiza-

"If you are a creator with a vision, we'll help you develop and realize it," said ArtsWest-CT President Elinor Slomba as she addressed approximately 30 city and state officials, and supporters assembled by the West Haven & Milford Regional Chamber of Commerce.

Slomba explained some of the features offered with the new headquarters.

"For the Artists Lending Library, we have useful items like a professional PA system, a 10X10 vending tent, a set of wooden easels, and a slide projector for loan to creative people who may need them for an event or a presentation. These things that are not always easy to access but can make a huge difference to their success," she said. "Along with that, we offer technical assistance with event planning and promo-

Slomba admitted the space is limited, but is only the start of what is hoped to be a expansive future.

"These are humble beginnings, but we have a track record of delivering on what we say we're going to do, like Make Music Day which was a partnership with the Early Childhood Council and enjoyed a great deal of momentum between its first and second year. Now we are part-

Ferraro is 'primo italiano'

Mayor Nancy R. Rossi and the West Haven Italian Heritage Committee will honor Republican state Rep. Charles J. Ferraro as the city's "primo italiano" at the 24th annual Italian Heritage Celebra-

Ferraro, a world-class martial artist and an ambassador of his proud Italian heritage, will receive the Italian American of the Year award at noon Friday at City Hall, 355 Main St.

The award is bestowed annually on an Italian resident or couple who personifies service in West Haven's close-knit Italian

Accompanied by Italian music and guided by Rossi, members of the committee and the West Haven Italian American Civic Association will escort Ferraro, the grandson of emigrant grandparents from the Campania capital of Naples, Italy, to the steps of City Hall for his special recognition. An Italian-flavored lunch will

"When I received the phone call from the honorable Nancy R. Rossi, mayor of West Haven, that they had selected me as West Haven's Italian American of the Year, my first thought was, 'Wow, me? Are you sure?" said a surprised Ferraro, a Republican whip and member of the General Assembly's Italian American Legislative Caucus.

"Growing up here in West Haven as the son of a poor Italian mother and an Irish stepfather, where just about every personal major accomplishment was a first for our family, I could never even contemplate that someday I would be receiving such a distinguished recognition," he said. "I am both grateful and honored that Mayor Rossi and the West Haven Italian Heritage Committee named me as their Italian of the Year."




1962 -- James Bond makes his theatrical debut. The fictional British spy with the code name 007 was featured on the big screen for the first time in Dr. No.

A very familiar pattern

It was an all-too familiar situation, one taxpayers in this city have seen over and over, with the same results: no development. The much-heralded plan to bring the New England Brewing Company (NEBCO) into the city fell apart last month, and the owners have investigated other area communities to expand their business. It was just too much of a hassle.

After months of negotiations, plan changes, and attempts to mollify litigation brought by the owners of Jimmies Restaurant. Martin Juiliano told Mayor Nancy Rossi, NEBCO's director of business development, the revised lease plan was "off the table." The reason: lack of support from "some City Council members, a few Land Trust of West Haven members, and an appeal by Jimmies' ownership on the revised plan. Announced in the fall of 2021 and approved in August of 2023, NEBCO would demolish the decaying Savin Rock Conference Center, and replace it with a restaurant/brewing facility. All the approvals fell into place, and it seemed a go.

Under the terms, the 60-year ground lease allowed for the city to maintain ownership of the 4.38-acre property while allowing the developer to demolish the conference center and construct a 46,165-squarefoot building that would include a brewery, a taproom and event space. According to the agreement at the time, Douglas Gray, principal of the Delawarebased parent company, would pay the city rent and serve as the brewery's landlord at its "forever home" in the city. Almost immediately, the problems started. Jimmies brought litigation, contesting setbacks to the property adjacent to Savin Rock proper. Gray attempted to prevent litigation by scaling back the original plan, reducing the square footage, eliminating the brewery, and renovating, not demolishing the existing structure.

At the Aug. 28 council meeting, members of the public and City Council voiced "concerns" over the new agreement, prompting the owners to give up, and look elsewhere. The developer had two other offers that were more accepting of the business' con-

We supported the plan with some reservations, but those concerned the Savin Rock Museum, which we wanted to see preserved. The plan itself seemed like a boost to the shorefront and would offer a reason for people to come down to the shore. Like other communities we must draw people to our most precious resource.

Mayor Rossi, understandably, voiced her frustration not only with the council, but with the Land Trust. We have come to a point where there seems to be opposition, no matter what is proposed, including by businesses that seem a bit afraid of a little competition.

The need for some style of commercial development in keeping with the shore's beauty is paramount. The problem is, and this includes the Land Trust membership, we know what they do not want, we can never figure out what they favor.

We proposed a select committee of city officials, Land Trust members, and members of the public of no more than 15 members to draft a white paper outlining those types of commercial outlets that would be acceptable. It seems the only way this type of announcement-revision-rejection circus can be prevented in the future. We must come to grips with the idea some type of commercial development - enhancing the shore – is necessary. Putting a plan in place might prevent future missteps.



Misogyny is not the problem

Poor Kamala Harris. The alleged misogyny that is tearing at her vice presidency apparently extends to highly partisan Democratic leaders such as Jamie Raskin and Nancy Pelosi.

Both of them caused ripples when their praise for Harris in recent TV interviews was notably cool, as if they were at a high-end fundraising dinner and hated the escargot but had to try to convince the hostess that they really loved it.

The Biden campaign reportedly contacted both Raskin and Pelosi. The Maryland conto say that Harris is "unquestionably the best running mate for President Biden in 2024," while the former House Speaker's office pointed to the favorable things she said about Harris in her initial interview.

What Raskin and Pelosi clearly know, if they can't say it out loud, is that Joe Biden botched his vice-presidential pick; it is the worst pick in half a century and easily one of the worst in the last 80 years.

As Democrats begin to realize Biden's political weakness, with Donald Trump barreling down the pike, Harris is one of the factors -- although not the main one -- keeping them from doing anything about it. What if someone did con-

vince Biden to step aside for the good of the party? Well, that might open the way for Harris herself to become the nominee. In other words, out of the pan and into the fire.

Even if she lost in an open nominating process, it'd be quite the spectacle for Democrats to turn away a potentially "historic" presidential nominee for someone else.

So, she's at least a playing a role in the propping up of what may prove the weakest incumbent presidential candidate since George H.W. Bush.

This isn't the only downside. gressman revised his remarks Harris is going to be an issue next year because everyone realizes there's a significant chance that Biden wouldn't be able to serve out a full second

> Typically, a vice president's popularity matters only for his or her own political ambitions; this time, it could make a difference in the presidential race because her standing is, in a word, abysmal.

> In the new NBC News poll, the theme of which is that Biden and Trump are both abidingly unpopular, Harris is right there with them. At 31%, her positive rating is lower than both of theirs, and her negative rating, 51%, is higher than Biden's.

The bar Biden needed to clear in his vice-presidential pick wasn't high. He either needed a political nonentity or a popular entity who ideally had some governing credibility; instead, he went with the unpopular nonentity.

How does this rank with prior bad choices? As it happens (funny how this works), the most maligned recent picks are all Republicans.

Let's run through them. Sarah Palin was not suited to be president of the United States but was a Hail Mary in a basically unwinnable race, so we should discount that pick for inconsequence. Dick Cheney was a governing choice who, despite all the obloquy heaped on him, performed admirably. Dan Quayle's reputation was destroyed by the press, but he didn't play into George H.W. Bush's fate one way or the other.

I think to find a worse major-party pick -- and actual vice president --you have to go back to Spiro Agnew. At least, as far as we know, Harris hasn't been taking kickbacks that will force her to resign -- in fact, she may be the relatively ethical half of the Biden-Harris ticket.

Prior to that, you probably have to go back to Henry Wallace, whom Democrats thank See Lowry, page 7

Fall allergy suffering can be manageable

Although we typically associate allergy season with the spring, for many allergy sufferers, the fall can be just as bad. Ragweed and mold are the biggest triggers of allergies this time of year.

As we approach the peak of fall allergy season, pollen and mold spores are reaching extreme levels and rapidly spreading outside. Symptoms of fall allergies may include itchy nose, watery eyes, sneezing, runny nose, nasal congestion, headaches, ear itching or popping, and throat irritation.

Many times, people unknowingly bring these allergens into their homes, making the effects worse for everyone else in the family. Indoor air quality experts offer say the most common allergens can be alleviated by a few helpful tips.

There are two types of allergens common in the fall thatenter our homes.

Ragweed -- Ragweed is the most comment fall allergen. Its pollen is very small and highly concentrated. It begins to release in late August, peaks in September, and may last

until the first freeze kills the plant.

Pollen counts are highest around the plants near dawn, but they can travel hundreds of miles and releases in most other areas between 1 a.m. and 3p.m. About 75 percent of people allergic to spring plants also have reactions to ragweed.

Outdoor Mold -- Mold spore counts tend to rise dramatically in the autumn season with falling leaves and dying plants.

Mold thrives in moist conditions like piles of damp leaves. Counts often jump in early autumn as leaves fall from trees but before the drier humidity conditions of winter set in. Rainy autumn and winter seasons may lead to very high outdoor mold counts that can last several days after each rainfall.

Gardening in mulch or dirt, farming or hiking in the woods can also increase exposure to mold spores this time of year.

Here are five tips to keep your home allergy-free this fall.

to release in late August, peaks The First Heat - Dust mites, in September, and may last mold and other allergens in a

home's vents can be activated when people turn on the heat the first time in the fall. Before running the heat, get your air ducts cleaned and change the filter. The National Air Duct Cleaners Association (NADCA) suggests cleaning air ducts every 3-5 years. It is recommended to use filters with a MERV (Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value) rating between 8 and 10 and a thickness of one inch.

Keep the Outdoors Out – When coming inside, it is important to remove shoes and wipe down pets to avoid tracking in allergens. Wear a mask when raking leaves to avoid breathing mold spores and change clothes after doing yard work to prevent the spread of pollen around the house. Limit your pets' time outside and wipe them down to remove pollen when they come indoors.

Purify the Air – Most air purifiers have HEPA filters that remove up to 99 percent of airborne allergens, including pollen, dust and pet dander



and mold spores. A midpriced model can cost \$50-125, for a room-sized system. Place it in your bedroom, where you spend most of your time and can result in better sleep as well.

Close the windows – Although it may be tempting to open the window to let in some cool, "fresh" fall air, you are also inviting allergens into your home. Pollen counts are

typically the highest in the mid-morning through late afternoon.

Halt the Humidity – Growth of mold indoors comes in damp areas such as basements and bathrooms. Use a dehumidifier to keep these areas dry and the humidity levels between 30 and 50 percent. Mold grows best at humidity levels of 60 percent or higher.

Viet Vets seek names; deadline date changed

Current and former city residents who served in the Vietnam War are sought by the West Haven Vietnam Memorial Inc. Committee to have their names inscribed on a new section of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Bradley Point Park.

To qualify for name recognition on the memorial "wall," Vietnam veterans must apply and meet the following requirements:

- Applicants must live or have lived in West Haven. Veterans living in West Haven must provide proof of residence, such as a utility bill.
- Applicants must have served in-country during the Vietnam War.
- Applicants must have been honorably discharged from military service. A DD214 form (Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty) is required.

Applicants must share potential costs, if any.

The committee does not have a formal application. Veterans must mail all documents, which are due **Jan. 1**, to West Haven Vietnam Veterans, City Hall, lower level, 355 Main St., West Haven 06516.

Those with questions can call Bill at (203) 521-2356, Steve at (475) 655-2993 or Paul at (203) 500-2159.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial includes a black granite wall inscribed with the names of those from West Haven who served or gave their lives in Vietnam from 1959 to 1975, along with three white flagpoles draped with the American, Connecticut and prisoner-of-war flags.

The memorial, dedicated Nov. 12, 2003, also includes a black granite map of the four battle districts of Vietnam bearing the inscription "All Gave Some, Some Gave All," as well as five bronze insignia markers atop black granite posts representing each branch of the U.S. armed forces.





Westies Nutrition is the place where these delicious mixtures, as well as many others, can be yours. The cafe, which will celebrate its fourth anniversary next month, opened a few months before the world shut down - and made it through very successfully, a tribute to the panache and community spirit of its owners, Amanda Forst and Mandy Hutchinson.

The menu features coffees, smoothies and tea, all packed with nutritional benefits. The smoothies are meals in disguise, boasting the required daily amount of nutrients -- 21 vitamins and minerals, and 24 grams of protein - all for fewer than 250 calories.

All teas are green tea-based and contain the proper amount of stimulating guarana extract for you - for a slight boost or more. Vitamin B12 is a popular ingredient as well as acai, and, if desired, you can add collagen, probiotics, protein or, as Forst notes the teachers are all doing right now, the immunty boost.

All sweetening is done with stevia, and the guarana provides a clean energy boost with none of the jitters or crash of traditional caffeine (pink-and-orange and green-and-white spots, we're once again glancing in your general direction).

Forst, who hails from Wethersfield, lived in Los Angeles for seven years, where these sorts of shops are commonplace.

Noting that she struggled with her weight, Forst lost 27 lb. taking advantage of the nutritional drinks and when she returned to the Nutmeg State, wanted to open such a shop here. Mandy, a born and bred Westie, came into the frame

and, as she explains it, "caught the vision."

"This town poured so much into me that I knew this would be the perfect place to give back...this place raised me," Hutchinson says, joyfully. "The customers are our extended family."

"We're West Haven's Cheers," adds Forst. "Everybody knows your name...we know about the customers and care about them, their kids, their kids' T-Ball games..."

The most popular smoothie is the White Chocolate Reese's: "like a healthy peanut butter cup, *in* a cup," laughs Hutchinson. As for the most popular item?

It's not on the menu, but a very well-known secret: the Black Widow. Originally begun just for the Halloween season, this berry-based tea proved so popular it's now available year-round.

"People drive from far away to get the Black, Widow," Frost says, "It's a special house blend."

She estimates that as much as 80% of the tea orders are Black Widow requests, adding with a smile that "I think the West Haven Police Department runs on Black Widows!"

Frost and Hutchinson, two moms with a toddler each, understand what it's like for families in today's stressful climate. They have kids' size drinks (from the non-acai/caffeine selections) and they also anticipate the financial stressors of today. "We want to give the most value for your dollar...we don't take you spending your money for granted," Forst says. "We're in the same economy as everyone else."

The ladies also highly value their community involvement. They got through Covid very successfully - a brand new business - and never let up on it from the beginning, donating meals to nurses in New York and even toilet paper to Those Without.

Their community spirit continues apace. "We do about two fundraisers a month," says Forst. UNH, the West Ha-

ven High School sports teams, local organizations such as the Beach Box, and causes like breast cancer and Alzheimer's are just a very few of the happy recipients to which Westies has extended its largesse. They have donated more than funds, too - free tea to the sports teams, for example. And their cafe is always available for a space for hosting community events.

As they speak, a fellow walks in and they greet him by name as he greets them, bemoans the humidity and goes to get four large beverages.

"People tell us, 'I leave, and I feel so much better'," Forst continues.

If you look at the bottom of your cup at Westies, you'll see that every one is hand-inscribed with the word "love" - Forst and Hutchinson's way of sending good vibrations. "Our mission," Forst says, "Is to remind people that they matter."

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# Historian's corner

## Bringing Clockmaking to New Haven

Chauncey Jerome, founder of the Jerome Manufacturing Company, started his career in 1816, working in Plymouth, Connecticut for Eli Terry. At this time, Terry was just beginning mass production of his famous thirty hour wooden-movement clock. Two years later, Jerome went into business for himself, making clock cases that he traded with Eli Terry in exchange for wooden movements. His first shop was located in Bristol, Connecticut; there he produced clocks with both wooden and brass movements, created with interchangeable parts and mass-production techniques.

By 1837, Jerome's company

was the leader in the clockmaking industry. In 1844, with overseas sales increasing, he bought a bankrupt carriage factory on St. John Street in New Haven, so as to be conveniently close to shipping and the nascent railroad transportation which would become the New Haven Railroad. There he would draw upon an abundant and growing labor pool to produce and finish clock cases, while the clock movements continued to be built in Bristol. Soon thereafter, Jerome's Bristol works were completely destroyed by fire; subsequently all production was moved to the New Haven location. By now, he employed 250 workers, and produced 150,000 clocks annually.

"There's a sucker born every minute," is a quote that is widely credited to the cynical circus mogul P.T. Barnum. Jerome's future should have been secure but in 1855 he bought out a failed Bridgeport clock company controlled by P.T. Barnum, which wiped him out financially, leaving the Jerome Manufacturing Co. bankrupt. Jerome never recovered from the loss. By his own admission, he was a better inventor than businessman.

The New Haven Clock Company was founded in 1850 by Hiram Camp and a few other watchmakers in the New Haven, area. The company's plan was to mass produce brass clock movements for Camp's uncle, Chauncy Jerome, who owned the nearby Jerome Manufacturing Company, which at that time was still thriving.

When the New Haven Company Clock bought Jerome's bankrupt company for \$40,000 a few years later, they continued the work of building great clocks. In fact, by the 1880s, New Haven's clocks and non-jeweled became pocket watches widely known for their high quality. They were now the largest clock manufactory in Connecticut, and one of the largest in the world.

Into the 20th Century went the New Haven Clock Company. During the 1920s, they introduced the nickel-plated alarm clock, the dollar watch and the wristwatch, and the synchronous electric clock. It was because of the development of the last item that time switches were incorporated into stoves, radios and refrigerators; this also led to dashboard clocks for automobiles.

By the 1930s, the New Haven Clock Company plant covered two city blocks and employed a work force of 1500 producing three million timepieces per year.

With the advent of World War II, their whole company of two thousand employees was solely devoted to the design and production of timing devices for anti-aircraft shells, bombs, and naval mines. This was profitable work, but it heralded the departure of people whose skills centered upon the building of clocks and watches. Those workers would not return.


Came 1946, and in the wake of World War II, the company reorganized and attempted to restore itself as New Haven

Clock and Watch Company. The company's finances, always shaky, worsened almost immediately when the new management attempted to expand total sales from \$6 million to \$9 million without adequate bank credit. There began a slide into Chapter X bankruptcy, from which the company could not recover. Its eighteen buildings, now occupying four acres of industrial land, and all of its machinery were sold at auction for \$250,000.

During the 1960s, development of Interstate 91 necessitated the demolition of the former clock movement works on the west side of Hamilton Street, to facilitate construction of the right-of-way. The east plant, known as Clock Square, survives to this day.

Armani Reid and his teammates wanted to set the tone right from the start when the Westies traveled to play Shelton Friday evening.

Ferraro was inducted into the Martial Arts Hall of Fame in 1996, named the Grandmaster of the Year in 1998, and selected to "Who's Who in the Martial Arts" in 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2002.

He has also owned and operated the West Haven Academy of Karate for 48 years and has participated in and conducted "hundreds of fundraising events" to help people in need.

In observance of Italian American Heritage Month, West Haven recognizes the unique and vibrant culture of Americans of Italian descent and celebrates the story of generations of Italian sons and daughters who came to the United States seeking hope and opportunity to reach for the American dream.

At the City Hall ceremony, Rossi will present Ferraro, West Haven's top "paisano," with an embroidered "Italian American of the Year 2023" jacket and a mayoral citation for his civic-minded contributions and volunteerism.

Ferraro, born in New Haven in 1952, was raised by his Italian mother, Jennette Bissonette, and his Irish stepfather, James Savidge, in the heart of West Haven's bygone amusement park, Savin Rock Park.

The family homestead was on Marsh Street, across from Harvey Tattersall's West Haven Speedway, formerly known as Donovan Field. In the late 1960s, the house and road were dismantled to pave the way for the Savin Rock Urban Renewal Project.

Savidge, affectionately known as "Big Jim," was a

prominent Democratic political figure in West Haven and worked as a dispatcher at the Department of Public Works.

Ferraro's mother stayed home to raise her three children, including his younger siblings, Linda and James.

Ferraro, a 1970 graduate of West Haven High School, earned a Bachelor of Science degree in biology from Southern Connecticut State College in 1975 and received a Master of Science degree in fishery biology from Murray State University in Kentucky two years later.

In 1976-79, he represented many insurance companies as a general agent. His agency specialized in the sale of insurance policies for life, health and disability, along with annuities and financial planning.

From 1979 to 1982, Ferraro was employed as a territory representative for Westwood Pharmaceuticals Inc., a subsidiary of Bristol-Meyers Co. in Buffalo, New York.

He was responsible for informing dermatologists in New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts about Westwood's products. He was also responsible for servicing and maintaining wholesale and drugstore key accounts with an emphasis on maintaining inventory and promoting new products.

Ferraro and his high school sweetheart, the former Geralyn Ann DeMaio, have been married for 45 years and live in West Shore. They have two sons, Christopher and Brandon Ferraro, and two grandsons, Roman, 7, and Leo, 6.

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

# Assessor issues reminder of 2023 personal property declaration filing deadline of November 1st, 2023

The Assessor's Office has issued a reminder to owners and lessees of tangible personal property that Connecticut General Statute 12-40 requires both residents and non-residents to file with the assessor by November. 1, 2023, a sworn declaration of all assets used by the business as of October. 1, 2023.

Failure to file such declaration will result in the assessor filing on behalf of the business and adding a 25% penalty, per state statute.

Examples of such tangible personal property include but are not limited to: construction equipment, machinery, cables, conduits, pipes and other fixtures of water, gas, electric companies; lease-hold improvements classified as other than real property; furniture and fixtures; computer equipment and all other electronic data equipment, unregistered and out of state registered motor vehicles; farm machinery; tools; expensed supplies; horses & ponies. Various exemptions are explained on the declaration and available if filed on time.

Personal property declarations will be mailed to all existing businesses at the end of September. *All existing businesses are encouraged to file on-line.* Forms can be downloaded from www.cityofwesthaven.com or picked up at the Assessor's Office located at 355 Main St. 9 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.






