
On this Date



City to mark Pearl Harbor attack, Dec. 7

The city and the West Haven Veterans Council will observe Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day on the Veterans Walk of at 10:30 a.m. Dec. 7.

All veterans are invited to participate in the solemn ser-

vice, which will commemorate the 82nd anniversary of Japan's surprise attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941.

The public is also invited.

The annual ceremony, Honor in Bradley Point Park held in front of the Walk of Honor's William A. Soderman Memorial, will commence with a presentation of the

colors by the West Haven Police Honor Guard and a flagraising by the West Haven Fire Department Honor Guard.

It will feature remarks by Mayor Dorinda Borer.

West Haven Department Chief James P. O'Brien will read the names of the 18 Connecticut servicemen

who died in the Japanese bombing of the U.S. Navy base on the island of Oahu, Hawaii. A firefighter will toll the department's chrome bell each instant a name is called.

Connecticut's last known Pearl Harbor survivor died in 2020 at age 99.

The Pearl Harbor tribute

will include the Pledge of Allegiance, the national anthem, and opening and closing prayers.

It will also include a wreath-laying by Veterans Council members and taps played by retired West Shore Fire Department Lt. Kevin McKeon.

Thanksgiving 2023

When Puritans left England in May of 1620, they were unsure what lay ahead for them, knowing they had to endure months at sea making the crossing. They were looking to create a "Shining City on a Hill" filled with believers in the Calvinist Christianity they had come to confess. They hoped when they landed in the New World, they would be able to create the type of civil and religious atmosphere that would make them prosper and, as was the case for all Puritans, get a sign they were, indeed, the elect.

Their brand of Calvinism was "covenant" centered. Throughout the Old Testament, God had made a covenant with men. This "Covenant Theology" prompted them to bind themselves into a civil body under a covenant. That document, signed before they landed to form the Plymouth Colony, was given the name, "The Mayflower Compact."

Under this document, the first colony in Massachusetts Bay was established, and was to be the prototype of other covenants and constitutions that were to follow.

Later, decimated by exposure and famine, many of the signers never made it through the first winter. Those that did declared a day of Thanksgiving, which served as the point of origination for the New England holiday that was to follow well beyond 1620, into the 19th Century.

On this Thanksgiving Day, 2015, we present the Mayflower Compact and list its signers.

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN. We, whose names are underwritten, the Loyal Subjects of our dread Sovereign Lord King James, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. Having undertaken for the Glory of God, and Advancement of the Christian Faith, and the Honour of our King and Country, a Voyage to plant the first Colony in the northern Parts of Virginia; Do by these Presents, solemnly and mutually, in the Presence of God and one another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil Body Politick, for our better Ordering and Preservation, and Furtherance of the Ends aforesaid: And by Virtue hereof do enact, constitute, and frame, such just and equal Laws, Ordinances, Acts, Constitutions, and Officers, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general Good of the Colony; unto which we promise all due Submission and Obedience.

IN WITNESS whereof we have hereunto subscribed our names at Cape-Cod the eleventh of November, in the Reign of our Sovereign Lord King James, of England, France, and Ireland, the eighteenth, and of Scotland the fifty-fourth, Anno Domini: 1620.

Author Coates is a moral idiot

The celebrated author Ta-Nehisi Coates is not reliable regarding things he's spent considerable time thinking about here in the U.S., so it's presumably a mistake to put much stock in his newly formed opinions about matters he barely knows anything

He proved as much in an interview about the Israeli-Palestinian conflict the other day on Democracy Now!

At the outset, Coates announced his opposition to "complexity" and "complication," and left little doubt about his sincerity in that rity, the community likely regard with a preposterous depiction of Israel as a direct descendant of the Jim Crow

If Coates weren't simply retailing the familiar left-wing critiques of Israel, his belief that there's nothing to learn on the ground in the Middle East that he doesn't already know from reading about the failure of Reconstruction might qualify as a high-handed form of "Orientalism."

Coates makes much of a checkpoint that he encountered on a trip to Israel and the West Bank a few months ago in the West Bank city of Hebron. He says his Palestinian guide couldn't proceed down

a certain street, but Coates was allowed to pass after an Israeli guard ascertained that his grandparents were Christian.

It's hard to say much about this incident without knowing more. It is certainly true, though, that Hebron has more checkpoints than other West Bank cities.

Why?

Well, Coates doesn't mention that Hebron is one of the four holy cities of Judaism. Or, that there was a pogrom there in 1929 that led to the evacuation of the Jewish population. Or, that a small community of Jews has returned to the city.

Without the Israeli secuwouldn't survive. Is that what Coates wants?

Oh, sorry -- complications. We've been told that they're unnecessary.

Coates is dismissive of Israel's worries about terror attacks. The West Bank is not Gaza, but terrorism, including in Hebron, is still an ongoing

Coates gives no sign of realizing that Israelis themselves are forbidden from traveling to so-called Area A territory in the West Bank. If the various designations of territory with different rules seem arbitrary, they were hashed out in the Oslo Accords between the PLO and Israel in the 1990s.

In a laughable argument, Coates said he was shocked during his trip "when it suddenly dawned on me that I was in a region of the world where some people could vote and some people could not."

It is true that Palestinians can't vote, but this isn't the doing of the Israeli government. There hasn't been an election in the Palestinian territories since 2006. The people who currently run the West Bank fear they would lose -- for good reason. Hamas won the legislative elections last time around, and then waged a brief factional war to eliminate their Fatah rivals in Gaza.

In Israel proper, there are about 2 million Arab citizens who have the right to vote and the other rights of Israel citi-

But I know, complexity only gets in the way.

Coates directed the balance of his outrage at the Israeli military operation, without mentioning Hamas, October 7 or that fact that terror group uses civilians as human shields.

Finally, he says that the U.S. has "exported" Jim Crow to Israel. Really? Did we eliminate it here, but conclude that it would be the right system for Israel? And bipartisan administrations pursued this policy while hiding it from the

Cooking a turkey? Follow some safety tips

Thanksgiving is a time for celebration and togetherness, but the approaching holiday also comes with potential hazards.

"With the risks posed by the COVID-cold-flu season and the typical hazards associated with holiday festivities, ensuring a safe and enjoyable Thanksgiving should be your top priority," says Eric Walsh, M.D., Medical Director, Hart-HealthCare-GoHealth Urgent Care.

Dr. Walsh shared his top tips so you can enjoy your holiday while also staying safe. Here are the top six recommenda-

Treating a cooking burn: Cooking-related house fires reach an all-time high on Thanksgiving day. The risk of a fire seems dangerous enough, but the holiday also offers plenty of opportunities to burn yourself. So how do you assess and treat a burn?

First, run the burned area under lukewarm or cool wa- ture - will give you tummy

cause more damage) for 10 to stuffing to at least 165° F and 15 minutes, and then check the burn for size and color. Most cooking-related burns can be treated with soothing creams like aloe and over-the-counter pain medications. But immediate medical care should be sought for burns larger than 1-2 inches, those in a really sensitive area, or charred skin that's white, brown, leathery or shiny.

Don't rinse a raw turkey: Many people think rinsing a turkey before they cook it will wash away harmful bacteria that poultry can contain. However, this practice causes bacteria-containing droplets to splash across the sink, cooking surfaces, utensils, and nearby food, contaminating the entire kitchen. Instead, pat your turkey with a paper towel before cooking, and then wash your hands with soap and water.

Quickly put away your leftovers: Bacteria like salmonella and Clostridium perfringens the so-called "buffet germ" that grows at room temperater (not icy cold, as this can trouble. Cook your turkey and keep food at 140° or warmer or 40° or cooler if it's not being eaten right away. Consider making your stuffing outside the bird for an even safer option. If you suspect food poisoning, drink lots of fluids, including electrolytes.

Know your knife safety **protocols:** More than $\frac{1}{3}$ of knife-related injuries happen in the kitchen. Protect your fingers by using sharp knives, as dull blades require more pressure to cut. Curl your fingers and cut away from

deboning. Keep your knives off counters and out of sinks by washing and storing them immediately.

Sick-season protocols: Health professionals expect an uptick in cases of COVID, See Safety, page 8



Viet Vets seek names; deadline date changed

Current and former city residents who served in the Vietnam War are sought by the West Haven Vietnam Memorial Inc. Committee to have their names inscribed on a new section of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Bradley Point Park.

To qualify for name recognition on the memorial "wall," Vietnam veterans must apply and meet the following requirements:

- Applicants must live or have lived in West Haven. Veterans living in West Haven must provide proof of residence, such as a utility bill.
- Applicants must have served in-country during the Viet-
- Applicants must have been honorably discharged from military service. A DD214 form (Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty) is required.

Applicants must share potential costs, if any.

committee does not have formal application. Veterans must mail all documents, which are due Jan. 1, to West Haven Vietnam Veterans, City Hall, lower level, 355 Main St., West Haven 06516.

Those with questions can call Bill at (203) 521-2356, Steve at (475) 655-2993 or Paul at (203) 500-2159.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial includes a black granite wall inscribed with the names of those from West Haven who served or gave their lives in Vietnam from 1959 to 1975, along with three white flagpoles draped with the American, Connecticut and prisoner-of-war flags.

The memorial, dedicated Nov. 12, 2003, also includes a black granite map of the four battle districts of Vietnam bearing the inscription "All Gave Some, Some Gave All," as well as five bronze insignia markers atop black granite posts representing each branch of the U.S. armed forces.

American public?

As a high priest of woke progressivism, Coates was always going to be a fierce critic of Israel. He is a particularly instructive instance, though, of trying to take the Left's racial categories here at home and apply them to a conflict with its own fraught dynamics established long ago.

"It's actually not that hard to understand," Coates maintained of the Israeli-Palestinian dispute. "It's actually quite familiar to those of us with a familiarity [with] African-American history."

If Coates has accomplished anything, it is demonstrating that this is wholly untrue.



influenza, and the common cold this holiday season. Consider putting protocols in place such as checking COVID and flu vaccine statuses.

You can also request guests take rapid CO-VID-19 tests in advance of attendance. If your group has any high-risk individuals, you can consider even more rigorous testing protocols like PCR tests available at Hartford Health-Care-GoHealth centers. WHFD accepts old flags for annual rites

The West Haven Fire Department is now prepared to accept United States Flags that are no longer serviceable for display. Members of the public can now deposit U.S. Flags to be retired in a receptacle located to the left front entrance of the West Haven Fire Headquarters, 366 Elm St. The flags will be retired in periodic ceremonies conducted throughout the year for the express purpose of disposing of such flags in a dignified and honorable manner.

In announcing the new program, Department Chief James P. O'Brien said Members of the Department identified a need for a durable and easily accessible box where community members could dispose of their worn or tattered U.S. flags to ensure that the flags would be disposed of in a respectful manner. Working with members of our community, a box has been obtained and placed in front of the of Department's headquarters on Elm Street. Citizens are encouraged to begin using the collection box to dispose of their worn flags, he continued.

The United States Flag Code establishes advisory rules for display and care of the flag of the United States. Included in these rules is guidance regarding the proper disposal of U.S. flags which are unfit for display. The preferred method for disposal (known as retirement) is burning.

The initial retirement ceremony will take place at West Haven Fire Headquarters, 366 Elm Street starting at 9 a.m. on Saturday Dec. 9

This will be the first ceremony to be conducted by the WHFD with additional ceremonies conducted as needed throughout the year. The formal U.S. flag retirement ceremony will be conducted by Department Chief James P. O'Brien. Dignitaries, veterans, and other guests are invited to witness the ceremony.

Firm hired to check city sewers

CDM Smith of East Hartford and Martinez Couch & Associates LLC of Rocky Hill have been contracted by West Haven to conduct a sewer system study for locating sources of stormwater inflow to the city's sanitary sewer system.

The three-week study, overseen by CDM in designated Allingtown neighborhoods only, will attempt to locate direct and indirect connections from sources, including catch basins, roof drains and broken sewer pipes. One of the methods used is smoke testing, performed by Martinez Couch.

During testing, white smoke is introduced into the sanitary sewer system via a smokegenerating machine at an existing maintenance hole. White smoke is vented from holes in maintenance hole covers on the street and plumbing vent pipes on or near the roof surface.

The procedure is normal and not cause for alarm.





Dear Food Establishment Owners:

As you know the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Food Code went into full effect in Connecticut on February 17, 2023. The FDA food code is a national food code and is used in almost all 50 states. This code is based on scientific data gathered during field inspections and is updated every 4 years. The goal of the new food code is to reduce the risks of foodborne illness through active managerial control of foodborne illness risk factors.

On March 27th, the West Haven Health Department offered a virtual overview and training of the new food code, but unfortunately the session was poorly attended. We would like to offer another virtual training opportunity of the code, so that all food businesses are comfortable with the new laws. You will be receiving an email inviting you to the training scheduled for Wednesday, December 6th at 10:00 am. Please respond back to us with your decision to attend. Once you respond, you will receive a link to the meeting along with a packet of educational materials to bring to the training.

We strongly encourage you to take advantage of this opportunity. It is a great chance to ask the sanitarian staff any questions you may have regarding the new code as well as questions about temporary food events and itinerant vending.



WHPD lists results of tobacco checks

The West Haven Police Dept. recently conducted a compliance check of businesses that sell tobacco and related products. The following are the results:

Out of 11 West Haven businesses that currently sell tobacco, four were cited for illegally selling tobacco products to someone under the age of 21 during recent unannounced compliance checks, according to West Haven Police Department.

The department worked along with the Connecticut Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS) Tobacco Prevention and Enforcement Program (TPEP) and West Haven Prevention Council (WHPC), conducted the compliance inspections of establishments that sell tobacco products and electronic cigarettes on Oct.11.

What was expected was compliance with checking the IDs of those who asked to purchase tobacco products, in accord with statea law.

"The inspections were performed in an effort to determine compliance with state laws concerning the prohibition of the sale of e-cigarettes and/or tobacco products to youth under the age of 21," Connecticut Department of Mental Health explained. "Retailers are required by state law to inspect the photo ID of anyone who appears under the age of 30 before selling a tobacco product or electronic cigarette."

The following retailers were found to be non-compliant:

- 2. Smovers Convenience; 1065 Boston Post Road
- 3. Krauzers Food Store; 544 Derby Ave
- 4. West Side Vape Shop; 785 Campbell Ave

The following retailers were found to be compliant:

- 2. Xtra Fuel; 750 1st Ave
- 3. Smokers; 596 1st Ave
- 4. Best Fuel; 161 Boston Post Road
- 5. Ailingtown; 193 Boston Post Road
- 6. Cigarette Express; 307 Captain Thomas Boulevard
- 7. Krauzers; 10 Jones Hill Road

Of the four establishments who were found non-compliant with Connecticut General Statutes Section 53-344 (Sale of tobacco to a person under 21) or Section 53-344b (Sale of an e-cigarette to a person under 21). The offending clerks at these establishments were issued a first time infraction in the amount of \$300.



Historian's corner

Cranberries: "The Rubies of the Pines"

It has been 402 years since the autumn of 1621, when that struggling band of English Puritans sat down with their Indian friends to celebrate their friendship, their survival, and to enjoy their first Thanksgiving meal together. Now, while we are fairly certain that their dinner included wild turkeys, it is not known if on that day, they enjoyed another Thanksgiving staple of long-standing: the American Cranberry.

American Indians made use of the cranberry long before the first white settlers arrived in New England. They called it "ibimi," meaning "bitter berry," and they considered it a symbol of peace, so perhaps it would have been appropriate for them to bring cranberries to that first special meal so long ago. The Indians ate the cranberries raw, cooked, or mashed together with dried venison to make a long-lasting pressed cake known as "pemmican." In addition, they used cranberries to create medicinal salves and dyes for their clothing

At first, the Puritans called the fruit "crane-berries," since their flower resembled the head and neck of the sandhill crane; ultimately, the name was changed to become the name that we today are familiar with.

As the story goes, in the early days of the New England Colonies, the bane of the existence of Colonial sailors was scurvy, which resulted from a lack of vitamin C in the diet. Those sailors made im-

mediate use of the cranberry to correct this deficiency, and eliminate the suffering that it caused. They discovered that barrels filled with cranberries and water could be stored on board ship for months without spoiling.

The Indians taught the Pilgrims how to harvest the cran-

berries by hand. This was soon improved upon with the it invention of a rake-toothed wooden tool known as a cranberry scoop. In the beginning, the cranberries grew wild, but in 1816, the practice of growing cranberries in man-made bogs began to take over.

The purposes of the bogs are several: since the berries float, the presence of water makes them much easier to harvest than if they were to be lying on the ground; in addition, the water controls insects, and in winter it creates a layer of ice which protects the cranberry vines.


Today, the biggest cranberry-producing states are (in order): Wisconsin, Massachusetts, and New Jersey. One fifth of the annual cranberry production is consumed on Thanksgiving, when nine out of ten Americans look forward to seeing cranberries on the dinner table. On Thanksgiving, you may find them prepared in a multitude of delightful ways, but these historic, and truly American berries are sure to be part of your Thanksgiving, in one form or another.

Happy Thanksgiving! On this day, let us not forget to give humble thanks to our Maker, for all of the blessings that He has bestowed upon us, by His Grace.

Westies eye tournament; netters out

The West Haven football team improved to 8-1 with a convincing 46-6 victory over cross-town rival Notre Dame on Senior Night g at Ken Strong Stadium.

Quarterback Nick Conlan hit on 8-of-9 passes for 140 yards and three touchdowns, while Demarco Eady and Camren Kemp each scored twice, and Rui DaSilva scored on a 99-yard interception return.

The Westies took control of the game with 27 points in the first quarter. Kemp gave the Westies a 6-0 lead on a 1-yard touchdown run, before Conlan hit Eady with a 29-yard scoring strike to increase the margin to 12-0.

A 10-yard run by Kemp followed by Conlan's run on the conversion increased the lead to 20-0, before Armani Reid gave West Haven a 27-0 lead with a 72-yard punt return for a score.

The Westies increased the lead to 46-0 with 19 more points coming in the second quarter. Conlan hit Aedan Coe with a 6-yard scoring pass and followed with a 40-yard scoring strike to Eady, before DaSilva's 99-yard interception return just before halftime gave West Haven a 46-0 advantage.

West Haven continued on its path to a postseason bid and home game to start the playoffs when the Westies traveled to defeat Cheshire 25-14 Friday evening.

The win for West Haven was its fourth on the road this season against Top 10 teams, and helped the Westies improve to 8-1 on the year.

West Haven got on the board first and took a 7-0 lead on a 5-yard touchdown run by Kemp. After Cheshire closed the opening quarter by using a 5-yard fumble return for a score to even the contest, the Westies took the lead for good with the next two touchdowns.

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

The activities are free, but people are asked to bring nonperishable items for the West Haven Emergency Assistance Task Force, which provides food for residents in need.


