Mayor Borer takes office

Dorinda Borer formally began her inaugural two-year term as West Haven's second female mayor after being sworn in during a ceremony at West Haven High School on Sunday morning.

Borer, a former three-term state representative, was administered the oath of office by state Attorney General William Tong in front of a spirited crowd of more than 500 well-wishers in the school auditorium at the inauguration of elected city officials.

She was joined onstage by her son, Drew Borer, 22, and West Haven Democratic state Rep. Treneé McGee, the master of ceremonies.

Among the dignitaries in attendance were former West Haven Mayors Nancy R. Rossi and Edward M. O'Brien, along with East Haven Mayor Joseph A. Carfora, Hamden Mayor Lauren Garrett and North Haven First Selectman Michael J. Freda.

Borer, a Democrat, defeated Republican candidate Barry Lee Cohen and write-in candidate Steven R. Mullins in the Nov. 7 general election, earning one of the highest vote totals for mayor See Inaugural, page 10


On to the state finals!

City observes Pearl Harbor Day today

The city and the West Haven Veterans Council will observe Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day on the Veterans Walk of Honor in Bradley Point Park at 10:30 a.m. today.

All veterans are invited to participate in the solemn service, which will commemorate the 82nd anniversary of Japan's surprise attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941.

The public is also invited.

The annual ceremony, held in front of the Walk of Honor's William A. Soderman Memorial, will commence with a greeting by City Clerk John W. Lewis, the master of ceremonies, followed by a presentation of the colors and a flag-raising by the West Haven Fire Department Honor Guard.

It will feature remarks from Mayor Dorinda Borer read by Lewis on behalf of Borer, who is unable to attend because of her first meeting as mayor with the state Municipal Accountability Review Board in Hartford.

West Haven Fire Department Chief James P. O'Brien will read the names of the 18 Connecticut servicemen who died in the Japanese bombing of the U.S. Navy base on the island of Oahu, Hawaii. A firefighter will toll the department's chrome bell each instant a name is called.

The Pearl Harbor tribute will include the Pledge of Allegiance led by Veterans Council President Dave Ricci, the national anthem, and opening and closing prayers.

That means a special election will hafta be held in order to fill the seat. This is gonna be an interesting sideshow, methinks.

Some names have already been dropped as to who might fill the chair, and we know that discussions about said election were held in the last several weeks. The question before the house is whether it's gonna be a simple twocandidate race or will there be others throwing their hats into

As I said, and Iva Lootey confirmed, names have been dropped, and we know that Herronner supposedly has her eye on one person to take the spot. That name is much different than the one we hold a few weeks ago.

The other question, besides who will get the nod from the mayor, is whether that means other candidates will petition to be put on the ballot. Usually, these things are a two-person procedure, one from one party and one from t'other. In the case of the 115th that seat has been held by a Demmie since knickers were the trousers of choice.

A few suggestions

As of Sunday, a new administration has taken office, the result of the November 7 election. Dorinda Keenan Borer is the new mayor and controls the City Council and under-ticket offices, both of which are in the complete control of one party. We will not sugar coat it, our history with a super-majority (the charter demands at least one minority member) has not resulted in good decisions. At least there are two member of the opposition in this iteration.

As we begin a new era, we wish the new officeholders well, and hope the call for "change" that was so much a part of both Republican and Democratic campaigns does not fade in the push to take power. With this in mind, we offer these suggestions to the new administration:



Movie follows familiar pattern

The figure of Napoleon has long been an object of fascination, but the new Ridley Scott biopic makes one wonder why.

The film, perhaps inadvertently, partakes of the spirit of the times. The so-called Great Man theory of history -- that it is exceptionally talented men who bend events to their will -- is out of favor. Accordingly, the movie renders the stereotypical great man, Napoleon, as doltish and uninteresting.

No man is a hero to his valet, goes the old saying. But can't he at least be a hero, or a compelling persona, to the director of a \$200 million movie about him?

Apparently not.

Napoleon can be considered a proto-fascist dictator, or an enlightened reformer, or some of both, but he could never be considered dull, at least not until portrayed by a stolid Joaquin Phoenix, seemingly unaware that the general was a sparkling personality, a hugely energetic reformer and an inspiring leader of men.

As the Wall Street Journal critic Kyle Smith puts it, "Mr. Phoenix's Napoleon could never have commanded so much as a squadron of the Salvation Army."

The Great Man theory is

now considered simplistic and even dangerous, and has about it the stale stench of dead white males. Academic historians tend to obsess with broad economic and social forces or with minutiae, while the largest impersonal force of all, the climate, occupies an outsized place in the political debate of advanced countries.

We don't have to swoon like the philosopher Georg Wilhelm Friedrich Hegel, who enthused after catching sight of Napoleon in Jena about "this world-soul, riding out of the city on reconnaissance."

But the general and emperor demonstrates that great men matter -- not that they are virtuous or good, or that they can overcome every obstacle put in their way by themselves or others, or that large-scale factors don't count, but that individual leaders take a hand in shaping events, sometimes decisively.

Would any Macedonian other than Alexander the Great have toppled the Persian empire and marched on India? Would any Frenchman besides Charlemagne have united much of Europe under his rule and brought about an intellectual and cultural renaissance? Would any Russian other than Peter the Great have modernized the Russian empire, defeated the Turks

and Swedes, and built St. Petersburg?

How different the 20th century would have looked without Hitler, Stalin and Mao.

By the same token, only Napoleon -- who rose to power in France only six years fleeing his native Corsica with almost nothing -- would have undertaken his historic campaign of institution-building in France and conquest in Europe. Many of his changes in France proved worthy and enduring, while his ambitions in Europe were rightly resisted by other powers, England foremost among them.

At the end of the day, he was a captain of war who knew one thing above all -- the offensive to seek and destroy the enemy army. He had speed on his side, a feel for topography and the flow of battle, and innovative tactics. These enabled him to destroy enemy armies and pick apart coalitions arrayed against him for years, as his legend grew.

As always happens, though, his rivals learned from him, and his military advantages slipped away. He lost a long battle of attrition, in masses of broken men, horses and weapons. His operational prowess, synonymous with great victories at Ulm and Austerlitz, didn't translate into success in

Viet Vets seek names; deadline date changed

Current and former city residents who served in the Vietnam War are sought by the West Haven Vietnam Memorial Inc. Committee to have their names inscribed on a new section of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Bradley Point Park.

To qualify for name recognition on the memorial "wall," Vietnam veterans must apply and meet the following requirements:

 Applicants must live or have lived in West Haven. Veterans living in West Haven must provide proof of residence, such

- Applicants must have served in-country during the Viet-

 Applicants must have been honorably discharged from military service. A DD214 form (Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty) is required.

- Applicants must share potential costs, if any.

committee does not have application. Veterans must mail all documents, which are due Jan. 1, to West Haven Vietnam Veterans, City Hall, lower level, 355 Main St., West Haven 06516.

Those with questions can call Bill at (203) 521-2356, Steve at (475) 655-2993 or Paul at (203) 500-2159.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial includes a black granite wall inscribed with the names of those from West Haven who served or gave their lives in Vietnam from 1959 to 1975, along with three white flagpoles draped with the American, Connecticut and prisoner-of-war flags.

The memorial, dedicated Nov. 12, 2003, also includes a black granite map of the four battle districts of Vietnam bearing the inscription "All Gave Some, Some Gave All," as well as five bronze insignia markers atop black granite posts representing each branch of the U.S. armed forces.

the ultimate geopolitical war. It all ended in ashes and exile, twice. Napoleon was unforgivably careless with the blood and treasure of France, and that of the rest of Europe that struggled so mightily to stop him.

It's not a story that should occasion hero worship, or romantic images like the famous Jacques-Louis David painting of Napoleon crossing the Alps. But it's not a story devoid of interest, or featuring a slightly ridiculous dullard at its center. Hollywood, in a rank distortion, somehow has made it so.

City contracts to inspect sources of inflow into sewers

CDM Smith of East Hartford and Martinez Couch & Associates LLC of Rocky Hill have been contracted by West Haven to conduct a sewer system study for locating sources of stormwater inflow to the city's sanitary sewer system.

The three-week study, overseen by CDM in designated Allingtown neighborhoods only, will attempt to locate direct and indirect connections from sources, including catch basins, roof drains and broken sewer pipes. One of the methods used is smoke testing, performed by Martinez Couch.

During testing, white smoke is introduced into the sanitary sewer system via a smokegenerating machine at an existing maintenance hole. White smoke is vented from holes in maintenance hole covers on the street and plumbing vent pipes on or near the roof surface.

The procedure is normal and not cause for alarm.

After arriving in the West Haven Fire Department's 1935 Mack pump firetruck, Santa and Mrs. Claus were escorted to a portable stage on the Main Street side of the Green by the West Haven Seahawks cheerleading team to the sound of applause and shouts of glee from hundreds of bundled-up merrymakers.

Before the lighting, WOW Radio personality Brian Smith, the master of ceremonies, thanked and praised Rossi's special guests — members of West Haven Vietnam Veterans and Surfside Veterans — as the all-ages crowd clapped and cheered.

Rossi then gave a shoutout to then-Mayor-elect Dorinda Borer, whose inauguration was Sunday, and helped Smith lead revelers in a countdown to set the tree — and the Green — aglow.

The guests recognized onstage were West Haven Vietnam Veterans President Dave Ricci, Vice President Al Beck Sr., Treasurer Steve Carney, and members Howie Chernikoff, Rick Foley, Mark Levine, Kevin Sullivan and Howie Thomas.

Also recognized were Surfside Veterans President Rich Deso, who is also West Haven's municipal veterans representative, and members Robert Chapin, Doug Daniels, Conrad Martin, chaplain Ken Smith and Al Terr.

The lighting marked the "50th Anniversary of Freedom."

In 1973, President Richard Nixon held a White House reception for U.S. prisoners of war from Vietnam. On May 24, the Nixon Presidential Library in Yorba Linda, California, observed the homecoming's golden anniversary — 50 years to the day of the then-president hosting the largest dinner in White House history in honor of the 591 POWs released by the North Vietnamese.

To celebrate the anniversary locally, the city and West Haven Vietnam Veterans are sponsoring a City Hall poster series, "A Learning Experience," to recognize the unwavering courage and selfless sacrifice of the approximately 766 American service members held captive during the Vietnam War, Ricci said.

The 19-month series, which began in September in City Hall's first-floor entryway, will also chronicle nearly every aspect of the war, Sullivan said.

The four-hour festival opened with the national anthem sung by Associate Pastor David Thomas of Kingdom Life Christian Church and followed with performances by Top Hat Dance Academy, the West Haven High School dance team and the Mulkerin School of Irish Dance. Top Hat was directed by Sharon Minnix, the dance team by Lizz Petrakis and Mulkerin by Kathy Carew.

It featured performances by West Haven's own Judy Pancoast, a Grammy-nominated recording artist. Pancoast treated the crowd to a songbook of holiday nuggets, including her popular original, "The House on Christmas Street."

The annual event was presented by the city, ArtsWestCT, the First Congregational Church and West Haven United, an organization aimed at bringing the city's volunteer groups



Christmas, 1917 By Seth G. Haley As written, 1955

It was Christmas, 1917; the occasion World War I; the place a tiny village in France, a village with one little shop, a few houses, a beaten chateau.

Christmas morning came bright and fair, and cold, and in the hall, decorated with greens and red berries, with a colorful tree on the stage, the men assembled, bundled in their coats.

The program began with a brief religious note; a few verses of scripture, the Lord's Prayer, a few simple remarks, a carol we all remembered. Then the boys performed: vocal and instrumental solos, banjos predominating; a surprising piano solo; a good quartet; dancers, and then the climax, the "Hobnail Minstrels," a rollicking good num-

Then the distribution of little gifts and a Christmas card to each man. A closing song and benediction.

Shortly, the dinner! Uncle Sam had remembered us abundantly, and the cooks had worked valiantly. There was turkey and all that goes with it on Christmas Day at home; and "seconds!" My dinner was with one of the companies in a new barn, my table a manger. Unforgettable!

In the evening another gathering in the cold, dimly lighted little hall. Some of the entertainment repeated and the singing of familiar carols from our leaflets. The quartet sang softly and effectively "Silent Night, Holy Night" and the



day was ended.

No, not quite ended, for many lingered -to talk, to write letters by candle light, some standing, using the stage for a desk. And to my little room adjoining, many came to talk, to show pictures of their loved ones so far away and to receive New Testaments, which fitted the blouse pocket over the heart.

Come early next morning, and they marched away to another area, their shoes crunching on the snow and ice. They waved and spoke as they passed me, standing by the side of the road.

I watched them out of sight around the bend, and thought, "Wonderful boys, the flower of American manhood. I hope their Christmas helped!



cades, the West Haven football team is headed back to the state finals.

Behind two touchdown passes and a pair of touchdown runs by Nick Conlan, the Westies topped Greenwich, 26-13, in the Class LL semifinals at Greenwich Sunday afternoon.

Looking for their first state title since defeating Greenwich in 2002, the Westies will

noon at 5 p.m. at Central Connecticut State University. West Haven defeated Staples in the season opener in September.

Trailing 6-0, West Haven evened the game when Conlan hit Armani Reid in stride for a 77-yard touchdown pass and a 6-6 tie.

The Westies took the lead for good in the third quarter as Conlan scored on a 44-yard scamper, then increased the hit Demarco Eady for a 21vard score.

Clinging to an 18-13 lead, Conlan scored from four yards out in the final two minutes to seal the win

West Haven opened the past 14 days with a regular season loss to Fairfield Prep, before opening the state playoffs with a win over New Britain.

For six weeks to start the season, the Fairfield Prep foot-

For the first time in two de- play Staples Saturday after- margin to 18-6 when Conlan ball team could not have imagined they would be in position to play for a postseason spot on the final day of the regular season. Three wins later, and the Jesuits had one mountain to climb, along with a bit of help to play in the postseason.

The Jesuits did their part, holding West Haven in check, and squeezing out a 21-14 victory in a Southern Connecticut Conference contest at Ken Strong Stadium in West Haven Wednesday evening.

The Jesuits broke out to a 21-7 lead at the half, then relied on the defense in the second half to hold on to the victory.

After West Haven used eight plays to go 53 yards for a Conlan to Reid 16-yard touchdown, getting the Westies within 21-14, the Prep defense made several stands.

The Westies had a chance to tie the contest, facing fourth down at the Prep eight, but the Jesuit defense stopped Conlan one yard short of a first down with just over six minutes remaining.

After holding the Jesuits, West Haven had one final opportunity to even the contest, but Prep took advantage of some West Haven miscues, then sealed the contest when T.J. Cirilli's interception gave Prep the ball with under five minutes to go.

Prep took all but 35 seconds off the clock, but West Haven was unable to generate any offense, falling for the sixth straight time against the Jesu-

"It has to do with how well Prep played," West Haven coach Rich Boshea said. "We didn't make plays that we have to make, and we didn't do things we have to do to win the game. That comes from Prep playing really well. We knew it was a tough match up. They were fighting for their lives, and we just didn't get it done when we had to."

The Jesuits set the tone in the opening half, controlling play from start to finish on both sides of the ball. Fighting for a postseason bid, Prep amassed 210 yards of offense in the

opening 24 minutes, and other than an interception returned for a touchdown by the Westies, were barely threatened.

Needing just four plays to move 56 yards on its opening possession, Fairfield Prep made things look easy when the drive ended on a 39-yard touchdown strike from Tyler Smith to Vincent Lombardo just 1:08 into the contest.

West Haven could not recover a poor snap on its next possession, setting Prep up at the West Haven 49. When the Jesuits looked as if they were extending the lead to a pair of touchdowns, Coryon Harris picked off a pass by Smith and returned the interception 99 yards to get within 7-6 as the extra point failed.

The Westies failed to click on any cylinder in the opening half, including a poor snap on a punt attempt, giving the Jesuits possession at the West Haven 8. Three plays later, Prep led 14-6 on a 3-yard touchdown run by Jon Morris with 1:04 remaining in the opening quarter.

West Haven had its share of opportunities to get on the board to close the opening half, but two drives ended inside the 30, and the final play of the half fell incomplete with the Westies at the 5-yard line of the Jesuits.

While the Westies could not capitalize, Prep did, taking a 21-6 advantage with 1:03 remaining in the half on a 20yard scoring strike from Smith to Finbar Malloy to cap a 14play 73-yard drive.

Heading into the postseason, third-seeded West Haven had plenty to think about. There were struggles of late to win in the postseason at home, and most currently, a loss to Fairfield Prep less than a week ago to conclude the regular season.

Not of that mattered Tuesday evening.

Behind the passing combination of Conlan and Reid, the running of Camren Kemp, and a decisive interception by Harris, West Haven topped sixthseeded New Britain, 28-14, in

"He throws a good ball into the wind because his throws are sharp and tight," Boshea said of Conlan. "They (Reid and Conlan) just know each other well. They have that feel. They play a lot of seven on seven together, and

West Haven did not get much going on the ground in the opening half, but the Westies took a 6-0 lead on their second possession of the contest when Ya'Hinus Mercer plunged in from one yard out to cap a 6-play, 57-yard drive with 2:12 remaining in the opening quarter.

New Britain moved the ball at times behind the running of Allen, who finished the game with 149 yards on the ground, but never completed a first half drive with a score. The Hurricanes never got further than the West Haven 42 in the opening half as Allen rushed for 40 yards.

The Hurricanes also could not capitalize as West Haven recovered two of its own first half fumbles.

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



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
